
To prevent staining a "company" tablecloth, cover it with clear plastic yardage. This adds a lovely sheen and permits using a sudsy sponge to erase spills and spots right on the table! For a season touch, use a solid cloth in the traditional color, arrange appropriate cut-out pictures over the surface and then spread the plastic cover carefully. And remember to launder the cloth itself occasionally.

After leather gloves have been washed, dried, and "worked" on the hands for softening and reshaping, store them flat and unfolded. To keep them clean, cover with tissue paper rather than a plastic bag. The reasons: leather must be able to "breathe" and tends to discolor if stored in air-tight plastic.

"Fishnets" are fast becoming decorating favorites because these airy fabrics achieve a light, spacious effect on windows and add softness to large wall expanses. Many such nets (made of acrylic, tone bristles shaped to a point for polyester, and nylon fibers) are

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
