Meringue Shells

3 egg whites

3/8 teaspoon salt 3/4 teaspoon cream of tartar

3/4 cup sugar


1 teaspoon vanilla or other extract

Have egg whites warmed to room temperature. Add salt and cream of tartar and beat until mixtures form rounding peaks. Beat in sugar portions of 1 tablespoon at a time and continue beating until sugar is dissolved and glossy peaks form. Shape into cups or any desired form on ungreased heavy wrapping paper or other unglazed paper on a baking sheet. A pastry bag is usetul, but not necessary in shaping meringue shells. Bake in a very slow oven (250°F) 30 minutes for soft shells, or bake 1 hour for dry, faintly browned shells. At the end of baking period, turn off heat and allow shells to remain in oven over night or until they are cool. Serve with ice cream topped with fruit, or your favorite sauce; whipped cream, cream fillings, berries or other fruits. Serves 5-9 depending upon size of shells.

The shells may be colored with fool coloring for variety and different extracts used. Try red or green shell with peppermint ex-




