- Look for plants that have green foliage all the way to the soil line. This indicates a good root system, a disease-free plant fertilized.
- Select only plants with smal green buttons in the middle of the red bracts. These buttons even tually develop into flowers. It the plant is already producin pollen, you'll know part of its useful life has already passed
