

April Offers the "Lucy Eleven" That's the eleven foods plentiful this month. Featured are eggs and prunes. Although spring usually brings a large number of eggs to market, supplies this month are expected to exceed those of last year. Dried prune production is heading for a 40,000ton increase over last year-with official estimates at about 171,000 tons.

Other foods reported plentiful by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Market Service include two poultry items -broiler-fryers and turkeys, fresh \$3.50 carrots, onions, cabbage, canned pears, canned pink salmon, honey \$2.00 and dry peas.

Turkey for Easter dinner is a good think to keep in mind. It should be a timely treat - and can easily be prepared ahead of time. And you should find broilerfryers also an economy meat. Marketings are expected to be nearly 10 percent above a year ago, when farm prices were the lowest on record for April.

You'll find lots of honey on the market this month. And April 18-24 has been designated "Honey for Breakfast Week", a real good time to "sweeten' up" the morning menu.

Fresh onions will be plentiful, due to a large harvest and a decline in export movement because of the dock strike. Dry peas will be well in excess of trade needs. Wall-to-Wall Cleaning

If washing the walls is on your spring housecleaning agenda, here's how you can do a better job of cleaning them.

Select a mild soap or commercial cleaner. Use one bucket for the cleaning solution, another for clean water for rinsing, and large sponges for both.

Wash the walls from the bottom up. This is the secret of success. If you start at the top, you may drip scrub water down over the soiled area. This will cause streaks. But if the solution drips into a clean area, it can easily be wiped off.

Wash only as much as you can reach - then rinse immediately. In washing the next area, overlap the first one. Do the ceilings last. Effect of Diet on Lifespan Studied The relationship of diet to body function and longevity of experimental animals show - among other things - that overeating shortens the lifespan, according to a recent study by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In the study, rats that ate excessive amounts of food and gained weight at a rapid rate died at an early age regardless of the composition of their diet. Twenty-nine different nutritionally adequate diets were fed to laboratory rats in long term studies. The basic diet included casein, lactalbumin, yeast, mineral salt mixture, hydrogenated vegetable oil, sucrose and celluflour. This diet was varied, depending on the experiment, by substituting natural foods for part of the basic diet. In one group of experiments, only the source of protein and fat was varied; white in another, the source and level of protein remained constant but the kind and level of fat were varied. Results show that even when nutritionally adequate diets are fed, differences in survival are observed. These differences are due, in part at least, to the way an animal makes use of different combinations of foods. The particular combination of foods in a diet seems to play a bigger role in the way foods are used than the individual foods being tested, the scientists learned. The importance of this interjection of foods is indicated in studies of cholesterol levels in blood serum. In the Beltsville ex-


MENARD FIRST IN GOLF TOURNAMENT
