Allen pointed out that letters have been sent out to neighboring counties requesting their cooperation in pushing the Robert Lee project to approval by the State Board of Water Engineers.



In this chemical finishing process, an extremely thin film of polumer forms on the surface of the wool fibers. Wurlan differs from most previously used chemical treatments in that it does not weaken the wool. Instead, it appears to strengthen the fibers and should provide better wearing qualities and increased durabili-

Total usefulness of any treatment or process to manufacture shrinkproof wool fabric also depends on other properties of the treated and laundered fabric. Adding shrinkproofness and laundering capability must not create undesirable fabric properties for the wearer.

These properties of wurlantreated fabrics have been deterdifferent weights, weaves, and colors of fabrics that have been treated under both laboratory and mill operating conditions:

1. Hand-the hand of fabric treated in this manner is considered good to excellent.

2. Shrinkage-yard goods have shown less than five per cent of directional shrink after continuous machine washing in 140 degree water five hours.

3. Permanence-indications are that it will last the life of the garment.

4. Colors and shades - a slight change in dye-bath necessary to compensate for the darkening effected by the wurlan treatment.

5. Permanent pleat-no problem to apple these to wurlanized fa-

6. Strength-treated fabrics are from 5 to 10 per cent stronger.

7. Wearability-laboratory tests indicate a significant improvement over untreated goods in abrasion

8. Drying—there is no essential change in the drying rate after treatment.

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

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
