Cash gifts and pledges needed to match the additional \$15,000 approved under a Hill-Burton grant are still short, Hospital Administrator R. B. Vandiver said Tues-

The additional money is needed to provide funds for an extensive expansion and remodeling program being undertaken by West Coke County Hospital District The new addition will include more patient rooms, as well as other needed facilities.

A number of persons have donated or pledged to help with raising the \$15,000, but the total is still short several thousand dollars. Vandiver urged everyone who will contribute to the fund to see him as soon as possible so the hospital board will know what to count on.

The pecan nut casebearer will be making his appearance soon. We need to start checking now for evidence of his presence. I have heard no reports of how heavy the infestations of casebearers are in South Texas.

Regardless of their situation, we need to check our trees regularly to be able to determine the local infestation.

The pecan nut casebearer lays its eggs on the young nutlets, either on the dried blossom or in on the side of the nut. Many times the egg is hidden behind the bracts of the bloom. It is about the size of a dot made by a sharp pencil, is white, turning brownish as it nears hatching. You must check closely to find them.

The egg hatches in four to six

In spraying, be sure to get the insecticide on the nut cluster. This means using enough pressure to part the leaves. Also, if a hard rain comes soon after you spray, retreat the trees.

Some people prefer to spray twice to control the casebearer. This is a good practice when the egg hatch is spread out. If you spray twice, I would make the first application when you first find some eggs and time the second application (four to five days usually) to coincide with the highest percentage hatching per-




