SUN SHINES WEDNESDAY AFTER RAINY SPELL; TOTALS UP TO 6 IN.

A sunny sky greeted Coke County residents Wednesday morning for the first really sunny weather in over a week. The rains started falling Sunday night, May 9, and this area has received some moisture almost every day since that time.

Up to six inches of rain have fallen in the west side of the county. Mountain Creek Reser-

voir filled up several days ago and has been running over the spillway at intervals.

Governor Calls Election for 78th Representative

Gov. John Connally has called a special election for June 26 in District 78 to elect a successor to Rep. Ed J. Carpenter, who died in Austin May 11.

District 78 includes the six counties of Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Reagan, Martin and Howard.

Two Big Spring men have indicated they will seek the post. One is Frank Hardesty, Howard County Democratic chairman and owner of Hardesty Drug there. The other is Roger Dale Brown, Big Spring attorney, who is with the law firm of Brown & Handy.

And I wish I could remember the expression on her face when I accidentally stepped on Kay's dress as she started down the slide. When Kay reached the bottom of the slide, her face was nearly as red as her petticoat was white.

The next year, Mrs. Eastland had the pleasure. It was in the second grade that Miss Daphne Roe arrived. She got tired of us

and left after the fourth grade, but returned in the 11th. Also, Shirley Roe joined again. She had somehow strayed away, as is her nature, during the first year. Still not satisfied, he ran off to Canada, but found out how cold it was and came back in six weeks. It seems as though everyone got discouraged. 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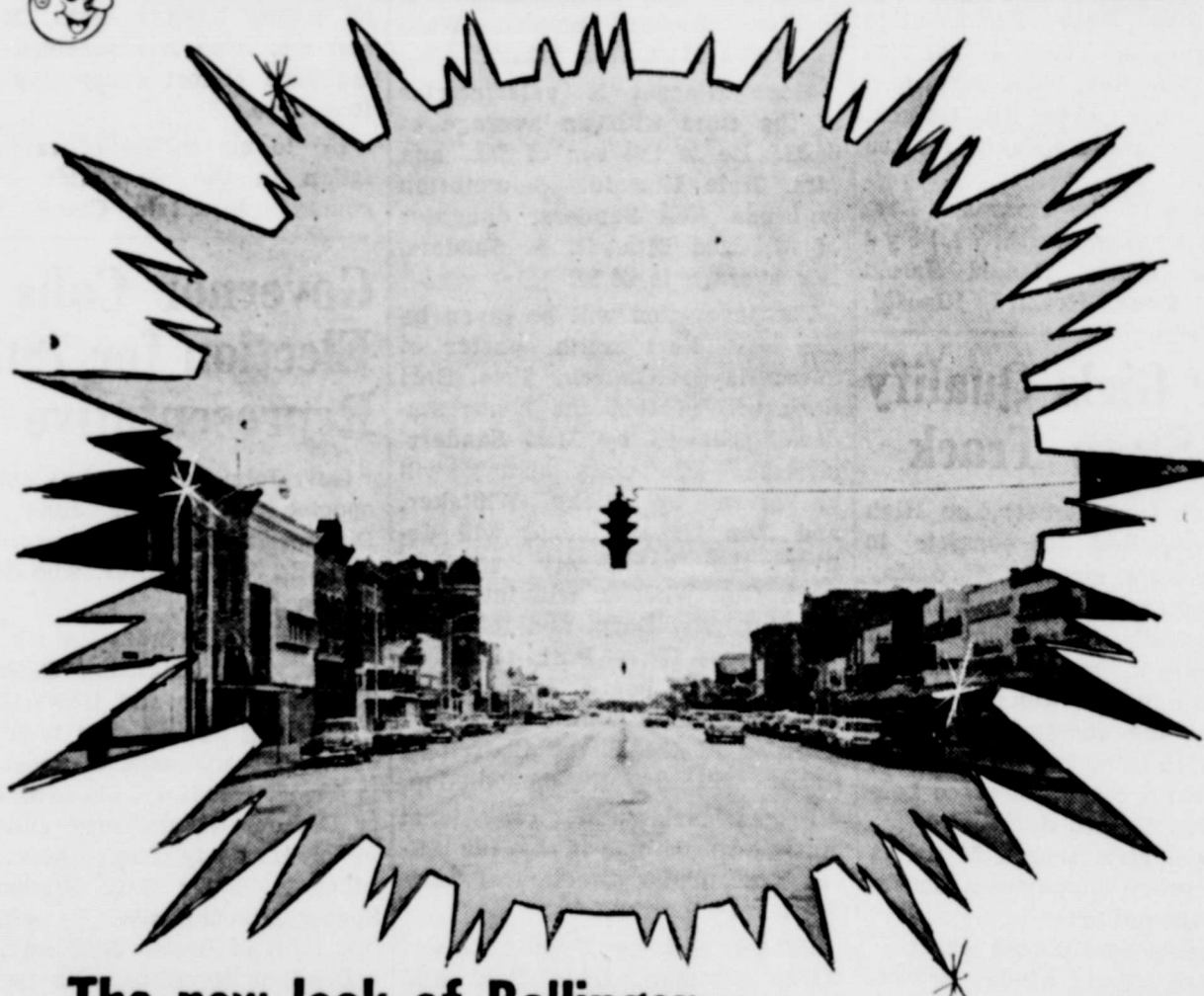
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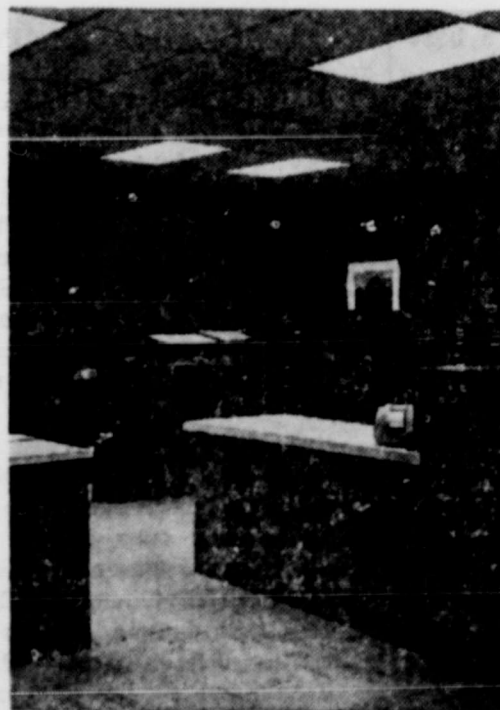

Home Economics Briefs

Many new food and non-food products on the market present a challenging if somewhat confusing choice for today's consumers. A recent nationwide analysis of chain, voluntary and cooperative supermarkets disclosed that since 1959, some 3,200 new items were offered in retail stores. During same period, some 2,100 other items were discontinued. Thus, the overall increase was at the rate of approximately 220 items each year.

How do today's families finance the college education of their children? Families and relatives are responsible for two-fifths of the student's income; another fifth comes from long-term savings—probably contributed largely by parents and grandparents; students themselves finance over a quarter of their income during

the school year and summer; and scholarships account for about one-twentieth of the students' income—and were received by about 21 per cent of the students.

County Agents News Column

We are still several days away from the ideal time to spray to control the pecan nut casebearer. I have found numerous hollow twigs and two eggs to date. John Brown of Robert Lee found one egg during the weekend. These were more than likely deposited by an "early bird" adult. Whether they were or were not, three eggs on three different trees does not provide enough information for us to make an exact recommendation on when to spray. We need to do more checking first. And it would be advisable for you to check your trees daily during the next seven to ten days.

Once we find eggs in several locations and a change from one day to the next, then we can pin point the ideal time for spraying. An educated guess, and that is all it could be based on what we have found, is that the peak hatch will be between May 24 and May 29.

If the egg laying is scattered, and it may be because of the type weather we have been having, two sprayings may be necessary to get good casebearer control. Again, based on present inadequate findings, the two applications should be made on or near May 24 and May 29.

We will continue to check for egg deposits and keep you posted as best we can. But, as we stated above, daily checks to see what changes are taking place would be the best course to follow.
