



#### Proper Laundering of Knits

There is an art to laundering knit clothing, and you can become expert in no time. Reading the labels carefully before laundering avoids wash day hazards.

When buying cotton knits, be sure they are made by a new process which compresses the fabric and makes it highly resistant to shrinkage. Wash in warm water to reduce shrinkage.

Select a low to moderate setting and do not allow cotton knits to get completely dry, as this causes shrinkage, also. Remove the garments from the dryer, then gently pat and pull into shape.






