School Starts Full Schedule Thursday

BCD Discusses Problems Which May Arise If Dam Project Is Approved

As prospects get better all the time for the approval of the Robert Lee dam on the Colorado River, members of the BCD in their meeting Tuesday discussed a number of the many problems which will confront the city if and when construction crews move in and the actual building of the big dam begins.

Mayor Robert Vaughan told the BCD members that even though the building of a dam here will be a wonderful thing for the community and area, there will be certain problems which will have to be solved by city, county and school officials.

One of the projects the mayor had to talk about was a sewer system. He said that the city commission met last Friday night in a called meeting and discussed the matter. A decision was reached to pursue the project and to

investigate any possibilities of securing federal aid for the Robert Lee project.

Vaughan said it is possible to secure as much as 50 per cent of the cost of sewer systems in small towns. He pointed out that city officials estimate it would take at least six months to apply for and secure a grant and at least another year to get the construction work done. This would make a minimum of one and one-half years if everything goes smoothly.

Vaughan said it is his opinion that, if the dam goes through, the city is going to need some engineering planning to help solve problems as they arise during the period of growth which will come with the dam construction.

Cumble Ivey Jr., president of the BCD, said he is expecting some definite decision of the approval of the dam permit in the next few days.

Officials Expect Answer Next Week on RL Dam

Apparently the time for decision on the Robert Lee dam is getting shorter all the time. The following story was printed in Tuesday's San Angelo Standard-Times. The story indicates that a deadline of Friday (tomorrow) has been set for opponents of the dam to file their comments on an amended permit prepared by the Texas Water Commission. A spokesman for the Colorado River Municipal Water District said a decision is expected by early next week.

The news release from the Standard-Times' Austin Bureau follows:

Austin — Attorneys for the many sides in the fight over Robert Lee Reservoir were mailed copies of a proposed permit amendment Monday by the Texas Water Commission.

The proposal would allow the Colorado River Municipal Water District to build a reservoir in Coke County much as it fought to do at hearings last winter.

But, an overall limitation of 73,000 acre-feet of water per year would be applied to the district's withdrawals from Robert Lee and Lake J. B. Thomas.

Attorneys were given until 5 p.m. Aug. 27, to file their com-

ments on the proposed permit draft.

The Water Commission has not yet voted to approve the amendment, but merely instructed its legal staff to draw a proposed amendment.

Ooops, We Goofed, And It Was Bad
A list of 1965 Steers which was in last week's Observer was just a little incomplete, but it didn't dawn on us until after the paper was printed.

Fortunately for the Steers, these boys have been working out and will be ready for action in the first game of the season.

After it had been redrafted twice, the commission ordered it sent out for comments.

In its present form, the draft would allow the use of 3,000 acre-feet each year for oil field water flooding from the proposed low-flow structures the CRMWD plans to build to capture salt water flowing into the Colorado River from oil field regions in the water shed.

In addition, it would allow the use of 5,000 acre-feet for oil field flooding from either J. B. Thomas or Robert Lee. This is the amount the district is already authorized to use for that purpose from Lake J. B. Thomas.

It also would permit the use of 40,000 acre-feet per year for municipal purposes for Big Spring, Odessa, Snyder and others in the area, and would carry forward the previous permit allowing 2,000 acre-feet per year for industrial purposes.

But the total diversion from the two reservoirs would be limited to 73,000 acre-feet per year. Total capacity of the Robert Lee reservoir would be 489,000 acre-feet.

The commission action came as reports were being circulated that compromise talks were underway between the CRMWD and the Lower Colorado River Authority, which opposed the CRMWD plan to move the dam site 23 miles down stream from Mitchell to Coke County. It was understood that the LCRA was obtaining an engineer's report on a suggested compromise plan this week. But both sides have refused to confirm that compromise is being discussed.

Mr. Wheeler has accepted a teaching position with the Abilene schools, where he will coach and teach P.E. at Madison Junior High School.

He, his wife and young son, Terry Joe, have recently moved to Abilene.

Vandiver said, "We really want to make this tournament something to be remembered by everyone who participates. We are asking for the cooperation of everyone to make our visitors feel welcome."



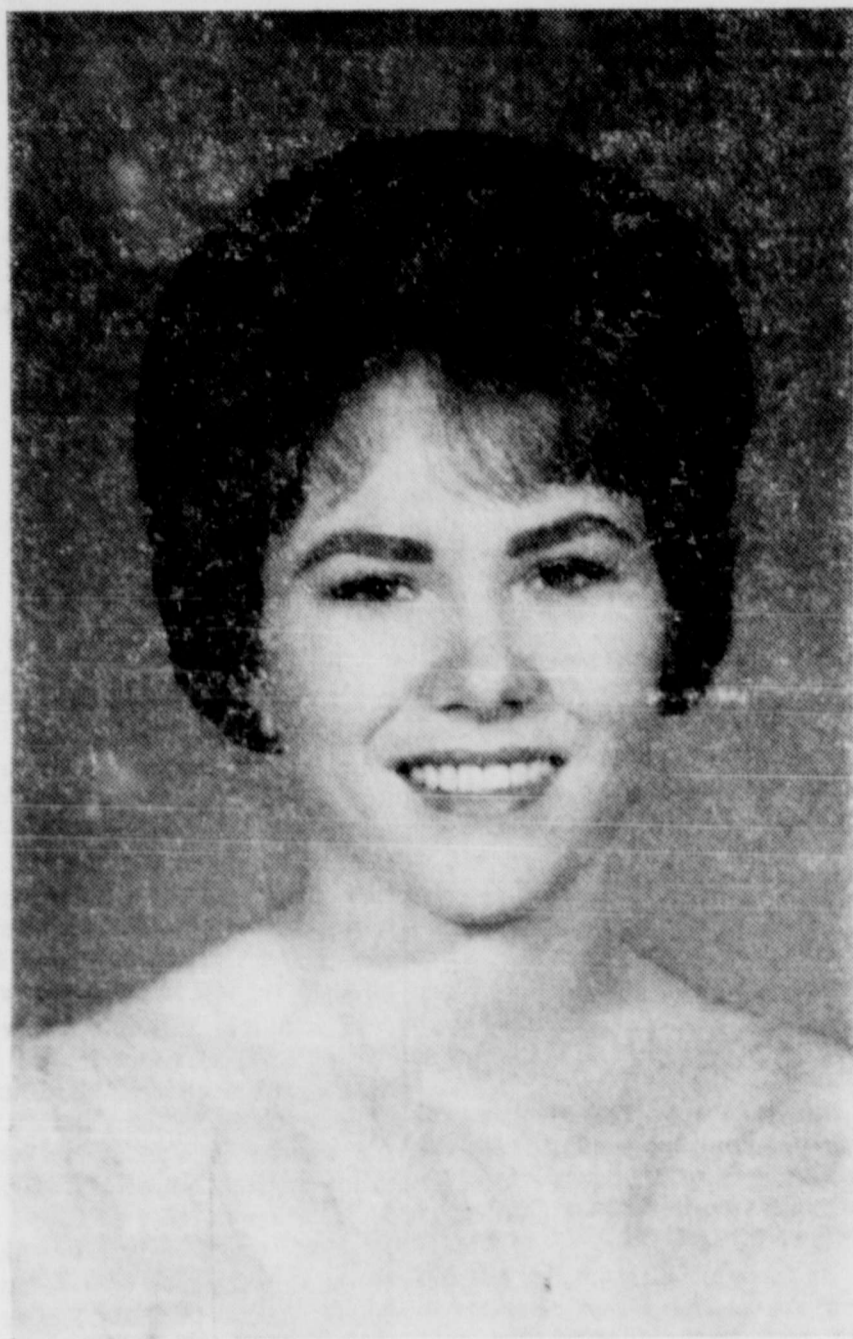
Miss Rita Tillman

FRIDAY BRIDGE ECLUB

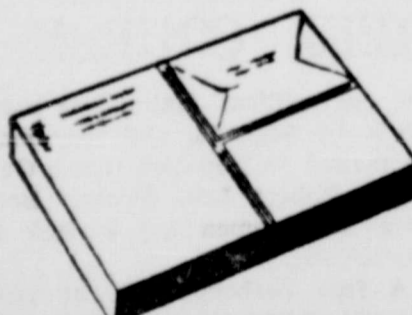

Donald W. Ellis, 20, Killed in Wreck

Donald Willard Ellis, 20 year old former Robert Lee youth, was killed in an automobile accident Tuesday near Georgetown. The son of a former Robert Lee and Silver Methodist minister, young Ellis was riding in a car with two other young men when the accident occurred. All three occupants of the car were killed.

Ellis was a former student of Silver school and transferred to Robert Lee for his last three years. He graduated in 1963. He was an outstanding sports participant here, and took part in football, track, basketball and other sports.

He was living at Seadrift with his father at the time of his death.

Funeral services will be held at 4 p.m. Thursday (today) at First Methodist Church in Junction. Hodge-Fife Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include his father, Warren Ellis, of Seadrift; his mother, Mrs. Minnie Ellis of San Angelo; three sisters, Mrs. Bobby (Anna Belle) Davis of Junction, Mrs. David Hougham of Three Rivers, and Patricia Ellis of the home in Seadrift; his paternal grandfather, B. S. Ellis of Robstown; his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Oran Pate of Llano.

RILEY CASE SETTLED

The case of John Paul Riley vs. Decco Corporation, a personal injury suit which was being tried last week in 51st District Court in Robert Lee, was settled out of court, according to Bronte relatives of the plaintiff.

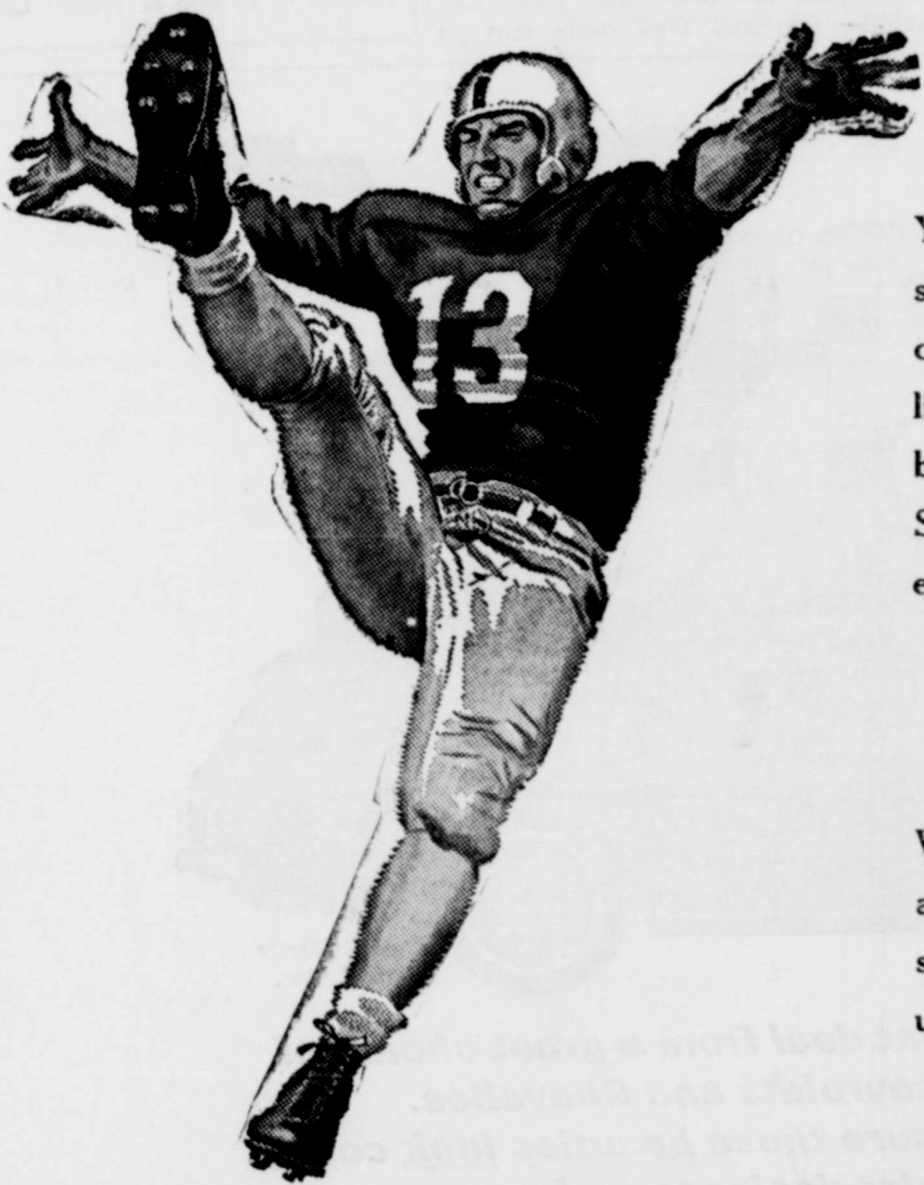

H D Agent's News Dept.

A USDA survey was undertaken to provide information on the relationship between food selection and age, health problems and food expenses of persons 65 years and older.

Persons in 283 households were interviewed. Although many older people selected a good diet, over 50 percent had diets that did not provide enough nutrients and calories recommended to insure good health. In fact, 25 percent of the diets furnished less than 66 percent of the recommendations for one or more nutrients. This included particularly calcium and ascorbic acid.

Half of the persons taking vitamin-mineral preparations had already met the recommended levels from their diets, whereas only 25 percent used vitamin-mineral preparations that supplied all of the nutrients required to supplement their food intakes to meet the recommended levels.

About 30 percent of these persons were overweight, more women than men primarily due to overconsumption of a high quality diet for their age and activity levels. Analysis of the factors that might have affected dietary adequacy indicated a close relationship between poor diets and low food expenses poor appetite and older age.

Style Goes To High School
 Junior and senior high school girls may be allowed to select their entire back-to-school wardrobes, or may have to share the responsibility with mother. But

whatever their voice may be in clothing decisions, this is the time to learn that care of clothing is a consideration every bit as important as style when making a purchase. These two basic factors of clothing selection were never more compatible than this fall.

Leading off the new fashions are the lively 'OP' designs. Knits and woven fabrics are dazzling with dots, wobbling with checks and dancing with stripes. And if such a thing were possible, knits are more popular than ever and offer unlimited washability benefits. Fashion highlights include "sweaterlings" — skinny knit sweater dresses often designed with turtle necks. Fibers range from orlon and cotton to washable wool.

It pays to practice the fine art of hang-tag reading when buying knits, to save the printed directions, and then to follow these directions when laundry time comes around.

Another notable feature of high school fashions is the coordinated look. Daughter might choose a dress with one dramatic pleat in the skirt and a bolero-type topset, or a lacy orlon herringbone sweater with a blending skirt, or a lined cotton corduroy jumper with inverted pleats and a frilly blouse. If an ensemble is to remain coordinated, the owner should realize that the separates need to be washed at the same time. This avoids wearing one piece that is obviously soiled, while its companion is fresh and clean.

Pert touches to complete the coordinated picture might include a fake fur hood that looks just like fox, and high socks that go

up to or above the knees. Some of the latest socks are splashed with checks, plaids, florals, or stripes — and some are even tassel trimmed. With all the washable school fashions available, teens should have no trouble in looking their most attractive through the entire semester.

Helpful Hints

As a unique pail to use for outdoor cleaning chores, fill your wheel barrow with hot soap or detergent suds and wheel it wherever needed.

For sun-dried hair, give yourself a pre-shampoo hot oil treatment every week. Follow this by three, instead of the customary two, shampoo latherings.

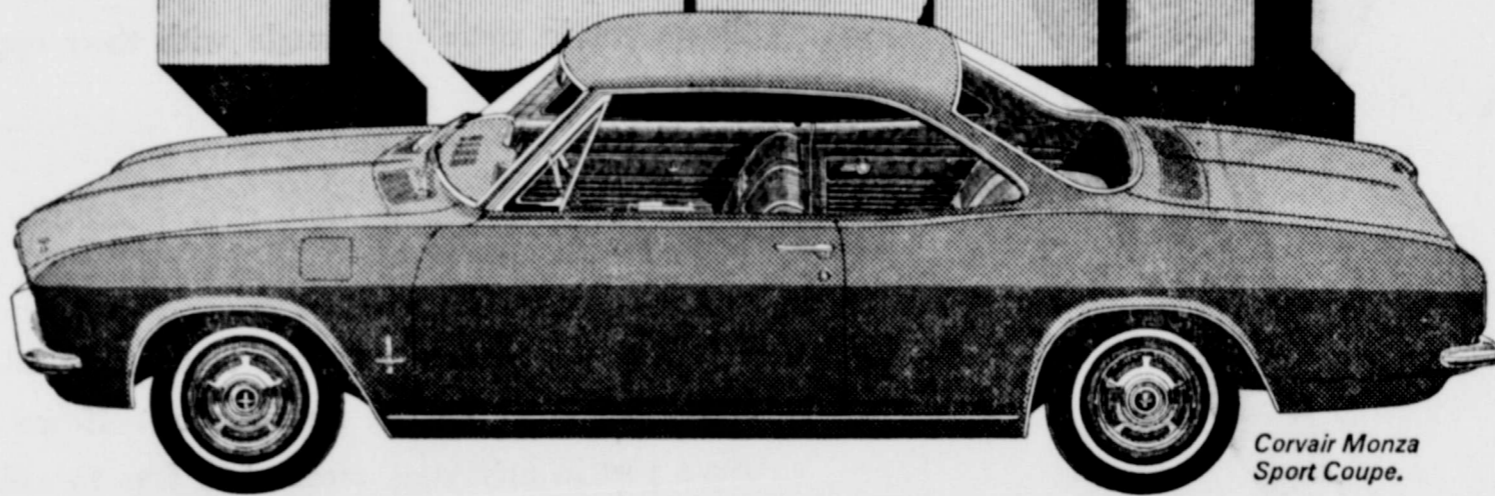

HIGHWAY WIDENING NOW BEING STUDIED

Commissioner Fern Havins told members of the BCD Tuesday at noon that interest has been shown by State Highway Department authorities in widening State Highway 158 between Robert Lee and Bronte.

Havins said if the project is pushed and a decision is reached to widen the highway, the two commissioners precincts involved, Precincts 1 and 2, will be asked to help secure the additional right of way which would be needed for the widened roadbed.
