H D Agent's News Dept.

A USDA surfey was undertaken o provide information on the re ationship between food selectoin expenses of persons 65 years and older.
Persons in 283 households were interviewed. Although many olde 50 percent had diets that did not provide enough nutrients and calories recommended to insure good health. In fact, 25 percent of the diets furnished less than 66
percent of the recommendations for one or more nutrients. This included particularly calcium and ascorbic acid.
Half of the persons taking vita-min-mineral preparations had al-
ready met the recommended leels from their diets, whereas only 25 percent used vitamin-mineral preparations that supplied all of he nutrients required to supplement their food intakes to meet the recommended levels. About 30 percent of these per sons were overweight, more wo
men than men primarily due to men than men primarily due to overconsumption of a high qual-
ity diet for their age and activitly ity diet for their age and activitly that might have of the factor adequacy indicated a close rela tionship between poor diets rela low food expenses poor appetite and older age.
