Permits Required For Employment Of Those Under 16

Austin, - Charles H. King, Jr.,
Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, reminded Texas
business men that if they expected to employ any child under the age of 16 during the approaching school term, it will be necessary for them to comply with the laws of Texas concerning the employment of Children.
King said that the "Child Labor Law" requires that any person from Sept. 1 to June 1 must keep posted on his premises a "Child Work Permit." These permits are Judge who generally fore issuing such permit wreof the child's age; that the child has completed the 7th grade in a pubcate school; a physician's certif cate that the child's health is good
or adequate; and facts to show that the child's parents are in The 58th Legislature amended the laws of Texas concerning the employment of chidaren prohibi-
ting employment of any child under the age of 14 from Septem-
ber 1 to June 1 of each year and ber 1 to June 1 of each year and
removed the exemption to the law previously given children hired in agriculture, thus bringing children hired on farms, ranches, or dairies under the provisions of the
law, unless such child is working for his parents on their own farm.
