Non-Stick Utensils Easy to Use

The newest cookware utensils have a slippery, non-stick plastic surface which makes them a joy for the homemaker to use and

Except for the tubed cake pan, all non-stick utensils should be conditioned the first time they are used by wiping with cooking oil or shortening. An occasional oiling thereafter will improve their use when they appear dry.

The use of fat in cooking is optional in top-of-range utensils. Eggs will cook without the addition of fat, but the appearance and flavor is improved when the non-stick skillet is very lightly greased.

Most meat has enough fat in itself for flavor and browning and requires no additional fat when it is cooked in a non-stick pan. Muffins lift right out of nonstick muffin cups. With cupcakes, however, it is necessary to grease the cups first.

Tender products with high sugar content, such as butter cakes, have a tendency to stick and tear unless the pans are greased first. Yeast breads and quick breads release from an ungreased nonstick pan, but the pan has to be a layer cake.

Angel food, sponge and chiffon cakes bake to the same light volume in a non-stick pan as in an cabbage and pepper plants should apple sauce or apple pie. Italian uncoated one. 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
