Steers At Jayton For District 8-B Opener

Robert Lee Steers will begin district football competition Friday night when they will go to Jayton to take on the Jaybirds. Game time for this game and all remaining games this season is 7:30 p.m.

The Jaybirds have the same season record as the Steers, one win and four losses, so the teams should

be pretty evenly matched. Jayton does have a slight edge on the Steers in points scored so far this season.

Other District 8-B games set for this weekend are Hermleigh at Bronte on Saturday, and Trent at Loraine, also on Saturday.

Loraine was the only 8-B team which played last week. The Bulldogs were downed, 6-0, by Forsan.

District Changed in '66

Announcement has been released by University Interscholastic League officials that this district will be known as 4-B next year. It was also announced that it will have two new members, Roby and Forsan. The addition will give the district seven members and will cut down on the number of non-conference games which are normally played.

The district will be in Region 1 which extends to El Paso on the west and Texline on the north.

BCD Hears Talk On Federal Loans For Small Business

Members of the Robert Lee BCD heard a talk Tuesday at noon by Owen Stinnett, a representative of the Small Business Loans Department of the federal government.

Stinnett told BCD members about economy loans for low income families. He said that plans are in the making to set up a Small Business Loans Development Center in San Angelo. The center would serve nine counties in this area with a population of more than 100,000 persons.

Purpose of the program is to assist low income families who want to better their standard of living, and business groups which want to expand. Most loans are made to small retail businesses.

One instance of assistance, cited by Stinnett, was when the Small Business Loans department furnished money for a flooded area to rebuild and repair in order to get business back to normal. The loans are made only to those persons and groups who do not qualify to obtain loans from private sources.

Stinnett said if the San Angelo center is set up, each county served will have to set up a three-man county board to pass on applications. He said he hopes the center will be in operation within a year.

Gerald C. Allen, Robert Lee bank president, told the group that area banks are in favor of the program, as the money provided will not be available from commercial banks. Allen pointed out that growth caused by the program would help the entire area, including banks.

Hugh S. Lewis Jr. told the BCD that final approval has been received for 18 low rent housing units in Robert Lee. Eight of the units will be for elderly couples and ten units for families.

Suit Dismissal Clears Way For Construction Of Dam

The last obstacle in the way of building the Robert Lee Dam on the Colorado River was officially cleared away Monday when District Judge Herman Jones of Austin entered an order dismissing the suit which had been filed by Mitchell County, Colorado City, and other cities and agencies in that county. The suit was dismissed "with prejudice", which means that it cannot be renewed. The 30-day deadline for filing suits objecting to the dam construction has already passed, so Colorado River Municipal Water District officials can see no more legal obstacles to clear before starting work on the almost half-million acre foot reservoir.

Agreement between CRMWD and the Mitchell County groups was reached last week after it was decided that Colorado City, Westbrook and Loraine will be able to purchase water from CRMWD when the need arises.

Joe Pickle, secretary of CRMWD, told this newspaper last week that

no unusual concession was given Mitchell County in exchange for the agreement to drop the suit. He said the three Mitchell County towns will pay a price for water which is practically the same as that to be paid by other users from the CRMWD lake. Also, the Mitchell County towns will have no more right to water during emergencies than their prorata share along with other towns being served.

reasonable steps to maintain its present water supply, and to build its own pipeline when it wishes to purchase water from CRMWD.

Conclusion of the argument with the neighbors to the north wound up years of planning and work to get the big dam at Robert Lee. It also will bring to a successful conclusion many years of work by Coke County residents, who have long dreamed of having a big lake on the Colorado in this county.

Old timers in this area can remember back 40 or 50 years ago when a dam on the river was being studied and planned. Periodic interest in such a project has been going on for at least that long.

Another item of interest to residents of this area is approval by Congress of a study to pump water up the Colorado from East Texas to the lake at Robert Lee, during periods of drought or heavy use. The study calls for checking the feasibility of taking surplus water from water-rich East Texas down to the lower part of the Colorado, and bringing it back up through the string of lakes along the river, and finally to Robert Lee. From here it would be released by pipe line to supply water as far west as El Paso.

'Health Inspector' Annoys Residents

A peculiar thing happened in Robert Lee Saturday.

An unidentified woman came into town and gained entrance to at least one local residence by telling its occupant that she was an inspector for the State Welfare Department. The "inspector" told the Robert Lee resident that she was sent to inspect her house for cleanliness and healthfulness by Mrs. Kenneth Lackey, registered nurse at West Coke County Hospital.

Mrs. Lackey said she knows nothing about the woman and does not appreciate the self-appointed inspector using her name to gain entrance to houses of Robert Lee citizens.

Sheriff Melvin Childress said he tried to locate the woman after learning of her escapade, but was unable to find her. He said he presumed she had left town by the time he got on her trail.

The sheriff told The Observer Wednesday that anyone who is subjected to such annoyances as this should call his office immediately and report the incident. "Anybody in Coke County should call my office or Deputy Sheriff Jesse Parker in Bronte when something like this happens."

Childress also reported that he and Robert Lee Constable Ollie Roe have had an encounter during the last couple of weeks with magazine salesmen in Robert Lee, who were not registered with the city. He said that any magazine salesman should obtain proper credentials at the city hall and then report his plans to the sheriff's office before starting a canvass of the town. The same procedure should be used at Bronte, he said, and the checking-in process done with Deputy Parker.

Mrs. Lackey was especially anxious for The Observer to make public the fact that she had nothing to do with the "Case of the Phony Health Inspector."

Approval Comes For 18 Low Rent Housing Units

Approval was received the latter part of last week for construction of 18 low rent housing units in Robert Lee. Eight of the units will be built for use by elderly couples, and ten will be for use of families.

H. S. Lewis Jr. received a letter confirming the approval. He said the next step in the projects is to work up plans and secure the land on which the houses will be located. The architect for the project is expected soon to meet with the local housing authority and work on plans for the units.

Alamo Theater Celebrates 30th Anniversary In Robert Lee

Thirty years is a good while to operate a business at the same stand, but that's what Wojtek Brothers have done. They opened the Alamo Theater for business Oct. 16, 1935.

Another unusual circumstance about the venture is that the three brothers who opened the business are all still active in its operation.

Otto, Victor and Frank Wojtek built their theatre building for a cost of \$10,000. It is made of reinforced concrete.

Information from The Observer files tell the story:

"The building has forced air ventilation, the best in sound effect, with Celotex walls and ceiling. John G. Baker of San Angelo was architect and W. E. Newton, local contractor, was the builder. The new building will seat 400 people on the main floor and balcony.

"Vitality interested in the new undertaking was their father, Frank

Wojtek, who came to America in 1887 from Czechoslovakia, and to Coke County in 1904, where he bought a farm.

"The circuit arranged for by the Wojtek Brothers includes Paramount, United Artists and Columbia films."

According to the Observer files, opening night was a big occasion, and a story stated that "this is the first time a building has ever been constructed in Robert Lee purely for the purpose of showing motion pictures."

Billed for the opening night were two features, "Two Fisted" and "Sirens of Syncopation," plus a short called "Hyp-nut-tist." On the following Friday and Saturday, "Wagon Wheels" and "Swat That Fly" were showing.

Many business firms in Robert Lee, Bronte and San Angelo ran ads in the Observer the week of the opening congratulating the Wojtek

Brothers on their new venture and wishing them success.

The three Robert Lee men branched out in November 1936 when they bought the movie theater in Bronte from a Mr. Nesmith of Ballinger. They operated the business in a building where the Bronte West Texas Utilities office is now, until 1948, when they built their new building which is still in use.

Further expansion took place in 1939 when they opened the Robert Lee Skating Rink. The formal opening was held on Thanksgiving night, Nov. 30, 1939. The new rink was 110 by 46 feet, made of maple flooring laid on sub-flooring over a concrete foundation. New equipment was purchased for the skating rink.

The three still operate all of the businesses, keeping the skating rink open one night a week and both theaters open three nights and Sunday afternoon of each week.

Anxious to lose weight?

Increase your daily activity. Take a brisk walk...work around the yard...take up bowling or another sport.

Extension Foods and Nutrition specialists say time spent in moderate activity instead of reading, watching T.V. or playing cards can help to take off extra pounds.

An overweight woman who eats just enough to maintain her weight can lose about 9 pounds in a year by substituting daily an hour of activities such as light gardening work or a brisk walk for an hour of activities she does while sitting.

If she spends a second hour in active recreation instead of sitting, she'll lose another 15 pounds a year — for a total of about 24 pounds — without a change in diet.

Eggs Are Good Protein Choice

Eggs are an excellent protein choice during October. In fact, the month has been renamed "Eggtober" to remind you of the many fine features of high quality eggs.

Many of you are aware of the versatility of eggs and their value as an important protein food. However, here are some points you may want to consider.

A high quality egg covers only a small area when broken. The white is thick and stands tall and firm around the yolk. As the storage time of egg increases, the amount of thick white decreases and the egg tends to spread and cover more surface area.

Color of the egg shell is determined by the breed of the hen. If the hens have been fed the same type of ration, the eggs will be nutritionally equivalent regardless of shell color. They will also have the same flavor, the same keeping quality and the same whipping and cooking characteristics.

The condition where shells do not peel easily from hard-cooked eggs is related to fresh eggs, generally of high quality. As eggs are stored they lost carbon-dioxide and thus shrink away from the shell, making them easier to peel when hard-cooked.

Large size grade A eggs represent the thriftiest choice now.

Popular Broiler-Fryers

Times have changed since the days when almost every farm had its own chicken flock.

Families provided their own chicken — usually reserved for Sunday dinner and other special occasions.

But with the development of today's efficient, productive poultry industry, chickens have become a regular dish for most families, with the light weight broiler the leading favorite. The popularity of the broiler-fryer has gained in momentum until it is today the largest selling type of chicken on the market.

The usual industry definition for broiler-fryer is a chicken about 9 weeks old, male or female, and under 4 pounds. This size chicken is just right for the average-size

family — and the price fits the budget.

Broilers are grown in just about every state, with many produced in our immediate area. It's a big industry. This October, our markets provide an unusually plentiful supply of broilers, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service.

For fried chicken, you may wish to utilize this recipe for "Crunchy Fried Chicken." Ingredients in-

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
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

clude ½ cup evaporated or fresh milk, 1 slightly beaten egg, 1½ teaspoons salt, ¼ teaspoon paprika, 1 cup finely crushed corn flakes, 1 frying chicken cut into pieces and 2 cups salad oil.

To prepare, combine milk and egg in a shallow dish. Blend salt, pepper and paprika with crushed corn flakes in another shallow dish.

Dip chicken pieces into milk-egg mixture, then roll in corn flakes. Heat salad oil in heavy skillet. Add chicken and brown lightly on one side for 3 to 5 minutes. Turn chicken carefully to keep coating intact.

Reduce heat and cover pan tightly. Simmer for about 30 minutes, or until thickest piece of chicken is tender. For extra crunchiness, remove cover during the last minutes of cooking. Drain chicken on absorbent toweling.

How to Suds Leather Gloves

Glove designers and manufacturers know that women want the convenience and economy of being able to keep leather gloves clean right at home. That is why they produce plenty of style, color, and price choices in gloves made of washable leathers — including pigskin, glace kid, capeskin, suede, doeskin, and chamois. So, when buying leather gloves, always look for the word "washable" stamped inside or ask the salesperson if they are washable.

Since it is easier to follow directions when you know the "reasons why," every woman who wears leather gloves should have an interest in what makes the lea-

ther so serviceable. Chrome tanning is the process usually applied in the U.S. to finish glove leathers. Used for almost 100 years, this method replaces the old vegetable tannins with chemical salts which produce a washable finish. An oil process is also widely used, and one phase of this method tans lanolin right into the leather, making it softer and easier to suds.

Once you have leather gloves known to be washable, make it a rule to suds them at the first sign of soil. They cannot be washed successfully after having been dry cleaned. The reason: leather goes through a treatment known as "fat liquoring" and some of the fats and oils thus added dissolve and disappear when dipped into a cleaning solution. That explains why leather may become harsh if washed after being cleaned. Washing care is good insurance for leather gloves because suds will not degrease them enough to cause any harm during their normal life expectancy.

Wash leather gloves as you would your hands, using warm soap or detergent suds. If they are sudsed often, surface soil will come off readily. Don't rub leather on itself; just work the suds into the leather gently, using a well-lathered sponge or fingers to "massage" special spots. When washing fancy gloves, remove gem-like buttons or pendants. Some designers sink "jewels" into thick braid so the glitter trim won't catch and scratch the leather. Highly colored leather may "bleed" a little excess dye into the wash water, but usually shows no loss of color when dry.

After gloves are sudsed clean both inside and outside, rinse them thoroughly, roll briefly in a towel, and then blow into them to inflate the fingers. Hang gloves over a towel rack or spread them flat on a turkish towel — never near heat. Perforated plastic glove frames are convenient shaping devices which can be hung for hurry-up drying.

Leather gloves should be softened by "working" them into the hands while still a little damp — imitating the easy-does-it technique professional salespeople use when fitting new gloves over the counter. If leather gloves do get completely dry before you get around to this finishing step, roll them briefly in a damp towel. They will quickly absorb enough moisture so the leather can be manipulated over the hands. Another method is to "massage" and manipulate between your fingers until it softens up.

After wearing leather gloves, use the "blow" method to puff them open and air them before putting them away. Fold the thumb inward and stretch each glove to shape while holding the fingertips with one hand and the cuff with the other. Don't roll, fold, or crease long gloves; instead, place each pair flat in drawer. For wrapping use tissue instead of plastic so the leather can "breathe" fresh air during storage.

Same Qualifications and Time Limitations As Poll Tax From October 1 to January 31.

Every person who will reach the age of 21 years after the first day of January, 1965, and before the day of a following election—shall be entitled to vote at said election and it shall not be necessary that said person shall have paid his poll tax but must obtain an exemption certificate at least 30 days prior to an election in which he offers to vote. But if they become 21 before January first, 1965, they must pay poll tax before they can vote.

Those who are 61 years of age BEFORE JAN. 1, 1966, are entitled to vote without an exemption certificate, unless they reside in a city of 10,000 or more inhabitants.

Notes From The Oil Field

The Bloodworth (5,700-foot) field of Coke County gained its third producer and a 3/4-mile southwest extension with completion of Sun Oil Co. No. 6 J. S. Walker, 16 miles northwest of Robert Lee and 1/2 mile northwest of 5,700-foot production in the Bloodworth, South (5,600 and 5,700-foot) field.

Mrs. E. G. Collins, Bronte PTA president, said the workshop was a fine success.





The association, which fosters a program for proper game management and harvesting in the county, has 76 members signed up for this year.


