Wallace Celebrates 30 Years In Food Business

Calvin Wallace has been sacking up groceries in Robert Lee for the past 30 years. He started back in 1935, during the depression, and worked for three different employers until 1955, when he went into business for himself.

Wallace started in 1935 with a job in the store operated by M. D. Fish. He stayed in this position until 1937 when he went to work for M-System, owned by Arch Lewis of San Angelo. Eleven years was the time Wallace spent with this firm, until 1948, when Earl Roberts

Kickoff Breakfast To Start Annual Boy Scout Drive

Robert Lee's Boy Scout fund drive will start Tuesday, Nov. 9, following a kickoff breakfast scheduled for 6 a.m. at Henry's Cafe. County Judge W. W. Thetford is chairman of the drive.

The drive for funds will start immediately after the breakfast and will be concluded as soon as possible, Judge Thetford said. He pointed out that money raised in this campaign is extremely important to scouting in this area, and urged everyone to make a liberal contribution.

Anyone who is interested in helping with the drive is invited to attend the breakfast, the judge said.

Thetford pointed out that money raised will be used to carry on the aims of the scouting movement: character development, citizenship training and physical fitness. Included in the services for which the money will pay are camps, office services, organizing of units, training leaders, conducting round tables, unit servicing, advancement helps, health and safety programs, professional coaching and literature.

Judge Thetford said that as many persons as possible will be contacted by workers, but that anyone who is not contacted and wishes to contribute may leave his money at the county judge's office.

Wallace's first store of his own was the rock grocery and station on the San Angelo highway. He stayed in this location until Halloween night, 1960, when he moved to his present location in downtown Robert Lee.

Before going into the grocery business 30 years ago, Wallace spent some time farming and in the construction business.

He was born and reared in Coke County, and was married in November 1924 to Miss Leona Roberts. They are parents of five children and now reside at 1024 Childress Street in Robert Lee. Wallace is a member of the Northside Church of Christ, having joined the church in 1919 when he was a young boy.

The Wallaces' children include Royce Wallace, employed by Perkins-prothro at Silver; J. C. Wallace, with the maintenance department of Sun Oil Co.; Mrs. Edna Havins, secretary at Robert Lee city hall; Miss Mildred Wallace, who is employed in the county clerk's office; Mrs. Travis Allen, who lives in Arlington, where her husband is employed by Stanolind Oil.

Among many other community projects on which he spends time, Wallace is a long time member of Robert Lee Volunteer Fire department. He has served as fire chief for six years.

4 Amendments Voted Down In Coke County

Coke Countians pretty well went along with other voters of the State of Texas in the special amendment election Tuesday. Texas Election Bureau reported Wednesday morning that five of the ten amendments voted on had passed; four had been defeated; one was still too close to be decided.

Coke County voters went against the same four that were defeated statewide and for all five which were approved statewide. Coke voters approved the undecided issue, No. 2 on the ballot.

Coke County voters turned thumbs down on four year terms

for the governor and other state officials (No. 4) and for state legislators (No. 10). They also voted down No. 9 which would have allowed an increase in salaries of the speaker of the house and lieutenant governor. The other amendment turned down was No. 7, which would have exempted certain hospital properties in the state from ad valorem tax payments.

Coke County voters approved No. 1, on financing colleges; No. 2, on increasing the veterans' land fund; No. 3, on aid to the needy; No. 5, on teacher retirement funds; No. 6, Texas opportunity plan; No. 8, on

judges' retirement.

Deer, Quail and Turkey Season Opens Nov. 13th

Hunting season in Coke County opens Nov. 13. At sunrise on that date hunters will be permitted to take deer, quail and turkey. The season closes on deer and turkey on Dec. 31 and on quail on Jan. 31.

Antlerless deer may be taken in certain designated areas in the county. A map showing these places is on display in the courthouse. Antlerless deer permits will be issued Nov. 5 at the court house. Shooting preserve licenses for land owners who lease land for hunting in Coke County may also be obtained on that date.

Three areas have been designated as open for antlerless deer. Area 1 includes a block enclosed by a line which begins two miles west of Robert Lee on Highway 158, runs to Friendship county road and back to Highway 208 and north to the county line. Also part of area 1 is enclosed by a line which starts at the west county line, runs to Union Texas Gas plant, to Farm Road 2059, to one mile north of Pecan Church. It also includes an area which runs east on the county road by Roe ranch headquarters to Highway 158.

Area 2 is in the Tennyson vicinity and is bounded on the north by Wendland lane, running east to Highway 277 and west to Highway 208. The area extends south of this line to the county line.

Area 3 is in the southwest part of the county around Water Valley. Hunters are urged to check the map at the court house when they obtain their permits.

\$3,600 Approved For Study of RL Low Rent Housing

The Public Housing Administration announced Oct. 30 a \$3,600 loan to the Housing Authority of the City of Robert Lee.

The funds, requested by the Housing Authority of the City of Robert Lee, will enable it to begin preliminary planning on its program for 18 new low-rent homes. These dwellings, to be available to low-income families at rents they can afford, will have an important role in the community's efforts to eliminate conditions associated with poverty.

Following completion of preliminary planning, the local Housing Authority will prepare and submit to PHA a program which will include a description of the proposed housing site, sketch plans, and an estimate of the total cost of the proposed housing development.

The program will serve, after its approval by PHA and upon authorization of the Housing and Home Finance Agency Administrator, as a basis for an annual contributions contract. This contract will permit the Housing Authority to proceed toward construction of the proposed housing units, which will add substantially to the local economy, and to set rentals within reach of low-income families.

Mrs. Lindy Devoll is executive director of the Housing Authority for Robert Lee.

BCD Talks of Plans, Problems

Discussions of prospects and problems which are likely to confront Robert Lee took up most of the program time at Tuesday's meeting of the BCD. Mayor Robert Vaughan commented on last week's talk by O. H. Ivey, general manager of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, as did Gerald C. Allen, chairman of the Upper Colorado River Authority.

Vaughan also discussed some details of the proposed sewer system for the city.

POST OFFICE GIVES POINTERS FOR SENDING CHRISTMAS MAIL

Last Christmas the post office handled more mail than ever before, yet the operation was the most efficient in history, postal officials said. Nationally about 99 per cent of the Christmas mail reached its destination before Christmas Eve.

ZIP code use and cooperation of the public in mailing early were the main reasons for this success, they said and they hope with the same or better cooperation this year an even greater volume will be handled with less effort than last year.

Following are some pointers by the Post Office Department which

will help mailers prepare for the upcoming mailing season:

Up date last year's address list and include ZIP codes.

Prepare a gift list as soon as possible. Shop early to take advantage of full stocks. Be sure to have on hand enough shipping materials: boxes, tape, wrapping paper, etc.

Use first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded if the recipient has moved or that undeliverable cards will be returned if a return address is on the envelope.

Poorly wrapped and loosely packed cartons are the major cause of parcel post damage. Use strong cartons or heavy paper and use plenty of heavy tape or twine. Use stuffing material to fill up empty spaces in your packages.

Make an effort to write all addresses as clearly as possible and mail often, not waiting until the last minute to deposit all your gifts and greetings.

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Borrow to buy that new tractor, combine, baling machine or fencing material.

The eggs also contain approximately ten times as much calcium, and about the same amount of thiamine and riboflavin. Vitamin A is found in eggs, but not in the sirloin.

Nutritious eggs served by themselves make a delicious main course for any meal, or they may be used in a variety of beverages; in salads, salad dressings, sandwiches and appetizers. They're also good in combination with meats, vegetables and cereals, and as an ingredient in a wide assortment of desserts.

Today's market has an abundant supply of eggs. These are available to the homemaker at a low price when compared to equal amounts of meat and other high-quality foods.

Physical Activity & Heart Attacks

A male leading a physically active life has a two to three times better chance of surviving a heart attack than his less active counterpart. He also has a much better chance of escaping the attack in the first place.

These were among the conclusions from a statistical study conducted by a New York health insurance firm. The study related physical activity to mortality in the four weeks following a first heart attack.

The study, which covered 55,000 men subscribers to the health insurance plan, attempted to determine the effects of leisure time physical activity as well as that on the job.

The most marked survival advantage identifiable in the study was the level of physical activity engaged in before the attack. Mortality among men classified as "most active" was 17% and "less active", 49% during the first four weeks.

The relationship between physical activity and heart attack mortality is a growing concern for many because of the sedentary life pattern developing as a consequence of technological changes both at home and on the job.

Automation, automobile transportation, power tools, elevators and even electric toothbrushes are reducing the amount of physical effort engaged in during a normal day.

November is "Turkey Month"

November in the United States traditionally has been "Turkey Month." Turkey Month 1965 will be just that, for turkeys are plentiful.

Also termed plentiful this month are onions, cabbage, rice, split peas and sweet potatoes, as well as

apples, prunes, and frozen concentrated orange juice.

Potatoes, onions and rice all are scheduled to be on hand in abundance, reflecting record crops. The fall potato chop is estimated at 20.9 billion pounds, 22 percent above last fall, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Production of late summer onions for storage is set at over 20 billion pounds.

Better than average split pea supplies this November should make excellent low-cost food buys, while cabbage is expected to be in better supply than last year — about 8 percent more.

Apple production this year is expected to rank second largest since 1949, with a total commercial crop estimated at 133.2 million bushels.

And with USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service adding prunes and frozen orange juice to the list of plentiful foods, lots of good fruit and fruit juice buys should be in the offing.

Food shoppers also will find sweet potato stocks well above last year. In fact this year's crop is expected to run about 200 million pounds more than in 1964.

So for wise November shopping, shop plentiful foods.
