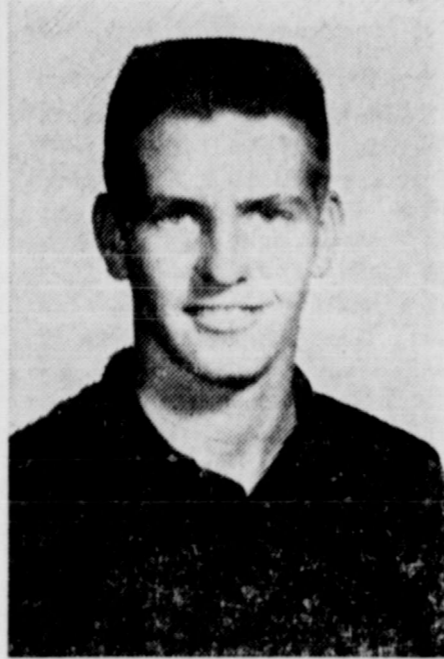

BCD Making Plans For Annual Christmas Party

The BCD met Tuesday at noon with 17 members present. Among the topics of discussion was the annual Christmas party sponsored by the organization. A committee made up of J. E. Quisenberry, Bill Allen and W. D. McAdams was appointed to get plans underway. The party will be held in the next few weeks.

A letter from Col. Homer Garrison, head of the Texas Department of Public Safety, was read. The letter was in answer to a letter directed to Garrison from Sterling Lindsey, secretary of the BCD, requesting that a highway patrolman be stationed in this area. The reply stated that nothing can be done about the matter until September 1966. Garrison said he would give the matter his earnest consideration.

Supt. Jim Bickley reported to the

BCD on a school board meeting held last Tuesday night in which the trustees discussed needed improvements in facilities and teaching staff. The group talked about the federal aid which has been allocated and how to put it to the best use for improving instructional standards at the school.

Bickley said board members would like to have some idea of the sentiment of the school's patrons and other taxpayers before they make any concrete plans for a building program or other major improvements. He said the board suggested a petition supporting improvements and signed by those who are willing to go along with plans for meeting the school's needs.

The BCD voted to sign a petition giving the board its support in going ahead with planning to make needed improvements. It was pointed out that the petition has no legal status for calling an election. It is merely to let the school board know the feelings of the signers. If a bond election becomes necessary, it will have to be called by another petition and then voted on, Bickley said.

It was also announced that Silver Lions Club at its last meeting discussed the possibility of forming a club in Robert Lee, since so many of the members will be moving from Silver because of the closing of the Sun Camps. A large number of the Silver club members are planning to move to Robert Lee.

Last Week's Meeting

Last week's BCD meeting, which was not reported because the Observer was printed early, featured a talk by State FFA President Kenneth Graeber of Brenham. He was a special guest of the BCD, along with vocational agriculture teacher, Leroy McDaniel, and local FFA president, Robert Wink.

Graeber spoke on youth of today and their place in society. He said that young people need to be given an incentive as well as an opportunity for accomplishment. He said that beatniks and other odd ball groups of his generation are simply out for attention. The young youth leader said that now is the time when all Americans should re-evaluate their blessings.

R. B. Vandiver, West Coke County Hospital administrator, said work on the hospital construction job is going along at a rapid pace and on schedule.

CRMWD Directors Discuss Lake Problems

The Colorado River Municipal Water District is oiling machinery for its anticipated lake project at Robert Lee.

Tuesday of last week directors authorized its rate committee to propose a tentative rate to the City of Midland. They also executed a contract for engineering services and authorized the president, Charles B. Perry, Odessa, to secure a fiscal agent for the impending revenue bond issue to finance the project.

In developing a rate to advance to Midland, the committee will follow the rate formulas under the indenture, plus some surcharge to be determined.

Freese, Nichols & Endress, Fort

Worth firm which has done all the engineering for the district since its inception, was awarded a contract to prepare plans and specifications and supervise construction of the lake project at Robert Lee. The fee is stipulated at 5 per cent of contract construction, plus some expense of supervision. O. H. Ivie, general manager for CRMWD, estimated that the over-all figure would be about 5.9 per cent.

S. W. Freese urged that the district resolve some factors as rapidly as possible in order to expedite the project. One is to determine if and to what extent Midland will participate; another is the cost of protecting 32 oil wells in the lake basin; still another is the cost of relocating about eight miles of the Robert Lee-Sterling City highway.

Ivie reported that Ken Esmond & Associates of Odessa had completed about one-third of the surveying on the lake area and that George Thompson, Sweetwater, had started land appraisals. The board adopted a resolution authorizing the purchase of land, clearing the way for first negotiations within a week or two.

In other matters, the board approved a request by Standard Oil Company for 420,000 gallons additional water daily for its repressuring project in eastern Howard and Mitchell Counties, but only as water, in the opinion of the board, is available. Standard currently contracts for 1,470,000 gallons daily.

The trustee was authorized to purchase the district's 1963 bonds with the residue of \$33,500 from the 1958 construction fund.

A personnel policy, adopting the unwritten practices now in effect, was adopted by the board.

Ivie was instructed to write a letter to the Odessa Chamber of Commerce reviewing the rates for raw water to the City of Odessa for the past five years, and implying that the district would take care of an Atomic Energy Commission installation needs within this approximate price range. Odessa is one of the 85 cities in the nation under consideration for designation as a site for a huge atom smasher the AEC plans to construct. An estimated five to six million gallons of water per day would be required.

County Agents News Column

The first frost for most of the county came during the week — approximately twenty days behind the average date for the first killing frost.

We have had several inquiries about grazing frosted fields. In answer to the questions — no two fields or situations are the same. We can say, however, that plants of the sorghum group and some other grass plants are noted for their ability to produce a deadly poison when the plants are frost bitten. The plants in this group are usually more dangerous when partially killed, but make some regrowth. Also, frosted fields can be safely grazed as soon as the plants dry up or in about a weeks time.

Under normal conditions sudan grass can be safely pastured. During the fall or winter when sudan is stunted by a light frost, there is a possibility of prussic acid formation in sudan, also. Cane, hegari, the other sorghums and Johnson grass seem to be the worst offenders.

We received some interesting soil information recently. Soil texture has much to do with cotton's utilization of irrigation and rain water, recent studies in Texas show.

Dr. C. J. Gerard and L. N. Nanken, association soil physicist and soil scientist, respectively, at the Lower Rio Grande Valley Research and Extension Center near Weslaco, have conducted experiments which show that water management requirements of cotton depend on soil texture and related rooting characteristics of the plants.

On medium-textured soils, cotton develops an extensive root system able to extract water to depths of 4 to 5 feet. Moisture depletion patterns on fine-textured soils indicate

that soil moisture extraction is largely restricted to the soil's upper 2 feet.

Summer rainfall often supplies enough water to produce 80 to 90 percent of cotton yield potential on medium-textured soils. On the other hand, rainfall provides water for only about 50% of yield potential on fine-textured soils.

The operator who still figures he can walk across a field or pasture and determine its fertilizer needs can't expect top yields. There are too many factors in determining soil fertility that can't be detected by the eye.

That's where the soil testing laboratory comes into the picture. Soil scientists have a knowledge of the amount of nutrients removed from the soil by a given yield on a crop. By making certain soil tests they can determine how much of the crop's needs can be supplied from the soil and how much must be supplied through fertilizer application.

Alert farmers test their soil before planting to determine its ability to supply the necessary nutrients for top yields. If the soil test shows the soil is short on a certain nutrient, fertilizer of the recommended kind can be applied before deficiencies show up in the crop and yield is reduced.

Low production means a higher per unit cost and less potential profit while high yields have the opposite effect upon crop production.

Soil testing is a necessary part of today's agriculture. Maximum yields produced at the lowest per unit cost are a must and the basis for both is a fertile soil.

Favorite Holiday Foods

December ushers in the busiest season of the year for most homemakers.

One way to save time — and money — is to shop with the plentiful foods list of the U. S. Department of Agriculture as your guide to budget buying.

When foods are seasonally plentiful, you have a broader selection of color, size and quality. But what's more important, they usually wear the most favorable price tags.

Topping the December plentifuls are pecans — a favorite of most chefs because they add elegance, texture and flavor to stuffings and sauces as well as to desserts, salads and entrees.

There is a bumper pecan crop despite the heavy toll taken by Hurricane Betsy along the Gulf coast.

Also, December promises plenty of apples, oranges and frozen orange juice as well as onions and cabbage, peanuts and peanut butter.

Apple production is about 9% above the 5-year average with peak shipments moving to market now.

Both Texas and Florida citrus groves have recovered from the freeze damage of several years ago, so their orange shipments will be much larger. Total orange crop is expected to run about 13% larger than average.

The late summer onion crop set a new record and cabbage production is the largest since 1956.

December marketings of turkeys are expected to be larger than last year with prices little changed. Increased broiler production points toward heavy offerings and attractive prices.

Frozen Concentrated Orange Juice

Why not highlight your holiday and everyday menus with the sweet, cool goodness of frozen orange juice concentrates?

Try this "make-ahead" salad that lends a pretty touch to buffet meals.

Use thawed orange juice concentrate as the liquid when preparing unflavored gelatin. Chill until slightly thickened. Then fold in your favorite combination — diced unpared apples, diced celery and chopped pecans ... diced pared pears and seeded Flame Tokay or Emperor grapes ... diced cooked chicken, diced celery and chopped green pepper ... shredded raw carrots and pineapple tidbits. Pour mixture into a star, ring or any other fancy shaped mold and chill until firm. Serve atop crisp greens with orange juice-sparked mayonnaise.

Orange-cranberry relish accents turkey entrees in the most delightful way. Put 2 cups fresh cranberries and 1 unpeeled apple through the food chopper, then add 1 cup sugar. Soften 1 package unflavored gelatin in ½ cup thawed orange juice concentrate. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until gelatin dissolves. Remove from heat and stir in ½ cup thawed orange juice concentrate and then add the apple-cranberry mixture. Pour into 5 individual molds or in one 4-cup mold and chill until firm.

COOKIE RECIPES

Everyone seems to be hunting for new ideas for Christmas goodies at this time of the year. I am including two recipes for cookies, one is refrigerator cookies and the other is a bar cookie. The refrigerator cookie recipe is one of my favorite recipes as its been in my family for a number of years. The Hello Dolly recipe was among ones handed out during the State Fair in Dallas in October. I like it because its quick and easy to do.

Ice Box Cookies

Melt 1 lb. butter; mix with ½ cups brown sugar, 3 well-beaten eggs, 2 cups chopped pecans, ½ cups white sugar, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1 tsp. soda, juice of ½ lemon, 6 cups flour. Mix and

shape in rolls and put in refrigerator for 24 hours, before baking. When ready to bake, slice very thin. Place on lightly greased cookie sheet and bake 10-12 minutes at 375 degrees. The dough will keep 1-2 weeks in refrigerator and for several weeks in the freezer. Wrap in foil or regular moisture-vapor proof freezer paper if put in freezer.

"HELLO DOLLY"

- 1 stick butter or margarine
- ½ box graham crackers (about 2 scant cups of crumbs)
- 1½ cups coconut
- 1½ cups chopped pecans

1 large package chocolate chips
1 can condensed milk
Mix butter or margarine with graham cracker crumbs to form crust. Place crust evenly in the bottom of 10" x 14" pan. Mix coconut, pecans, and chocolate and spread over the crust. Dribble milk over the entire mixture. Bake at 350°F for 25 to 30 minutes.

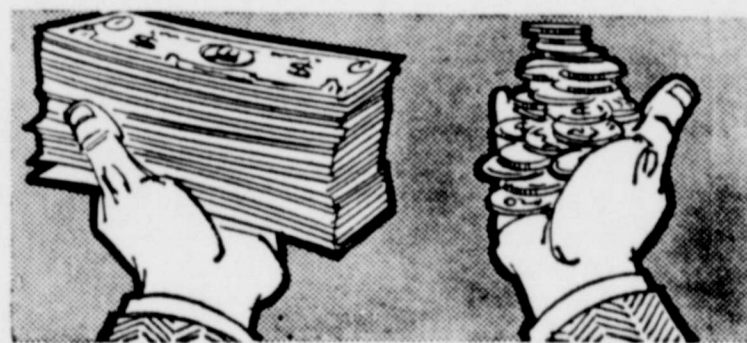



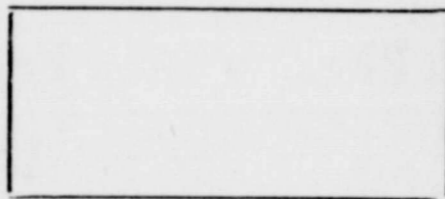

Purpose of Federal Money Set Forth In Recent Letter

A letter from Leon R. Graham, Assistant Commissioner for Administration of the Texas Education Agency, dated November 12, stated: "This is to advise that we are approving the Title I application for the Robert Lee Independent School District in the amount of \$14,624, effective Oct. 25. An approved copy of the application will be sent to you as soon as possible." Amount of the grant entitlement was determined by the number of pupils from families with an income of less than \$2,000, as shown on the 1960 Federal Census.

Each school must submit a project proposal to the Texas Education Agency for approval to qualify for the funds. The project should concentrate on one area to help the educationally deprived. The brief descriptive title of Robert Lee's

project is "Enrichment and Expansion of Skills in Reading and Closely Related Skills in English Communication." The money appropriated will be spent for equipment, materials, and salaries for teacher helpers or aides.

Application for a teacher aide position may be made at the Superintendent's Office. The people who are finally selected must be cooperative in spirit, interested in children and their opportunities through education, be able to read

well. Typing and special talents in fine arts will be important factors in making selections of teacher aides.

Duties will vary and will include checking attendance, clerical work, some grading, typing and local production, playground duty, and anything else that will allow the teacher more time for planning and more time for individual and small group teaching.
