

We have had several inquiries about grazing frosted fields. In answer to the questions - no two fields or situations are the same. We can say, however, that plants of the sorghum group and some other grass plants are noted for poison when the plants are frost bitten. The plants in this group are usually more dangerous when partially killed, but make some regrowth. Also, frosted fields can be safely grazed as soon as the plants dry up or in about a weeks time.

Topping the December plentifuls are pecans - a favorite of most chefs because they add elegance, texture and flavor to stuffings and sauces as well as to desserts, salads and entrees.

There is a bumper pecan crop despite the heavy toll taken by Hurricane Betsy along the Gulf coast. Also, December promises plenty of apples, oranges and frozen orange juice as well as onions and cabbage, peanuts and peanut butter.

Apple production is about 9% above the 5-year average with peak shipments moving to market now.

Both Texas and Florida citrus groves have recovered from the freeze damage of several years ago, so their orange shipments will be much larger. Total orange crop is expected to run about 13% larger than average.

The late summer onion crop set a new record and cabbage production is the largest since 1956.

December marketings of turkeys are expected to be larger than last year with prices little changed. Increased broiler production points toward heavy offerings and attractive prices.

Soften 1 package unflavored gelatin in 1/2 cup thawed orange juice concentrate. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until gelatin dissolves. Remove from heat and stir in 1/2 cup thawed orange juice concentrate and then add the apple-cranberry mixture. Pour into 5 individual molds or in one 4-cup mold and chill until firm.

Everyone seems to be hunting for new ideas for Christmas goodies at this time of the year. I am including two recipes for cookies, one is refrigerator cookies and the other is a bar cookie. The refrigerator cookie recipe is one of my favorite recipes as its been in my family for a number of years. The Hello Dolly recipe was among ones handed out during the State Fair in Dallas in October. I like it because its quick and easy to do.
