## Devoll Boys' Sheep Mutilated By Dogs

Ronnie and Donnie Devoll, the 16-year-old twin sons of Mr. and Mrs. Lendy Devoll, were heavy winners at the Coke County Junior Livestock Show last week. But their hopes for winning further in the show rings this year have been blasted. Loose dogs, on a rampage, got into their sheep pen and mutilated the lambs during the weekend.

## Jan. 31, Deadline For Paying Poll And Other Taxes

There's not much time left to pay 1965 taxes, without paying a penalty. Jan. 31 ends the regular tax-paying season for state and county, city and school taxes, and that day is the last for securing a poll tax receipt.

County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs said Monday his office had sold only 406 poll tax receipts, but "we're expecting to sell about five hundred more between now and Jan. 31."

A new federal constitutional amendment forbids the poll tax requirement as a prerequisite for voting in national elections, but the \$1.75 tax is still required for all those between 21 and 60 who wish to participate in state, county and local elections.

### Deputy at Bronte

A deputy from Jacobs' office will be at First National Bank in Bronte three days next week, Jan. 26, 27 and 28 to write poll tax receipts. Jacobs urged prospective voters in the area to take advantage of the temporary tax office in the bank. State and county taxes will not be collected by the deputy he said.

Persons living on the west side of the county and any one else who wishes, may buy a poll tax receipt as well as pay state and county taxes in Jacobs' office during regular office hours. The office is open Monday through Friday.

School and city officials pointed out that taxes for their respective agencies become delinquent on Feb. 1 and penalty and interest will be charged after the Jan. 31 deadline.

showed the Grand Champion fine wool lamb, a Rambouillet, which won the Breeder's Trophy for their grandfather, William "Bill" McCutchen.

Both the Grand Champion and the Reserve Champion Southdown were badly torn by the dogs — the reserve champion so badly that it is doubtful that he can survive. The grand champion fine-wool lamb was also torn but not so severely as the others.

The Devoll twins showed 19 lambs, and they sold two of them at the show. They were still caring for the other seventeen in their feeding pen on the edge of the county park. Twelve lambs were cut up — nine of them badly enough to require stitches to close the wounds.

"There is no way to assess the loss accurately," said Mrs. Devoll. "The boys have been feeding lambs since they were nine years old — this being their seventh year." During this time they have won eight Grand Champion banners, seven Reserve Champion banners, and about 100 ribbons on their sheep. Mrs. Devoll said they had something close to \$1,000 in the sheep, having paid \$40 to \$50 per head to begin with.

She said, "They were planning to show the lambs at the Houston Stock Show about the first of March." The potential earnings in prize money and sales at the show, make it impossible to estimate the loss. We are just sick! Lendy and I are taking it harder than the boys."

Gene and Linda McDaniel also had 14 lambs in the pen. Six of the 14 were cut up, including the grand-champion cross-bred lamb. Three of the McDaniel lambs were torn badly enough to require stitches.

## SNOW, SLEET, RAIN COVER COKE COUNTY

Some snow was still on the ground Wednesday after Coke County and the surrounding area received its first snow of the season during the first part of this week.

The snowfall began Monday and continued at intervals through Tuesday night. Measurement was just about impossible, since the mercury hovered right around the freezing mark or slightly above, and a good part of the wet white stuff melted soon after falling.

Some rain and sleet also fell along with the snow, and added enough moisture to do some good for small grain fields.

Highways in the north part of the county were frozen over early Tuesday morning and driving was extremely hazardous for a few hours. A warmup Tuesday, however, melted snow and ice on roads. Highway Department crews have been busy most of this week keeping bridges sanded, as a precaution against slippery ice.

The forecast issued for Wednesday said the cold, cloudy weather would continue into Thursday, with occasional light drizzle. Colder weather was predicted for the end of the week.

Deposits on the last day of 1965 amounted to \$2,370,420.00, compared to \$2,338,426.75 a year before. This is an increase of \$31,993.55. The increase is also up some \$167,000 over the amount on deposit at the last call of the bank on Oct. 13, 1965, when \$2,202,909.33 was on deposit.

Loans were also up from over a year ago. The loans and discounts account at the bank amounted to \$1,101,790.64 on Dec. 31, 1965, compared to \$1,062,994.47 on Oct. 13, 1965, and \$1,028,291.42 a year previously. The figures indicate a loan increase during 1965 of \$73,509.22.

Total assets of the bank during 1965 increased \$36,236.85 from \$2,499,346.02 on Dec. 31, 1964, to \$2,535,582.87 on Dec. 31, 1965. The total at the previous call in October was \$2,384,048.74.

The bank's capital accounts were increased \$4,243.60 during the past year, from \$160,919.27 to \$165,162.87. The increase was in the undivided profits account.

President of the bank is Gerald C. Allen, Bill Allen is vice president and Willis Wayne Smith is cashier. Directors are the two Allens, Smith, Cumbie Ivey Sr., Willie I. Tubb, Vaughan S. Davis and Victor Wojtek.

Last year's first tourney, which was played on the Mountain Creek course at Robert Lee, netted \$226 for the March of Dimes. Coke County golfers hope to do as well this year in raising money to help children with birth defects and others who receive aid from the National Foundation.

The tournament will be a partnership low ball affair. In addition to the golfing scheduled for the day, a barbecue supper will be held. The \$3 entry fee includes a ticket to the supper. Persons who do not participate in the tournament may attend the barbecue for \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students.

Tournament Director Lee urged everyone in Coke County who is interested in golf to enter the tournament, for "a day of fun on the course and a real tasty meal after the competition is over."

# PAY YOUR POLL TAX

## ATTORNEY GENERAL OUTLINES POLL TAX PROBLEM IN TEXAS

Attorney General Waggoner Carr today urged all Texans who will be eligible to vote in this year's elections to obtain their poll tax before the January 31st deadline.

In some counties the number of persons qualifying to vote is below normal. Some attribute this to the fact that there is some confusion on the part of many Texans as to whether a poll tax must be paid this year because of the recent lawsuit attacking this requirement.

Carr called attention to the fact that the Judges of the Federal District Court hearing the case involving the validity of the Texas Poll tax law, have recommended that Texas voters comply with the present law, because the lawsuit is not likely to be finally decided before January 31st, which is the deadline for poll tax payment.

Carr listed the following four rules for obtaining poll tax receipts and exemption certificates to qualify for voting in elections held between Feb. 1, 1966 and Jan. 31, 1967.

1. In order to vote in any primary, general or special election for the nomination or election of any State or local offices, or to vote in any election on a question or proposition, persons not exempt from payment of the poll tax must

do so by January 31, 1966.  
2. Persons over 60 years of age on Jan. 1, 1965, are exempt from paying the poll tax. However, an exemption certificate must be obtained by Jan. 31, 1966.

3. Persons who were under 21 on Jan. 1, 1965, but who will be 21 years of age by the election date, or who were not residents of Texas on Jan. 1, 1965, but will be so by election date are not subject to the payment of the poll tax. However, they must obtain an exemption certificate. This certificate can be obtained at any time throughout the year. But, in order for the holder to vote, it must have been issued at least 30 days prior to any election.

4. Persons eligible to register and who have not paid for a poll tax or obtained an exemption certificate to vote in any primary, general or special election for nomination or election of members of the United States Congress, may do so by obtaining a special poll tax receipt (issued without payment of the tax) by January 31, 1966. This is a registration certificate and qualifies anyone to vote for Federal offices. The County Tax Collector marks the receipt with the notation "Poll Tax not paid."

## ELDON MAHON ANNOUNCES AS CANDIDATE FOR U. S. CONGRESS

Eldon Mahon, Abilene attorney and former district attorney and district judge, announced Wednesday that he is a candidate for congress from the newly reconstructed 17th congressional district, which now includes Coke County.

In a telephone conversation Wednesday, he said he would issue a formal statement of his candidacy at a later date.

The candidate is a native of Lorraine in Mitchell County and is a former county attorney of that county. He served 16 years as district attorney and district judge. He is now a member of the Abilene law firm, Mahon, Pope and Glandon. He is also owner of Radio Station KVMC in Colorado City.

He has been active in civic activities for many years and is presently a member of the Lions Club, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and is president of the District Attorney and Judges Association of Texas. In 1957 he was selected by the Texas Law Enforcement Agency as one of the five outstanding prosecutors in the state. He is a Methodist and is presently serving on the board of McMurry College.

Mahon is a graduate of McMurry and of the University of Texas Law School.

Mahon is married and the father of three children, two teen-age daughters and a son, 10.

Mahon said on the phone Wednesday, "I am running on the Democratic ticket for I'm a Democrat with no apologies to anyone."

## TIPS FOR INDOOR GARDENERS

To stay healthy, house plants need an adequate supply of warm water — not cold water which may chill or even shock them. Most plants should be thoroughly soaked once a week, but never over-watered.

It is important to know each plant's preference regarding sunlight and temperature. In general, foliage plants thrive between 60 and 70 degrees and should not be "roasted" near a radiator in winter. Fertilize plants at regular intervals, and provide for proper drainage and soil aeration.

Cleanliness is vital because plants breathe through tiny pores which lace their leaves. If these become clogged, plants wither and die. Thus dust and soot should be removed and the easiest and best method is with soap and water. Washing leaves gently helps a plant to maintain both its health and luster.

If the plant is reasonably sturdy, put it into a sink or tub of tepid soapsuds. To protect the soil, first cut a piece of plastic to fit the top of the pot — allowing an inch of overhang. Slash this plastic to the center, fit it around the plant, and fasten it around the edge of the pot with an elastic band. Upend the plant and swish it gently through the suds until clean, then rinse it the same way.

When leaves are broad and not too dense, they can be washed individually. Dip a sponge or soft cloth in warm soapsuds and wash both sides of every leaf, supporting it from underneath with one hand. Rinse with a fine spray of clean water, or with a sponge or cloth wrung out of clear water. When stems are long and there is danger of breakage, or if the plant is in bloom, leaves must be sudsed individually instead of being immersed. After washing, some plants—such as African Violets—should be kept out of sunshine until the leaves are completely dry.

If foliage is very fragile, spray soapsuds over it with an atomizer; then spray-rinse the same way. This technique is especially good for loosening sooty mold which often attacks sensitive gardenia plants. Once foliage is clean and dry, a commercial plant polish may be applied evenly over each large leaf — or may be sprayed over tiny leafed plants from an aerosol dispenser.

### Insects and Bacteria

Don't wait until house plants are infested with insects or bacteria before doing something about this problem. A weekly bath in sudsy water is the recommended method for controlling these annoying pests. Place the plants in a sink or bathtub and wash all exposed areas with suds, using a soft flat paint brush about an inch long. Make sure no bugs are lodged in the joints of the branches, then spray with clear water.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture affirms a need for washing by stating: "It doesn't always take an insecticide to rid house plants of insects and other pests. Sometimes a bath will do the trick. Washing with soapy water and a soft brush (or cloth) may be all that's needed to remove aphids, mealybugs, and scale insects from broad leaved plants.

This pest-removal treatment can be supplemented by using a tooth pick with cotton and dipped into soapsuds to lift them away. Or

scrape insects off of sturdy leaves with an old tooth brush dipped into sudsy water.

### Container Care

Porous or glazed flower pots reused repeatedly for planting, transplanting or decorating must be kept clean and scale-free. They need to be scrubbed thoroughly and often with hot suds — for good appearance, and also because dirt residue often contains disease "bugs" or insects that destroyed the previous plant. If left-over soil is not washed out, it remains to re-poison new soil and damage the plant.

Use a stiff bristled or wire brush, well-lathered, to wash the pots and their saucers. Very dirty pots may need to be soaked for a few hours in a pail of hot suds to loosen

caked earth or the white film which insecticides or fertilizers sometimes deposit on porous clay surfaces. Some experts suggest adding ½ cup of bleach to the suds. Rinse several times, and line the flowerpots up in the sun to dry.

House plants should be transplanted occasionally to make room for growing roots. Use a pot one size larger than the one the plant has been in. If the pot is old, scrub it inside and out with a stiff brush and thick suds to prevent the spread of disease. A new earthenware pot should be soaked overnight before planting.

Before painting pots, wash them so the painted surface will be smooth. When finished with flowerpots for the season, wash them

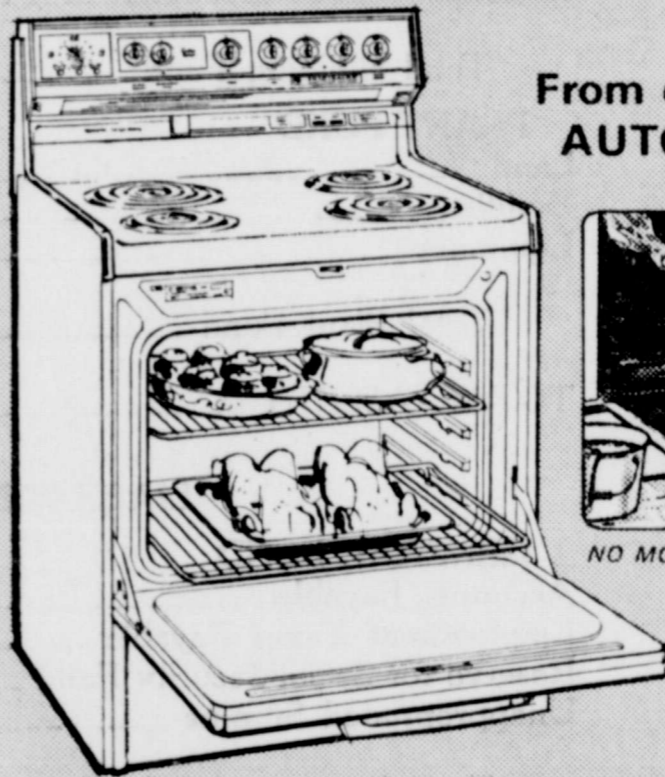

## DUN & BRADSTREET SEEKING INFORMATION ON 43 COKE FIRMS

A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., announced this week that statement requests were mailed to 43 businesses in Coke County. He said figures were obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1966.

Each January business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to nearly three million business concerns.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit, but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses, such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total business in the United States would be higher than the three million quoted above.

During the past year, Hemphill said, four changes were made in Dun & Bradstreet Reference book listings of Coke County businesses, including one name added, one name deleted and two changes in the ratings of continuing businesses.

When the owner or officer of a business enterprise, or his accountant, fills in and mails his financial statement to Dun & Bradstreet, it becomes a part of the credit report on his business and a factor in determining the credit rating of his business. Mailing the statement, rather than waiting for the Dun & Bradstreet reporter's call, means a concern's important suppliers will quickly have the latest facts on which to make credit and sales decisions. When the Dun & Bradstreet reporter receives a business man's financial statement in advance of his periodic call, he can make a

more detailed analysis of the financial condition of the business and discuss its operation more intelligently.

Back of each listing of a business in the Reference book is a Dun & Bradstreet credit report. The report includes the following: a record of how the business is paying its bills; a history of the business (who owns it, who runs it, and how long it has been operating); a description of what the business does and how it does it; a financial section which usually includes the latest financial statement.

While credit reports are primarily used by business men who want to evaluate the credit risk of a business before shipping or selling, insurance underwriters, bankers, and other professionals also use reports.

## Hospital Balance Sheet Published

A balance sheet showing condition of finances of West Coke County Hospital District is being published in this issue of the Observer.

Total assets of the district more than doubled from a year ago, increasing from \$145,820 to \$304,365. Of course, the reason for this tremendous jump is the building project now underway at the hospital.

However, another item on the balance sheet, which may show more of the true condition of the hospital district's financial condition is the cash on hand. In the last report, the hospital had a total \$3,916, compared to \$10,191 shown on the current report.

The current operating accounts would look better, but a large number of delinquent accounts have been deducted as uncollectible. This deduction of bad accounts amounts to \$23,818 on the present report, compared to \$11,973 listed on the last report.

Attention of all citizens of precincts 1 and 3 is invited to the report, hospital directors said. They are anxious for taxpayers of the district to know the financial condition of the hospital.
