United Way charts course

Directors of the United Way of Dimmitt, Inc., finished their election of new officers Tuesday and adopted a timetable for the rest of the year.

ROBERT RYAN is the new president of the United Way, having been elected at the recent annual meeting to succeed Bob McLean. Ryan served as treasurer last year.

Other new officers of the United Way in its second year were elected at Tuesday's board meeting. They are Reta Welch, vice-president; Sandra Clark, secretary; and Sue DeVaney, treasurer.

Newly elected directors are Doug Lapins, Ray Phillips, Don Reeve and Sandy Parsons. They join carryover directors Pete Garza, Bill Clark, Julian Falcon, Don Nelson, McLean, Ryan, Mrs. Welch, Mrs. Clark and Mrs. DeVaney.

THE NEW directors succeed Jean DuLaney and Stanley Schaeffer, who drew one-year terms when the United Way was chartered last year.

Three more board meetings are scheduled before the 1976 community-wide fund drive gets underway. The Advance Gifts Campaign will begin Sept. 28, and the General Campaign will kick off Oct. 12. The final report meeting will be Nov. 2, and the following week a nominating committee will be appointed for officer elections to be held in January.

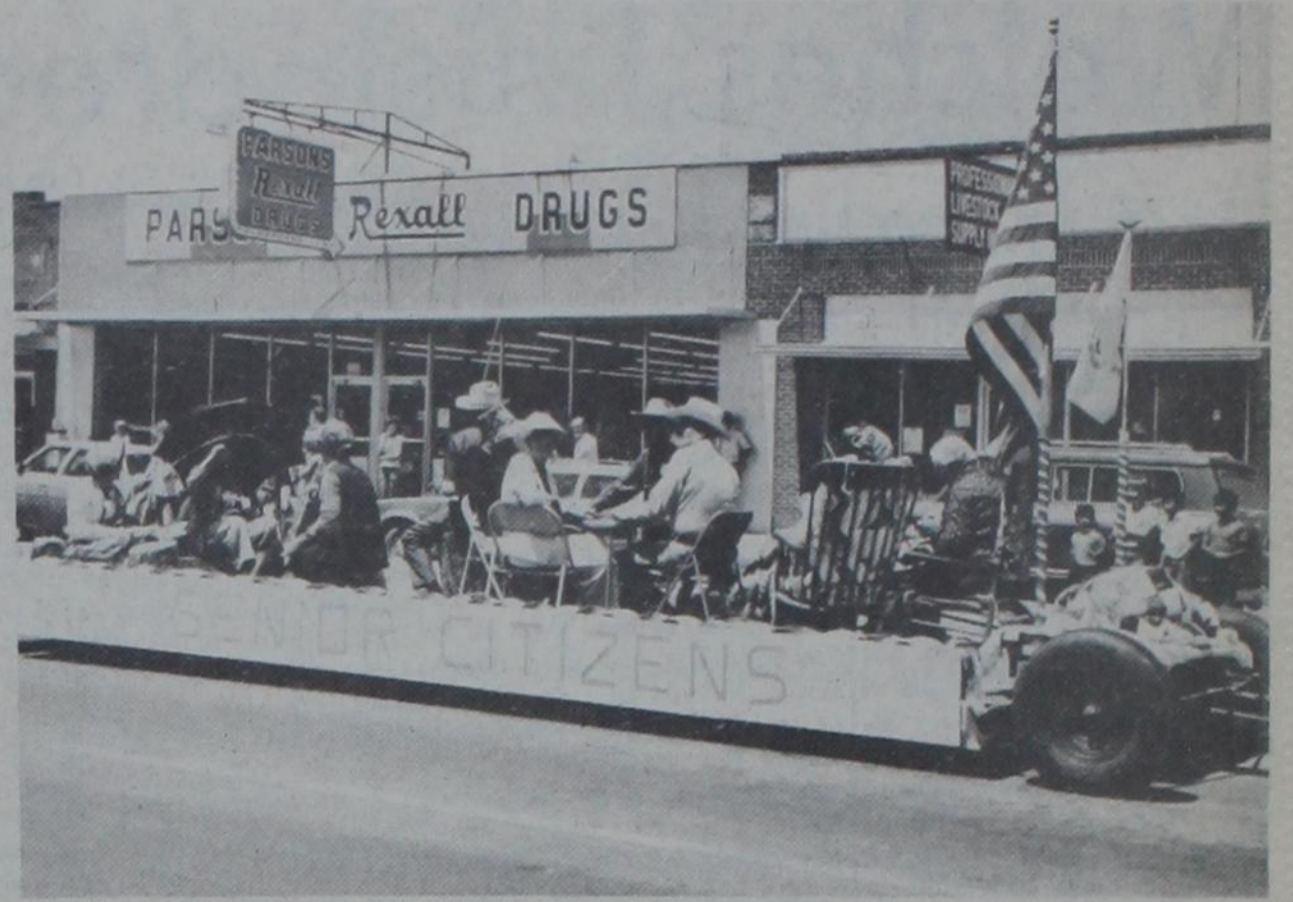
This timetable, Ryan said, will put Dimmitt's United Way on the "national schedule" for advance planning and campaigns.

Ryan appointed four directors to select a Citizens Budget Committee, which will take applications from all organizations that wish to benefit from this year's UW drive, review their proposed budgets and make recommendations to the board of directors. Named to the selection committee were Bill Clark, chairman, Falcon, Nelson and Parsons.

Ryan also appointed a Campaign Organization Committee, composed of Mrs. Welch, chairman, Garza, Phillips and Lapins. This committee will select the 1976 fund-drive chairman, assist him or her in organizing this year's drive, and organize the Advance Gifts Campaign.

BOTH OF the committees appointed Tuesday are to give their reports at the next board meeting Aug. 31. At that time the Budget Selection Committee will be empowered, the 1976 fund-drive chairman will be selected and the board will extend a request for organizations that wish to apply for United Way membership.

The UW board presented plaques Tuesday to Bob McLean, charter president, and Bob Caddell, first-year campaign chairman, in appreciation of their work in these key posts during the UW's first year.



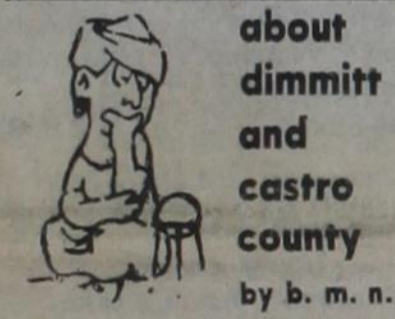

City still tops in retail sales

The republicans are having enough troubles this election year to please any democrat. John Connally, who professed to be a republican some three or four years ago, should seek forgiveness for being a democrat for the preceding fifty odd years, during which time he served as assistant to Congressman Lyndon Johnson, held high offices in the democratic party and was elected governor of the State of Texas three times, being elected on the democratic ticket. He later served as Secretary of the Navy in the democratic administration of President Kennedy. Tuesday night Connally castigated the democratic congresses for the part forty out of forty-four years, although he was accepting the favors of the democratic party for all but three or four of those years. John Connally is a demagogue and unfit for membership in either of the two major political parties.

Dimmitt continues to lead all Panhandle cities in its ratio of retail sales-tax returns from the state. DIMMITT'S city sales tax collections for July were \$1,000 higher than Hereford's, almost as high as Plainview's, and outstripped by far the collections of any other area city of Dimmitt's general size. The State Comptroller's Office Friday mailed the city a check for \$19,291.66, representing its July collections of \$20,669.22 under the one-cent city sales tax, less a 2% service fee of \$413.38 and a "retained amount" (credit balance) of \$964.18.

Sales-tax returns from the state provide a barometer of retail sales volume for a city. In cities that have adopted the one-cent sales tax, retail stores collect a 1% city tax and 4% state tax on applicable items and sent it to the State Com-

troller's Office, which then returns the city's 1% share after deducting a service fee. The state retains 4.76% against a possible delinquency in future collections. SALES-TAX returns cannot be projected to show a city's total retail-sales volume, since many items—such as staple foods, farm equipment, industrial products for resale or re-use, etc.—are exempt from the sales tax. Hart showed a healthy retail picture for July, also, with \$1,266.95 in returns—comparable to those of Hale Center and Earth. Nazareth's city treasury was enriched by \$555.33 in Friday's returns, based on \$386.54 collected in July and a prior-period balance of \$204.27, less the state service fee and retained amount. COMPARED with Dimmitt's \$20,669.22 allocation in city sales tax in July, Abernathy had \$2,720, Borger \$21,416, Bovina \$1,393, Canyon \$7,601, Childress \$4,889, Dalhart \$11,986, Earth \$1,007, Floydada \$2,300, Friona \$5,227, Hale Center \$1,072, Hereford \$19,686, Levelland \$14,989, Littlefield \$10,564, Lockney \$1,919, Muleshoe \$9,277, Olton \$2,509, Pampa \$30,984, Perryton \$12,893, and Plainview \$27,592.

Supermarket starts work at new site

Dimmitt Super Market owner Walt Hansen, who has taken part in many ground-breaking ceremonies as a Chamber of Commerce director, had one of his own Tuesday morning.

CONSTRUCTION is underway on a new 20,000-sq. ft. building with 45,000 sq. ft. paved parking area, which will occupy almost three-fourths of a block between South Broadway and Southwest Second, between Belsher and Stinson. There will be parking lot access from all four streets, Hansen said, with ample drive-around area and parking space. The building will be on the south portion of the property, fronting to the north. It will be comparable in size to the largest supermarkets in larger cities in this area, he said.

"YOU WON'T find many supermarkets much larger in square footage because this is the most efficient size based on construction costs, energy costs, inventory and other factors," Hansen added. The present building occupied by Dimmitt Super Market has 7,500 sq. ft. of floor space. Hansen bought the business in

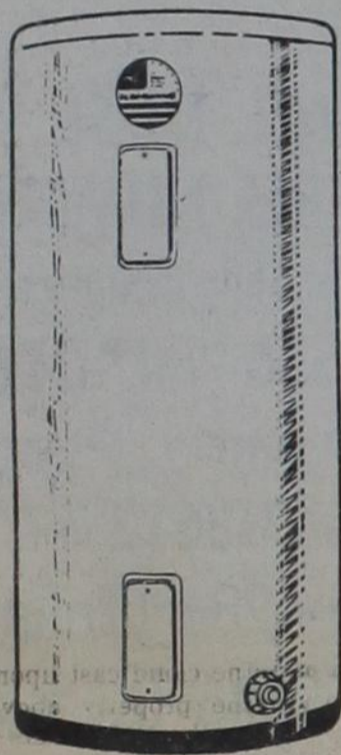

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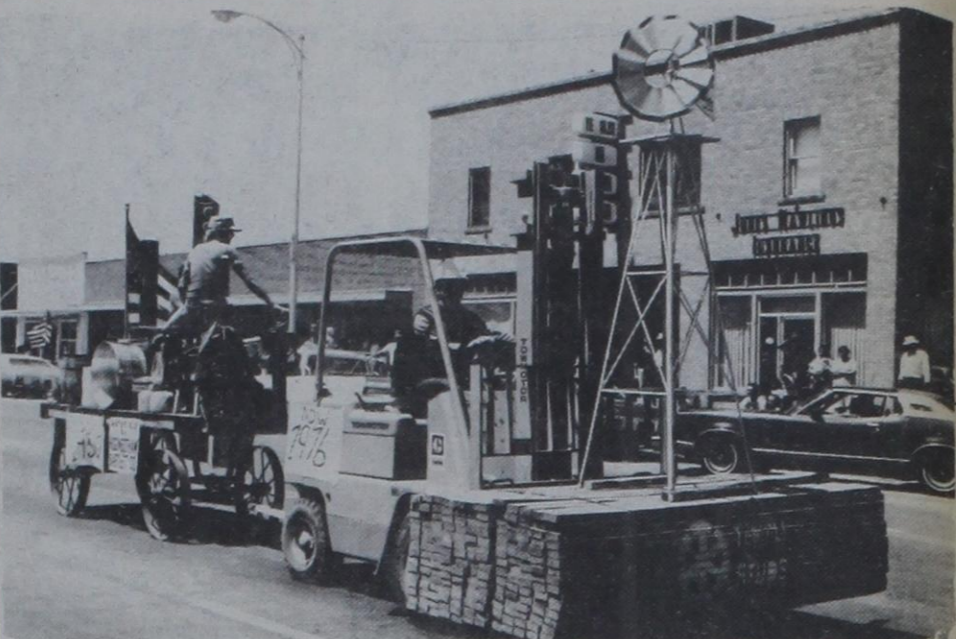

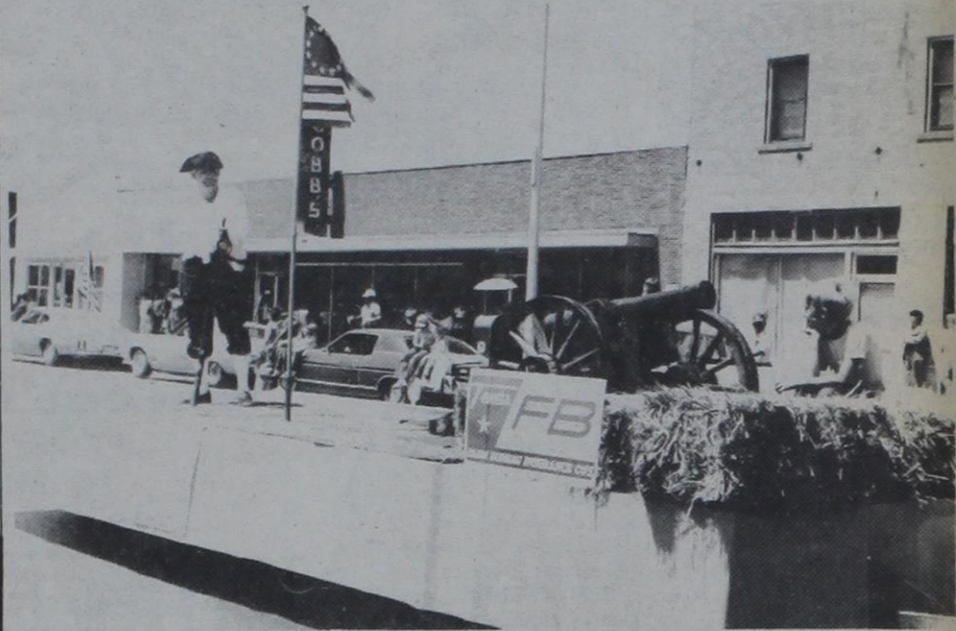

I used to think that the only thing which would make it too expensive to drive a car was the price of gasoline, or perhaps even the cost of the car itself. That didn't bother me too much because I knew that the good old American ingenuity would develop some kind

of motorized transportation that would serve my mobility needs adequately. BUT, NOW the big bugaboo isn't fuel or the cost of wheels. It's the cost of insurance. This has already happened to home ownership where insurance premiums have gone out of sight if replacement coverage is required. There just isn't any way a home owner can afford honest replacement protection.

Car prices have jumped 35% over the past four years. Gasoline prices have jumped 50%. Now the prospects for automobile premiums costing us \$1000 a year is a reality. It may be helping a troubled automobile insurance industry out of a tight spot, but it is putting the driver in another financial hole.

The nation's largest insurer of private automobiles has hiked car insurance rates 18% since January, 1975. Starting August 18, New York drivers will have to go up another 18.9% on top of the earlier increase. Premiums have jumped as much as 53.6% in New Jersey, 50% in Florida, and 48% in New York.

THE PROBLEM isn't going away. As long as there is a 5% to 8% inflation rate in our economy, the cost of repairs and replacement parts will continue to soar. The result is a shift from a market where many companies were fighting to get the car owner business to one of the reducing activities in car insurance or even getting completely out of the market.

Claims and expenses on automobiles were 7% higher than premium income last year and the automobile insurance industry had underwriting losses of over \$2 billion last year. The rate increases have helped but they will have to increase sharply above present levels to offset the tremendous repair and medical costs. Another innovation is the \$200 deductible which helps hold down premium increases.

The heart of the problem is our present personal injury system. More and more people are finding that excessive damage awards are becoming standard in lawsuits arising from automobile accidents.

"THE HANDBOOK is available for reference use at all local TEC offices as one of our services to the public," said TEC Chairman Harold K. Dudley. The nearest TEC office is in Hereford.

"Several years ago," Dudley continued, "when TEC began a study on manpower in relation to career direction, we found that labor market projections were among the most basic needs of nearly all institutions and businesses: What manpower would be needed in five years? In 10 years?"


"Both TEC and the Bureau of Labor Statistics have the capability to make statistical projections which give a basis for future planning," the TEC chairman said, "and the data produced have proven to be an immense aid in many fields."

The "Occupational Outlook Handbook" gives projections on a nationwide basis, Dudley said, for more than 850 occupations within 35 major industries. For each occupation, there is a description of the duties, places of employment,

training and other qualifications needed, earnings, working conditions, employment outlook, and sources of additional information.

"The publication is invaluable to educators, counselors, career planners, business people, and anyone else interested in the projection of job needs," Dudley said.

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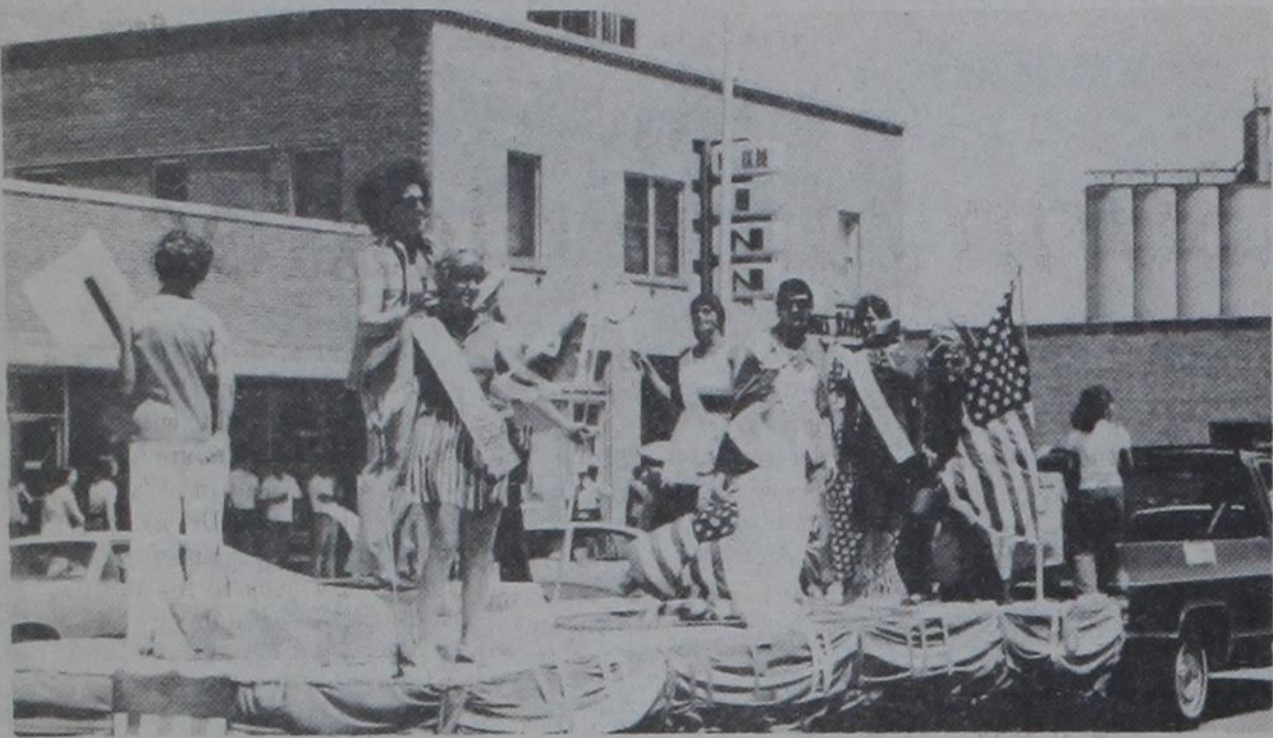

with about 6700 members in West Texas, and previously was superintendent of the Northwestern Illinois district 20 years and the New York district 6 years.

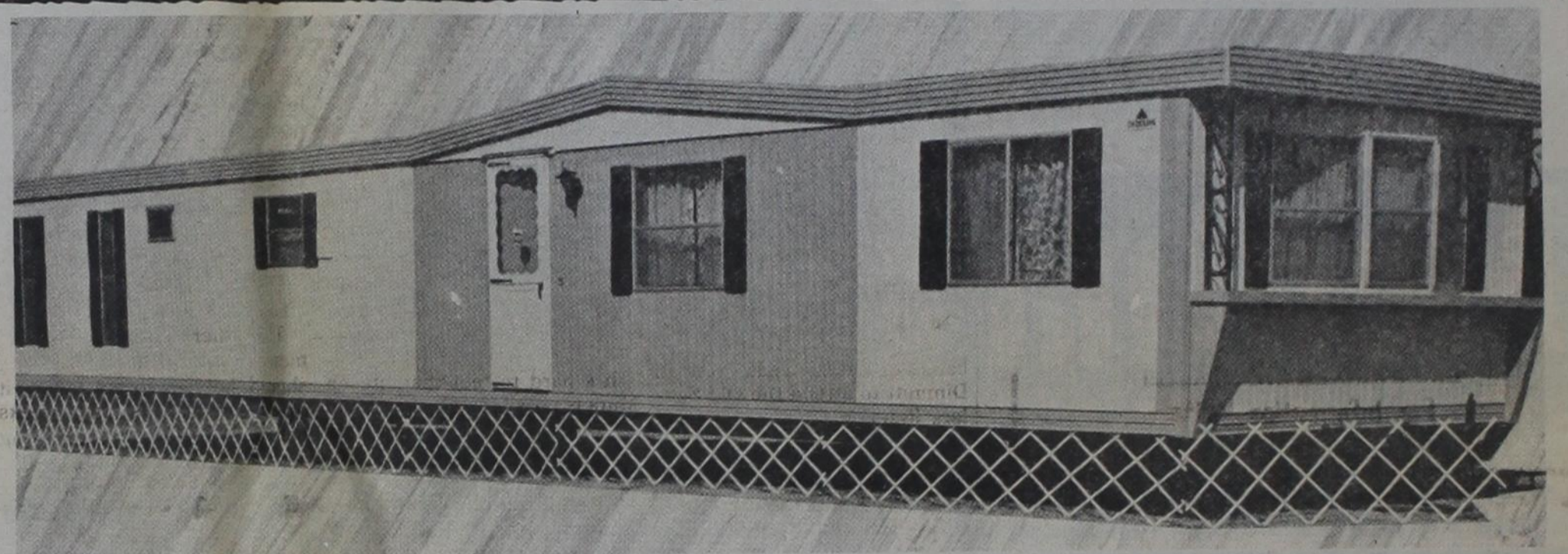

13 accidents occur in July

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 accidents on rural highways in Castro County during July, 1976 according to Sgt. J. R. Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. THESE crashes resulted in no fatalities but two persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July, 1976, shows a total of 592 accidents resulting in 22 persons killed and 388 injured, as compared to July, 1975, with 568 accidents resulting in 22 persons killed and 398 persons injured. This was 24 more accidents, the same number killed, and ten less injured in 1976 at the same period of time.

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PLANT BLUEBONNETS NOW
Texas homeowners desiring a cover of bluebonnets for their landscape next spring should plant seed as soon as possible. Bluebonnets are actually winter annuals. They must be planted in late summer and form a small rosette of leaves. During the winter they develop a good root system, and then the plants grow rapidly during the spring rainy season.

Faculty hears Sen. Hance and peppy Kansas teacher

Use of current newspapers as "living textbooks" in every level of teaching was urged by Hope Shackelford, noted lecturer on that subject, in workshops she conducted Monday for Dimmitt Public School teachers.

SHE SHARED with State Sen. Kent Hance of Lubbock the featured spots on a two-day program of in-service training preceding the opening of a new school term.

Pupil registration was held Wednesday in all buildings of the school system, and classes were scheduled to begin Thursday morning as summer vacation ended for Dimmitt youngsters and teachers.

Miss Shackelford, a junior high school teacher from Wichita, Kan., travels widely in advocating the "living textbook" method of teaching all subjects.

LOCAL AND regional newspapers stimulate student interest when used for teaching not only current events but reading, vocabulary, "practical" writing styles, spelling, art work and even math—by using such figures as election returns and sports statistics, Miss Shackelford said.

Open discussion in the classroom is promoted, she continued, to dispel the apathy that

affects many students and is carried over into adulthood.

Good newspapers—which do not aim at pleasing everyone and present both sides of questions—teach critical thinking better than textbooks, the speaker said. She showed posters and artwork which pupils made from newspaper clippings.

In addition to the afternoon workshops, the visiting lecturer opened the teachers' meetings Monday morning with an inspirational address stressing relations of teachers to their community.

HANCE, the first Dimmitt High School graduate ever elected to the Texas Senate, recalled incidents serious and humorous from his school years as he reminded his hearers that "the best thing a teacher can do is inspire a child to think."

The state senator from Lubbock praised small-town schools as a training ground for national leaders, citing the fact that practically all the presidential possibilities mentioned this year in both major parties grew up in small towns. Such schools give every pupil a chance to take part in a wide variety of activities, he stressed.

Difficulties of teaching now, when discipline problems seem to have reached a peak and "too many parents send their children to you to learn things they should have been taught at home," were mentioned by the speaker as he emphasized the importance of a teacher's influence.

HANCE SPOKE of the Texas lawmakers' work on education bills, specifically in the last session, outlining the origin and progress of proposed legislation.

He said he has proposed a rules change which would require school finance bills to be introduced earlier in a session, to avoid the last-minute rush in which the recent law was passed to hike local fund assignments to school districts, forcing big increases in local taxes.

Teachers closed their in-service training with separate faculty meetings at each school building Tuesday afternoon.

Comdr. William B. Van Dusen, a navy ordnance officer who can explain what makes guided missiles tick, tells of a lady who heard a lecture on missiles and reported that "She was still somewhat confused—but on a much higher plane than before."

Synanon group to visit area

A "mission" of 25 residents from Synanon, a noted re-education community for drug addicts, alcoholics and delinquents, will visit the West Texas area for two weeks starting Monday.

AS HAS been done every year since 1970, Synanon will be seeking cattle from local feedlots and ranchers to help feed a community of 1,400 men, women and children, including about 135 juveniles who have been sent there by courts, families or probation officers from over the nation.

Synanon is a nonprofit organization and depends largely on the support of ranchers, farmers and others in the American business and agricultural communities.

Founded 18 years ago by an alcoholic in Santa Monica, Cal., it now has several communities in California, one in Chicago, intake centers in Detroit and New York and two international affiliates.

It is called the "Father" of the self-help program which takes an educational approach to social ills and emphasizes the development of character and self-reliance. All residents work and if needed, receive vocational training. There is no charge for its services and it receives no federal subsidies.

The "mission" concept is used to bring members of Synanon to the people who support it, and give the donors and the public an opportunity to know the community members

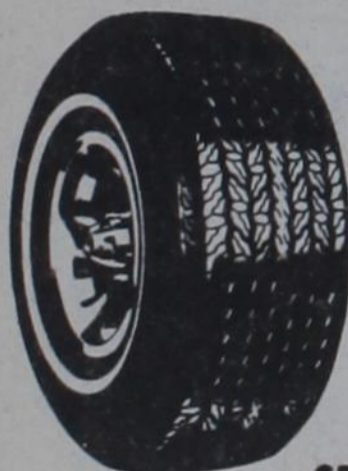

Grand Jury indicts 13

A newly empaneled Castro County Grand Jury returned 15 indictments against 13 persons in a long session Tuesday.

FOURTEEN of the indictments were for felony offenses—criminal mischief, aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, burglary, rape, forgery—while the 15th indictment was reduced from a felony to a misdemeanor charge.

Three of the indictments returned Tuesday were for assaults on peace officers.

Edward E. Bernal was indicted on a charge of assaulting a peace officer with a deadly weapon. He is accused of threatening City Patrolman Santos Perez with a pistol July 4 during a scuffle on the parking lot of the Star Dance Hall. District Judge John T. Boyd ordered Bernal's bond continued at \$20,000.

ROBERT GARCIA was indicted for allegedly hitting and kicking Deputy Sheriff David Slaughter July 17. His bond of \$25,000—which he had posted—was ordered continued. Garcia also was indicted for criminal mischief on a charge of damaging a car owned by Rudy Maroquin July 17. His bond on this charge was continued at \$2,000.

Alfred Williams was indicted on two aggravated assault counts—one against a peace officer and the other involving a deadly weapon in a separate incident. He is charged with threatening Peggy Scott with a knife on July 17, and striking Deputy Sheriff Granville Martin the same day. Judge Boyd ordered his bonds of \$5,000 on the deadly-weapon charge and \$12,500 on the peace-officer assault charge continued.

A charge of attempted murder against Fidencio Torres was reduced by the Grand Jury Tuesday to felony assault with a deadly weapon. Torres is charged with shooting Larry

Burks at Burks's farm at Arney last October. Judge Boyd ordered Torres' bond reduced from its original \$25,000 to \$12,500.

TWO MEN were indicted in connection with a check-alteration incident that occurred at Hart last May. The Grand Jury returned indictments against Josh Neil Westbrook and Gary Lee Epker on charges of forgery by alteration. They are accused of posing as utility repairmen and taking a check for \$1.50 from Nora A. Ray of Hart, then altering the check to \$1,851 and cashing it. Judge Boyd ordered the bond continued at \$2,500 on each man. (A third man, Bobby Dugan, was indicted last September in connection with the same incident.)

The Grand Jury indicted Gary Thomas Higgins on a charge of forgery by passing. He is charged with passing two counterfeit \$100 bills that had been made by a photocopy machine and watercolored. His bond of \$7,500 was ordered continued.

THREE MEN were indicted for criminal mischief as a result of damages done to the La Posta Liquor Store north of Dimmitt Aug. 1. They were Reynato A. Gonzales, Robert Hernandez and Jose A. Paz. Judge Boyd continued their bonds of \$2,000 each.

Pete Davila was indicted on a rape charge in connection with a July 12 incident. His bond of \$12,500 was ordered continued.

The Grand Jury returned a burglary indictment against Pedro Mata Lopez, who is charged with burglarizing Alvin's Drive-In Cleaners July 15. Judge Boyd continued his bond at \$5,000.

A felony charge of aggravated assault and bodily injury against Camilo Gonzales was reduced to a misdemeanor charge by the Grand Jury, and Judge Boyd reduced Gonzales' bond from \$1,000 to \$750.

DAIRY SITUATION BRIGHT

The remainder of 1976 appears bright for Texas dairymen, according to an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He lists these reasons—continued tight supply-demand situation, slower rise in feed prices, favorable milk-feed price relationships, large supply of replacement stock on dairy farms, increased value of dairy cows, slower rise in production costs, and general improvement in the overall economy. Milk production per cow is up this year, milk prices remain favorable, and the milk-feed ratio continues to drop.

CHARCOAL ROT

Charcoal rot, a fungus disease, is taking its toll of corn and sorghum throughout Texas. The disease damages the lower part of the stalk, resulting in poor ear or head development and causing widespread lodging if winds occur. The disease eats away the soft tissue in plant stalks and cuts off the flow of water and nutrients. Charcoal rot fungus is present in most soils and affects corn and sorghum only at heading time and when plants are under drought stress.

Farm tour date is announced

The Chamber of Commerce has set Sept. 23 as the date of the annual Farm Tour for area news media and consumers, Chamber Manager Elvon DeVaney announces.

THE TOUR bus will leave the Chamber of Commerce office at the Dimmitt City Hall at 10 a.m. that day. Lunch will be served to the tour party without cost, and the visit to farms and agribusinesses will be completed by 3 p.m.

Purpose of the tour is to inform newsmen and consumers "what Castro County farmers and businessmen are doing to help feed and clothe the world," DeVaney said.

Favorable comment on last year's tour gave the chamber the incentive to repeat it this summer, DeVaney said.

FCC approves transfer of KDHN license

Purchase of Radio Station KDHN, Dimmitt, by Gerald Marvin Hanners (Jerry Marvin) and Susan Hanners has been approved by the Federal Communications Commission, and the actual transfer of license and change of ownership will take place Sept. 1, Hanners said.

THE F.C.C. approved the transfer of a license now held by High Plains Broadcasting Co. to Plains Media, Inc. The latter firm is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Hanners.

Final hearing to be Sept. 7 on zone change

A public hearing on a proposed zoning change in a West Dimmitt residential area has been set by the City Commission for 6:30 p.m. Monday, Sept. 7, preceding the regular commission meeting.

AL JACKSON, Zoning Commission chairman, reported a ruling by that body last Wednesday, after a hearing Aug. 9, that the district be rezoned to a "higher use double family dwelling zone."

The area in question is Lot 9 and the west 45 feet of Lot 10, Block 22, Miller addition. Dick Reinhardt had requested that it be rezoned to a designation of "higher use multiple family dwellings."

At the Zoning Commission hearing, 15 interested citizens

met with commission members to present their arguments for and against the proposed zoning change.

Before the City Commission endorses or rejects the Zoning Commission ruling it must hold its own public hearing.

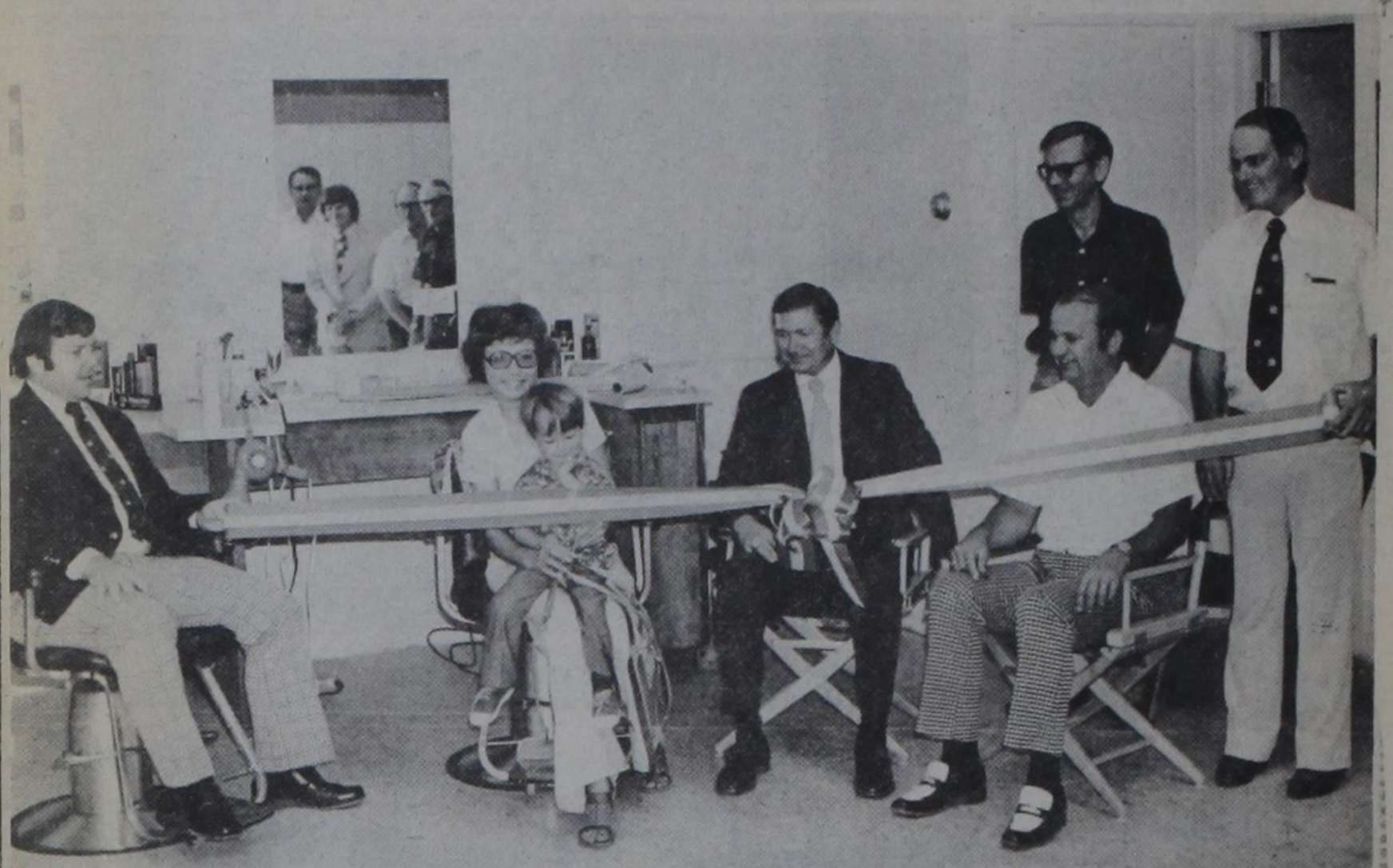
The visitor will demonstrate the Winbery technique to club members and others interested. The meeting is open to all who wish to attend.

Irene's Ideas

You can make baking powder

School is started now and we'll all be ready to get into our school routines again. The summer has been busy for everyone. I hope you've done most of the things you had planned to do.

I'D LIKE to share a few interesting recipes and hints from the past with you this week.

To make baking powder, combine one pound cream of tartar, one-half pound baking soda and two tablespoons flour. Sift above five times to mix thoroughly. Store in dry can and use whenever baking powder is needed.

OLD FASHIONED MINCEMEAT (makes 2 9" pies)
1 lb. cooked very lean meat
2 cups brown sugar
1 cup suet

1 lb. raisins
1 lb. currants
2 cups cider
1 lb. tart apples
½ tsp. cinnamon
½ tsp. nutmeg
½ tsp. mace
½ tsp. cloves
1 tsp. salt
2 cups grape or canned cherry juice
Meat broth from meat
Cook the meat until almost tender. Cool. Chop (do not

grind) apples, suet and beef. Add remaining ingredients allowing just enough meat broth to cover the rest of the ingredients. Other fruit juices such as those drained from canned pineapple, peaches, apricots or pears give additional delicious flavors to the mincemeat. Bits of tart fruit jelly may also be added. Simmer all ingredients until the apples are tender. This may be stored in the refrigerator for a week.

The bride has been employed in San Angelo and has attended Angelo State University and South Plains Junior College since graduation from Seminole High School.

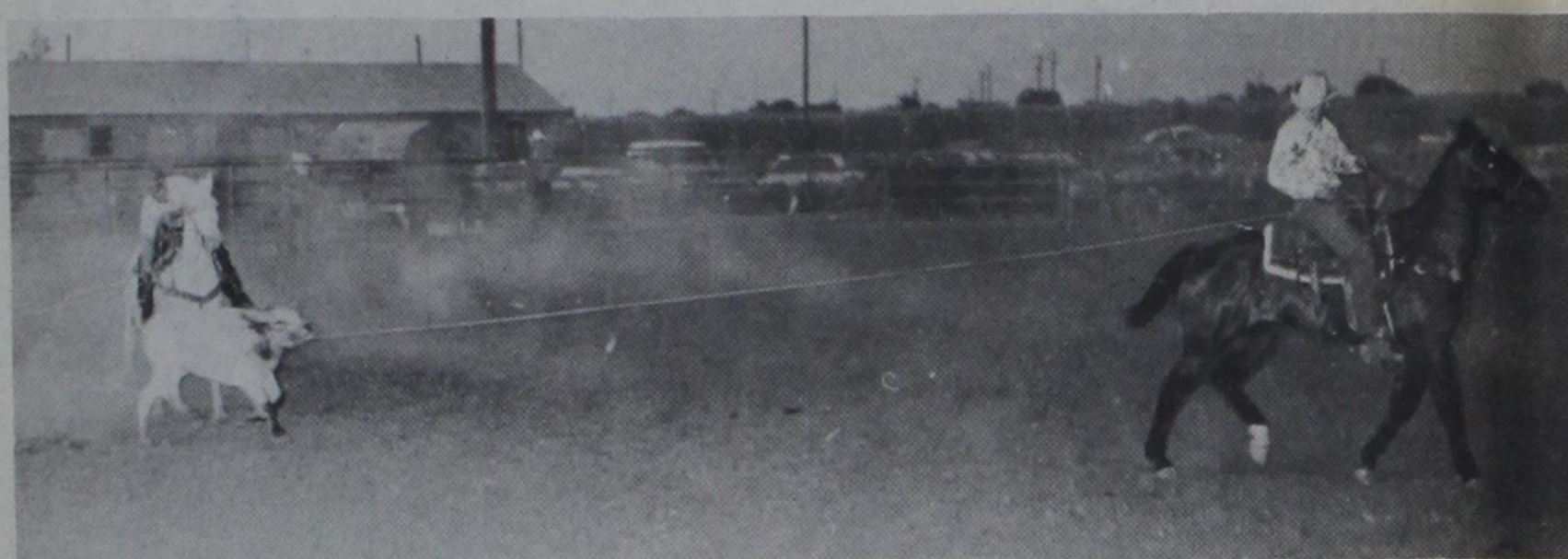

VETERAN'S SERVICES

We have returned to our regular Tuesday and Thursday schedule for the remainder of August, plus emergency and by appointment at other times.

Call us for information, but also toll free information calls are now provided by the VA as shown in the following news release.

Veterans or their dependents seeking information on benefits are reminded that the Veterans Administration maintains 960 toll free telephone lines across the country for that purpose.

The telephone numbers can usually be found in the "US Government" section of local telephone books under "Veterans Administration - Benefits Information and Assistance."

THE SERVICE is aimed primarily at veterans who live away from a VA office and find it difficult to visit the office. The same telephone service is available to veterans who live in cities having VA offices.

The toll-free service has proved popular. For example, VA counselors in Waco answered 391,387 telephone calls during fiscal year 1976.

Because the service is so popular, veterans should have at hand as much VA-related information about themselves as possible when making a call. If you can give the counselor your VA claim number, or your military serial number or Social Security number, for example, you will get faster service.

The numbers to call in cities served by the Waco VA Regional Office include Amarillo, 376-7202.

PEANUT DISEASE CONTROL

By watching both their peanut crops and the weather, producers can reduce disease damage. Foliar diseases occur during certain weather conditions. A system developed by the Extension Service and the National Weather Service is now in operation in the major peanut-producing areas of the state to alert producers to weather conditions favorable for disease development.

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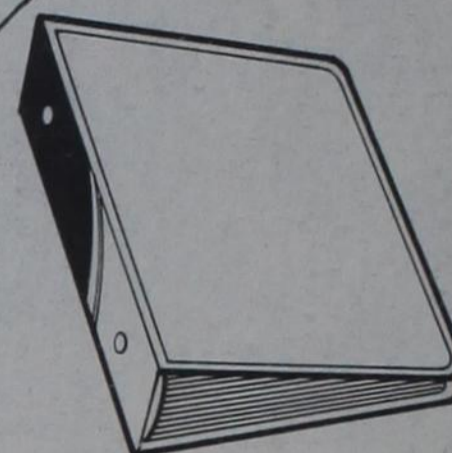


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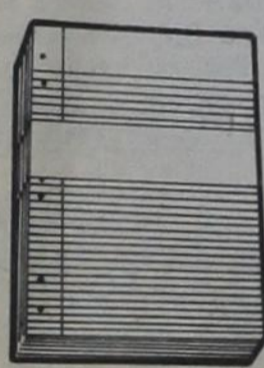


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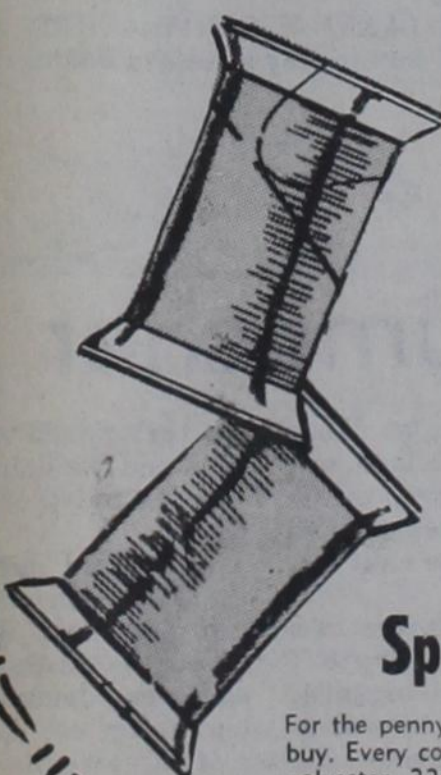
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
