### Baseballers Win Bi-District Title

No one has filed for city alderman, according to an announcement this week by City Secretary Mrs. Edna Havins.

An election to change Robert Lee's city government from commission to alderman type, if it carries, will require three aldermen, along with present members of the commission, to make up the city council.

Consequently, city officials have issued a plea for persons who would be willing to serve on the proposed council to submit their names to the city secretary as candidates.

Mayor Robert Vaughan and Commissioners Freeman Clark and Vaughan Davis will automatically become members of the council, but three more men are needed to complete the six members required.

Mayor Robert Vaughan said he would like to see a number of candidates file, so the voters of the city will have an opportunity to choose their city's governing body.

## City Has Water Problems

Robert Lee has had a water emergency the last few days, it was announced at Tuesday's BCD meeting. President Vaughan Davis, who is also a city commissioner, said the situation is under control but that water department employees have been using some makeshift equipment to keep the city supplied with water.

The large pump which is ordinarily used to move water from Mountain Creek Lake to the standpipe has been in Dallas for repairs. A secondary pump was put into service, and the last few days it has begun to fail. Emergency equipment borrowed from San Angelo was pressed into service and was able to keep the city supplied with water, even though pressure has been low.

Due to the danger of fire, the standpipe, which was full of water, was closed off, in order to have this supply under pressure in case of an emergency. Water has been pumped directly from the filter plant into the lines, instead of going through the standpipe.

The pump was due to arrive back in Robert Lee Wednesday, so city officials were expecting everything to be back to normal by the time The Observer is out.

City officials said the only trouble experienced during the potential crisis was low water pressure.

#### Reports on Scouting

President Davis called on Supt. Jimmy Bickley to report on a letter received from Odell Howard, chairman of the Concho Valley

Council of the Boy Scouts. Bickley said the letter urged that more sustaining members be secured to finance the scouting movement. He pointed out that the bank draft method is the best way to provide for systematic giving to the Boy Scouts.

Bickley brought out how boys and the community as a whole benefit from Scouting. He said the scouting program helps to build and train tomorrow's responsible citizens to be physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight. As the population grows, the superintendent said, the number of boys who need scouting grows. The increase in membership causes a need for more money, and the organization needs

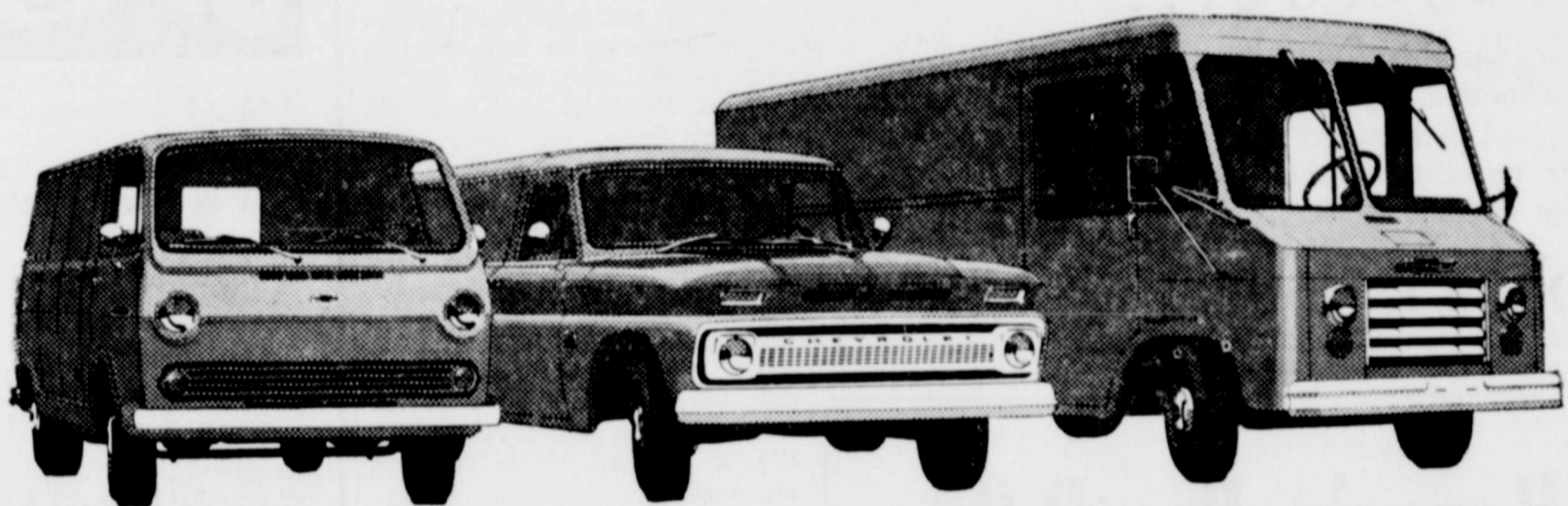

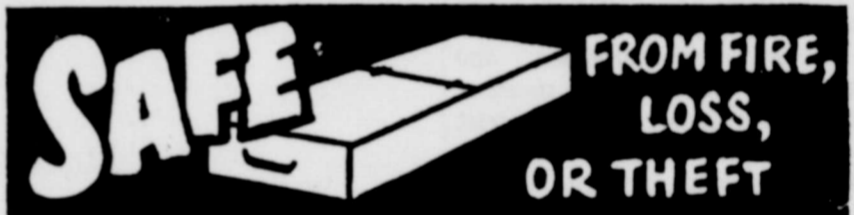

## County Agents News Column

Several people have asked if I have found any eggs on the pecan nutlets yet. I checked four locations in Robert Lee Tuesday morning and found no pecan nut casebearer eggs. But, I did find numerous tunneled-out twigs. The egg laying period should begin shortly.

Normally, the casebearer adult or moth emerges, matures two to four days, then begins to deposit eggs on the tips and sides of the young nuts. The egg incubates four to five days, hatches and the "damage do'er" emerges. The larvae feed one to three days on the bud or buds below the cluster, then enter a pecan.

In attempting to set up a control plan, several things should be given consideration. First, the spray application must be timed to coincide with the peak hatch period. This in turn means checking daily or at least every other day for casebearer eggs during the next two weeks. This is the only way to be sure when the peak egg hatch will occur in a given location. Hatching variances can be found between locations very near to each other.

A second consideration is to be sure the entire tree is covered when spraying. You must use a sprayer that will provide enough pressure to part the leaves and allow the insecticide to reach the nut cluster. This is the area where the casebearer will be feeding. On large trees usually three to four hundred pounds pressure is needed to part the leaves and reach the nuts with the spray.

Also, using the correct formulation is necessary to obtain good casebearer control. The strength solution to use will vary with the chemical to be used. The following mixtures are recommended by the Extension Service: 1.5% DDT; .75% Malathion; 2% toxaphene; 1 pint of 40% nicotine sulfate per 100 gallons of water; .5% Thiodan; or 1.6% sevin. I would add a 2% strength solution of zinc sulfate to the spray to help control rosette.

It would be impossible to say when the best time to spray will be based on our findings to date. If the normal pattern is followed, though, the period from May 24 to May 28 looks like the ideal time. We should be able to give a more definite answer next week.

Some people may prefer to make two control applications. If you prefer to spray twice, we estimate May 23 and May 28 to be the ideal times to spray.

Again, we emphasize that identifying the eggs, watching the egg laying pattern and then using the proper equipment and correct formulation are necessary if the results are to be satisfactory. Begin now checking your pecan nut clusters for tiny small eggs on the dried blossoms or on the sides of the nuts.

In the fourth grade we had Mrs. Travis McNair as our teacher. There we learned that we couldn't have as many recesses as we did.

When we were in the fifth grade we had the wonderful pleasure of having Miss Brown for our teacher. We didn't study very much the first week because the high school boys kept coming with some excuse to see Miss Brown. But we didn't mind. In the fifth grade we were joined by pert and pretty Cindy Mundell.

As time went on we hated to leave Miss Brown, but instead she left us, to get married.

Mrs. McBroom was our 6th grade teacher. There we had our first taste of Spanish. We also had a great actress. Miss Farrell Jean Fikes had the lead role in Cinderella and she did a good job of it, too. It was also that year that bubbling and bouncing Linda Jacoby joined us from Brady.

The years were going by faster now. We were in Junior High. To add to our glorious group we were joined by handsome Rickey Ledbetter. We were also joined by Mr. Hamby who was our class sponsor.

Our eighth grade year went by pretty fast. We graduated and were at last in high school. Freshmen at last. For our favorites we elected Linda Jacoby and William Hood. We had a lot of fun that year, but who wants to be a freshman when you can be a sophomore?

So sophomores it was, and what a year that was. That year we were joined by the blond bomb from Silver, Miss Aletris Ackerman; also from Silver we got Gayle Conley, whose theme song that year was Bird Dog, and Rhonda Gartman, who was already spoken for.
