Hospitals In Coke Okay for Medicare

Congressman Omar Burleson announced July 2 the certification by the Bureau of Health Insurance of the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, of the Bronte Hospital and West Coke County Hospital for participation in the Medicare program which became effective July 1, 1966.

Congressman Burleson said in the announcement that approximately 95% of all hospital beds in the country have been or will be certified for participation in the Medicare program. Certification by So cial Security is based upon recommendation by the U.S. Public Health Service and the State Health departments. Burleson pointed out that approximately 19 million Americans 65 years of age or older may now be eligible for Medicare through the facilities of most of the more than 7,000 general hospitals in the country. A story in Wednesday morning's San Angelo Standard-Times told of the cut in Neighborhood Youth Corps appropriations in this area. It quoted Coke County Judge W. W. Thetford as saying he is running into problems in administering the program because there are more eligible young people who need the jobs than there is money to pay them.

Don Hale, director of the Corps in this 11 county district, stated that he would cut back Tom Green County's allotment in order to boost some of the smaller counties, including Coke, to a minimum of 10 jobs.

Judge Thetford told the Standard-Times that he was going to meet with Robert Lee and Bronte school superintendents to see if they are interested in developing a program with a 10-slot allotment





Bloodworth Field Gets Producer

The Bloodwonth (5,650 Canyon) field of Coke County gained its third producer with completion of Tucker Drilling Co., Inc., San Angelo, and Peter Henderson, New York City, No. 1-A J. S. Walker, one location north of the discovery and three miles southeast of Silven. It was finaled for a daily flowing potential of 174.61 barrels of 39 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 200-1, through perforations between 5,704-08 feet, which had been fractured with 30,000 gallons, 30,000 pounds and 1,000 pounds of glass beads.

Slated as a 5,900-foot Canyon sand wildcat, it was drilled "tight." Location is 660 feet from the south and 467 feet from the west lines of S. A. Elam No. 1.
