

A breakdown of the total amounts gave Marvin Simpson \$397,540 and owners of half royalty on the land, \$36,000. For the William Simpson land, Simpson was awarded \$63,-875; D. W. Smith and others, owners of half royalty on the 294.25 acres of land, \$1,100; and to Saul heirs, owners of 1-16 royalty on the land, \$22.30.

A hearing on condemnation of land held Monday of last week awarded \$80,500 for 389.4 acres owned by Wledon Gordon and others.

Only other suit now on file, CRMWD directors announced early this week, is for gravel interests of Cecil Montgomery, who operates a pit near the river bridge two miles northwest of Robert Lee.

With the 3,000 acres added to the damsite area last week by the condemnation suits, only about 6,000 acres remains to be acquired. O. H. Ivie, general manager of CRMWD, said that about 1000 acres of the remaining land is owned by ten persons, and the remainder by two large landowners. Ivey said he was hopeful these parcels can be acquired soon.

No home pesticide spraying or dusting is safely completed until you are sure the pesticide container is disposed of.

No pesticide container is ever completely empty, so handle with the same care you used when they were full

When pesticide containers are 'empty," the container has done its important job of holding the product until you used it. After tainer will sit where you put it and create problems for you until you safely dispose of it. Such storage if you cannot conveniently take care of them as they become useless. The containers should NEVER be used again for any rea-

Pesticide materials, such as dusts or liquids, are often left over after the application is past and world peace and focus attention on to dig a pit, at least 18 inches deep, in an isolated area-away from children, pets, and garden areas-and carefully pour in the unwanted pesticides. Be careful to avoid splashing. Wear rubber gloves and any other protective clothing called for on the label. Fill the hole in with 12 to 18 inches of soil, then dispose of the container.

I will feature correct disposal methods in future articles. I particularly want to point out today that aerosol "bug-bombs" require special handling. Pressurized containers should never be burned or punctured, because they will explode, causing droplets of pesticide and bits of sharp metal to travel great distances. Aerosol cans should be wrapped in several layers of newspaper and placed into the garbage can. If you do not have garbage service, they should be wrapped and buried in an isolated area, or taken to a nearby supervised sanitary land-fill dump

Plan Traffic Patern in Kitchen When shopping for a new house, the housewife should take a good look at the overall kitchen planning. The flow of traffic and convenience of the appliances is very important. Be sure to check for awkward situations that could grow more irritating with time:

(1) Be sure a built-in oven or dishwasher does not obstruct traffic when it's open. This can be hazardous.

(2) Doors which, when they open into the kitchen, should not cut off use of an appliance or a portion of counter space. Sometimes you can solve the problem by having them rehung to open out or in the opposite direction.

(3) Lack of counter space is frustrating. Be sure there's a "landing strip" beside the refrigeratorpreferably on the side where it opens, by a built-in oven (iet's hope it's heatproof) and ample ones on both sides of the sink.

(4) In smallish kitchens, avoid having major traffic run right through the main work area. Children rarely stop, look or listen, which could make such a traffic arrangement exasperating and dan-

(5) If you walk quite a distance from sink to range, you're in for spills and a lot of trotting back and forth when you need water for cooking, to drain vegetables, etc. About three to six feet is a manageable distance.

(6) Snack bars often give too little knee room, face a blank wall, are too high for small children. subtract rather than add storage, obstruct necessary traffic. Just as bad in their way are big breakfast areas at the expense of needed work and cabinet space. These may save the builder money, but they make little sense in homes with other adequate dining areas.




