

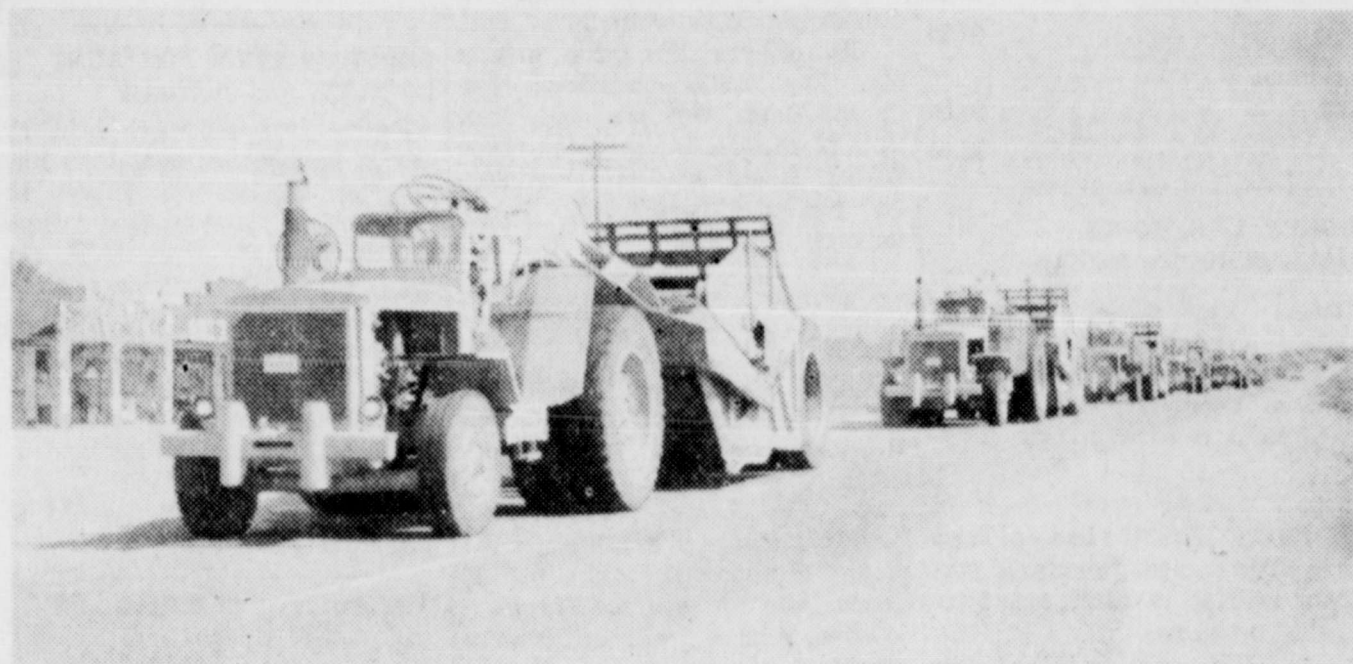

Dam Workers Arriving Here

Tuesday just before noon. Ten of the big jobs are shown here in a view taken near Add Davis' store and station east of Robert Lee. More equipment is expected to

arrive in the next few days. Officials of Clement Bros. said they expect to begin work on the huge lake by Nov. 1, or before.

Workers and equipment have started rolling into Robert Lee to begin work on the huge construction project which will lay an earthen dam across the Colorado River, a couple of miles west of here, and impound almost a half million acre feet of water.

Ten giant earth moving machines rolled in Tuesday just before noon and more of the heavy equipment is expected to be arriving all the time, in order for the job to start on its announced date of Nov. 1, or before.

Clement Bros. of Hickory, N. C., has the contract to build the big dam and reservoir, which will supply water to thirsty West Texas cities of Big Spring, Odessa, Snyder and Midland.

The North Carolina firm was the low bidder on the job when bids were opened and read Oct. 6 before officials of the Colorado River Municipal Water District in Big Spring. The firm's bid was \$8,686,440.

A. B. Sheppard said this week that three families and two single men have already rented houses or apartments from him.

Add Davis and Maurice Duncan are busy working on trailer parks to accommodate expected workers with mobile homes.

The influx of people is expected to reach its peak around the first of the year when officials of Clement Bros. said they would be going full swing.

Included in the \$8.5 plus bid was \$2,875,000 for the construction of the huge spillway which will carry excess water through the center of the dam. The remainder was for excavating 1,587,000 cubic yards from a core trench 30 feet deep, installing 11,488,000 cubic yards of wetted and rolled embankment for the dam proper, plus 83,000 yards of 10-in. gravel blanket and 209,000 yards of rock rip-rap two feet thick to protect the dam.

The dam will be 22,000 feet long, about four and one-sixth miles. It will rise 143 feet from the river channel and 123 feet from the second river bank, will be 850 feet wide at the base and 29 feet wide at the top.

The big spillway, which was constructed in miniature months ago for testing purposes, will be morning glory type with adjustable gates on top. It will resemble the bell of a 66.3 wide sousaphone, that being the distance from lip to lip of the structure. The gate will feed water into a main conduit 28 feet wide, with walls 6½ feet thick, down and under the dam to a stilling basin — a big concrete box with walls two feet thick and rising 58 feet from a floor which will be eight feet thick.

A 60-inch pipe will run into the lake well beyond the spillway and will feed into a wet well, which resembles a silo, from whence water can be discharged into the main outlet or through a 24-inch pipe to serve downstream customers.

The Robert Lee Lake, which will have a capacity of 488,000 acre feet, will be about the biggest water storage facility anywhere in this area of West Texas.

Not only is it to be a primary storage reservoir for water which falls in West Texas and runs downriver, but it is also prominently mentioned in preliminary studies being made by the federal government as a place for water storage of excess water from East Texas or elsewhere which may be pumped upstream, in order to supply the needs of this growing area of West Texas.

Williams made 4 and on 4th down Roe made only 2. Roby took over at their 26 yard line. Three plays netted the Lions short yardage and Roby punted to the Steer 40. Devoll carried 14 yards for a 1st. Roe went for 14 more. Roe hit for 4 and with 2nd and 6, Williams rolled out to the left end and went the final 23 for a touchdown. Williams kept, going over right tackle for the extras and the Steers led 8-0. The Steers kickoff went to the 20 and the Lions had returned to the 41 yard line as the first quarter ended.

Second Quarter

The Steers held again and Roby punted to the Steer 32 yard line. A deep pass to Hall on second down covered 32 yards and the Steers again were in Lion territory. But Roby's defense held at their 39 and they took over at that point. After one first down, the Steer defense held again and Roby punted to the Steer 30. Roby rose to the occasion and held the Steers for no gain and a short punt went out on the 50 yard line. The Steers held Roby for minus yardage and Roby punted to the Steer 20. Again the going got rough and the Steers were forced to punt with the kick going to the Steer 43 yard line. Third Quarter
