

Diverted Acreage **May Be Grazed**

Farmers who diverted acreage under the 1966 feed grain, wheat, and cotton programs will soon be able to graze this acreage without losing program benefits, C. E. Arrott, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilizatoin and Conservation committee for Coke County, has anmounced.

Starting date for such grazing will be Nov. 1, marking the end of the 6-month period during which the no-grazing provision was in effect under the diversion programs.

Arrott stressed, however, that this program relaxation regarding use of the acreage applies only to grazing the acres diverted from commodity production. Hay on such acreages still may not be harwested.

, Land diverted under the Conservation Reserve Program may not be grazed or harvested through the whole year.
