## Court Okays Land Purchase

Coke County commissioners approved the purchase of additional land for county parks in Robert Lee and Bronte when they met Monday in regular session. The money to be used will come from \$30,000 worth of park bonds which were purchased by the county when the parks were first created.

The land to be purchased in Bronte is a tract across the county road from the present park. It is owned by Mrs. Ruby Davenport. Robert Lee land to be purchased is owned by Ellis Eubanks and now contains the Mountain Creek Golf Course. The land is now under lease to the golf association. Also included in the land approved for the Robert Lee Park is a block which is now being used for a Little League baseball field.

## Five New LVNs Pass State Board

All five graduates of the last student nurses training class at West Coke County Hospital are now licensed vocational nurses. They made the trip to Austin Oct. 20 to take the state examination. The new nurses are Miss Charlotte Smith and Mmes. Curtiss Trimble, Vera Allen, Jack Denman and J. E. Quisenberry.

Candidates from 76 schools took the examination with the Robert Lee class tied for 7th place. Mrs. Denman made one of the top eleven scores. All of the local women scored above 80, with 70 needed for a passing grade.

Antlerless deer may be taken in certain designated areas in the county. A map showing these places is on display in the courthouse. Antlerless deer permits were issued Nov. 9, and hunters must obtain their permits from land owners.

Bag limit is two bucks. Spikes are legal this year, as long as hardened antlers are protruding through the skin.

Limit on turkey is two gobblers or two bearded hens per season, and on quail, it is 12 per day or 36 in possession.

Legal time for hunting is from 30 minutes before sunrise until 30 minutes after sunset.

Coke County went solidly Democratic in Tuesday's general election. Unlike the state as a whole voters of this county gave a majority to unsuccessful U. S. Senate candidate, Waggoner Carr. The count was 399-284 in favor of Carr.

Gov. John Connally received an overwhelming 530-103 margin over T. E. Kinnerly.

Coke County voted down six of the 16 constitutional amendments which were voted on. All except one carried over the state as a whole.

In a race of more of a local nature, Rep. Gene Hendryx received 498 to Marvin Russell's 120 for the state legislature. Hendryx' lead extended throughout the district, also.

## Steers Stun Forsan Buffs, 16-0

### ROBERT LEE 16 — FORSAN 0

The Steers, after two weeks of solid defense and fine offense, sputtered by the Forsan Buffaloes with an inconsistent offense, but still the fine defense. Penalties marred the game with both sides drawing numerous amounts of setbacks. Forsan could not penetrate the Steer defense consistently and never did pass the 50 yard line until the final seconds with a long pass, but it went to no avail as the defense held again.

#### First Quarter

Forsan won the toss of the coin and elected to receive. Skipworth kicked deep to the 8 yard line. With a return to the 20 yard line, Forsan proceeded to try to move the ball. In 3 plays, Forsan netted only 5 yards, but on 4th down, in punt formation, Robert Lee drew an off side penalty and Forsan had a 1st down at the 30. But another three tries gained only 6 yards, and Forsan had to punt. They got off a fine one to the Steer 31 yard line.

With the ball returned only to the 35, the Steers moved quickly to score. Devoll got 4, a 14 yard pass to Pitcock, 9 yards by Blair, a 7 yard pass to Devoll, and then the bomb, a 36 yard pass to Hall for the T.D. Hall made a good offensive move to pick the ball out of the hands of a defender and race across for the TD. Devoll cracked over right tackle for the extra points and the Steers led 8-0.

Skipworth kicked off to the Forsan 10 yard line with a return to the 29. Forsan netted only 6 yards and again were forced to punt. The kick carried to the Steer 35 yard line with no return.

The Steers started another good drive, Blair, Roe and Devoll going for large chunks of yardage. Then a 23 yard pass to Hall carried to the Forsan 21 yard line as the 1st quarter ended.

#### Second Quarter

The Steers moved out to the 12 yard line only to sputter out and loose on downs. But they got another break as Forsan fumbled on the 18 yard line with Gaylon Pitcock

coming up with the ball. Again the Steers bogged down as Forsan held at the 15 yard line. Forsan made a 1st at the Steer 30, but Robert Lee got tough and held them there. Forsan punted to the Steer 33 and again Forsan held the Steers. Williams punted a long one to the Forsan 15 yard line. But the Buffaloes couldn't move either. They punted to the 50 yard line with a Robert Lee return to the 30 by Williams. In four plays the Steers covered the 30 yards with Roy Blair going the last 6 through a big hole at right tackle opened by Carl Bloodworth, Glenn Roach and Gaylon Pitcock. Ray Roe burst through the same hole for the extra points and the Steers now led 16 to 0. Skipworth then kicked off to the Forsan 13 yard line with a return to the 24 yard line. Forsan made a first on their 44, and then on 2nd and 9, Skipworth intercepted and returned to the Forsan 29 yard line. The Steers ran two plays and the half ended.

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**H D Agent's News Dept.**

During November, County Extension offices are being featured as "Consumer Education Centers" — all a part of a concerted national effort to alert people to the consumer information and education available from the Cooperative Extension Service. Special events are being held in most of the 3,000 local County Extension offices across the country. Each county in Texas will be participating by assisting with one or more activities.

Consumer competence is an area of major concern to the Extension Service because: (1) countless new products and changing merchandising methods complicate consumer decisions; (2) half of the first-time brides are teen-agers, inexperienced in managing a household; (3) heavy installment buying is increasing; and (4) the rate of personal bankruptcies is rising.

Consumer education, as Extension workers see it, is much broader than knowledge which helps one make a wise decision when buying a specific item. It involves being an informed, knowledgeable consumer in use of credit, care of items, the purchase of household services, education, travel, medical and dental services and recreation as well.

A Coke County's part in the "push to educate the consumer" a Consumer Home Improvement program will be held Thursday, Nov. 10, at 2 p.m. in the Recreation Building in Robert Lee. There is a story elsewhere in the paper with details. The public is urged to attend the program.

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### C-City Rites For Frank Herrington

Frank Herrington, 69, died at 4:45 a.m. Friday, in the Veterans Hospital in Kerrville after a long illness.

Funeral services were held in Kiker Funeral Chapel in Colorado City at 2 p.m. Monday, with the Rev. Lester Haines, pastor of First Methodist Church of Pleasanton, and the Rev. Wm. (Billy) Wilkinson, pastor of First Methodist Church in Colorado City, officiating. Burial was in Colorado City Cemetery.

Mr. Herrington, who had called Brady home after ill health forced his retirement, had operated a leather shop in Robert Lee a few years ago. He had been hospitalized most of the time for two years in Kerrville and Dallas, fighting a losing battle with throat cancer. His condition had been considered critical since early January, his last pass from the hospital being on Fathers Day last June.

A highly skilled leather craftsman, Mr. Herrington was for many years rated as one of the best of the boot and saddle makers of the Southwest. He had been associated with his brother, Hope Herrington, in Colorado City and had operated leather shops in Midland and San Angelo before coming to Robert Lee.

He was a veteran of World War I, having enlisted in the U. S. Navy for the duration of that conflict.

He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Born in Hamilton County, Sept. 3, 1897, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Willie Herrington of Colorado City and Lamesa.

He is survived by his wife, Elizabeth Herrington of Brady and Kerrville; one son, Frank Herrington, Jr., of San Antonio; one daughter, Mrs. A. A. (Frances) Preston of Germany; one brother, Hope Herrington of Carrizo Springs; his step-father, A. J. Herrington of Brady and seven grandchildren.

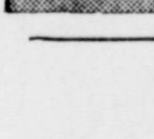

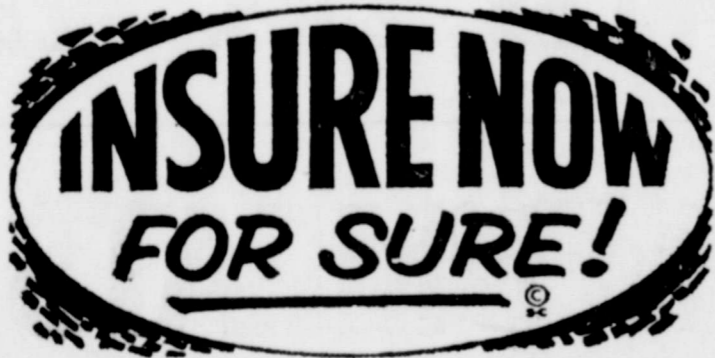
