Court Okays Land Purchase

Coke County commissioners approved the purchase of additional land for county parks in Robert Lee and Bronte when they met Monday in regular session. The money to be used will come from \$30,000 worth of park bonds which were purchased by the county when the parks were first created.

The land to be purchased in Bronte is a tract across the county Jayton Next On road from the present park. It is owned by Mrs. Ruby Davenport. Robert Lee land to be purchased is owned by Ellis Eubanks and now contains the Mountain Creek Golf Course. The land is now under lease to the golf association. Also included in the land approved for the Robert Lee Park is a block which is now being used for a Little League baseball field.



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


