Boys, Girls Champs Of Bronte Tourney

Robert Lee's junior high school boys and girls basketball teams made a clean sweep at Bronte's annual invitational tournament. They took championship honors in both divisions of the tourney.

Robert Lee teams squared off Friday afternoon in games with Sterling City, and wound up their invasion Saturday night in the tournament finals.

Girls Division

The girls defeated Sterling City 28-12 in the first round. Jackie Conley and Sheri Pitcock tied for scoring honors with 10 each, while Linda Blair had 8.

The girls' second game was with Blackwell and they took a 31-23 win. Conley's 15 was high for the locals. Pitcock followed close behind with 13, and Blair made 3.

In the final contest Saturday night, Robert Lee girls outlasted the Bronte girls in a contest which ended 37-25. Conley was again the leading scorer with 16. Blair had 12, and Pitcock made 9.

Boys Division

Robert Lee boys took an easy 31-20 victory against Sterling City in their first game of the tournament. Mike Mumford was high pointer with 22. Others who scored were Ernest Herford 4, Marshall Millican 2, Edwin Lindsey 2, and Waldon Millican 1.

In their second game, the locals swamped Eola, 45-16. Again Mumford was high with 27. Herford had 8, M. Millican 5, Allen, Lewis and Wojtek each made 2, and W. Millican had 1.

Tournament finals saw the Robert Lee lads take a close 28-27 win from Wall. High scorer was Mumford with 17, while Herford and W. Millican had 4 each, and M. Millican had 3.

Four On All-Tournament Teams

Four Robert Lee players made the all-tournament teams: Conley and C. Thomason landed spots on the girls team, while Mumford and M. Millican were placed on the mythical boys team.

Sewer Plans Approved By State Health Dept.

Mayor Robert Vauban reported this week that all requirements of the state and other interested agencies have been met in regard to Robert Lee's new sewer system. The mayor said unless there is

something to be done that he doesn't know about, all the needed reports and other data have been submitted to the proper authorities and have been approved.

A letter from the Texas State

Department of Health dated Jan. 6, 1967, read, in part:

"We have completed our review of the plans and specifications for the above referenced project (Robert Lee, Texas) and find that they conform to the Design Criteria of the Texas State Department of Health with the exception of alternate number four (4). We are herewith approving the plans and specifications, as submitted, excepting the above mentioned alternate, and are transmitting two copies to the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration for their approval."

Mayor Vaughan indicated in his report, which was made to members of the BCD in a meeting Tuesday, that the city council still expects to be able to get the project underway in the near future.

When final approval is received, the city will have to advertise for bids on the project, then open the bids and award the contract. Work should begin shortly after these procedures have been completed.

The new sewer system has been planned to care for a city of 2,500 population. It is to be financed with money obtained in a federal grant and from proceeds of a sale of revenue bonds which were voted overwhelmingly by citizens of this city.

Vaughan announced, also, that the city has acquired 12 acres of land from Zero Street along the river and up to the Earl Roberts home place to the west. This acreage is from 200 to 800 feet wide and runs along the river. Street No. 1 has been opened and others will be opened later. The city also plans to clear the land. This property includes an area which adjoins the site for the disposal plant of the sewer system. No definite plans have been made on development of the property, but the council has been toying with the idea of developing it into a city park.

Coke County's annual Livestock Show was held Monday in bitter cold weather. More than a hundred 4-H and FFA boys and girls braved the freezing temperatures, however, to show the animals which

they have fed and cared for during the past year.

An auction sale for the animals was held following the judging and awarding of prizes, loving cups and ribbons.

January Time for Voter Registration

January is the month to get taxes paid, if property owners want to avoid penalties. It is also the month to obtain voter registration certificates, according to County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs.

State and county, as well as city and school taxes all become delinquent Feb. 1 and redemption of such property causes extra expense, Jacobs said.

He urged that everyone who is eligible to vote in 1967 to secure a registration certificate during this month. This requirement applies to everyone between 21 and 60 years of age.

Prospective voters must either go by Jacobs' office and get their certificates, or write in for applications, which must be filled out, signed and returned to the office.

A supply of application blanks has been left at First National Bank in Bronte for convenience of persons living on the east side of the county.

Jacobs emphasized that any young people who will become 21 during 1967 must secure their certificates during January. He added that a certificate cannot be sent for, except that a person can secure one for a husband or wife or for a child who will become 21 during this year.

**BCD Hears Report
On Possibilities of
Tourism in Area**

Eighteen members of the BCD met Tuesday noon for a luncheon meeting in which considerable discussion was held regarding the city's new sewer system and tourism in this area.

President Jim Bickley gave a report on a meeting held last Friday in Colorado City to discuss tourism in West Texas. The session was sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Attending the meeting were Bickley, Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough and Gene Hinnard.

Bickley said it was brought out in this meeting that most tourist attractions are man made, and he emphasized that Robert Lee now has a big attraction under construction in the dam on the Colorado River.

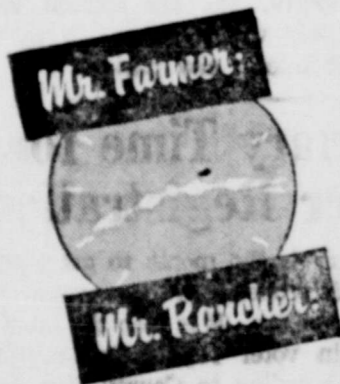
It was brought out at the meeting that tourism in Texas has increased 90 percent since a campaign was begun a few years ago, with the backing of Gov. John Connally.

"There is no doubt about it," Bickley said, "advertising and publicity pay off when it comes to attracting tourists to a place. Tourism is now Texas' third largest industry." The BCD president's point in the discussion was that Robert Lee needs to be ready to get its part of this business.

Sam Godfrey of Austin, Chief of Community Relations of the Texas Tourist Development Board, was present at the Colorado City meeting, and promised local representatives that he would be glad to help design a new brochure for pushing tourism in connection with the new lake and other attractions in this area.

Bickley read a letter from a Garden City, Kans., couple who are interested in a possible move to this area because of its climate. He also mentioned the fact that the BCD sponsors the local Boy Scout troop and that a Concho Valley Council banquet will be held Jan. 20 at the San Angelo Country Club.

Mayor Robert Vaughan gave a report on the status of the sewer project. More details on this will be found in another story in this issue of The Observer.

Notice is hereby given by the County Judge of Coke County, Texas, for Depository of said Coke County and Coke County Common School District Funds for the next two (2) years, in accordance with Article 2544 (2440) Revised Civil Statutes, 1925 of Texas, at the February Term, beginning on the 13th day of February, 1967. Said Court will receive proposals from any banking corporation, association or individual bank in said County that may desire to be selected as the Depository of said County.

Any banking corporation, association or individual bank in said County desiring to bid, shall deliver to the County Judge on or before the first day of the Commissioners' Court at which the selection of the Depository is to be made, a sealed proposal, stating the rate of interest that said banking corporation, association, or individual banker offer to pay on the funds of the County for the term between the dates of such bids and the next regular term for the selection of a depository.

Said bids shall be accompanied by a certified check for not less than one-half of one per cent of the County's revenues of the preceding year as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder, and that if his bid should be accepted he will enter into bond as herein provided, and upon failure of said banking corporation, association or individual banker that may be selected as such Depository to give the bonds required by law, the amount of such certified check shall go to the County as liquidated damages and the County Judge shall re-advertise for bids, said Court reserving the right to reject any and all bids proposed.

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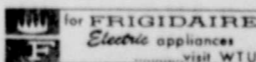

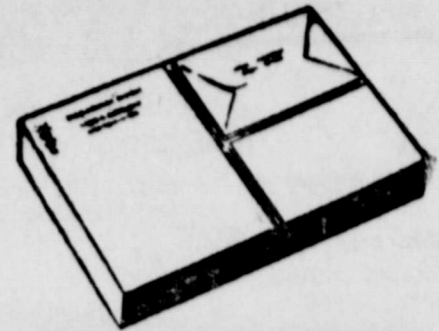

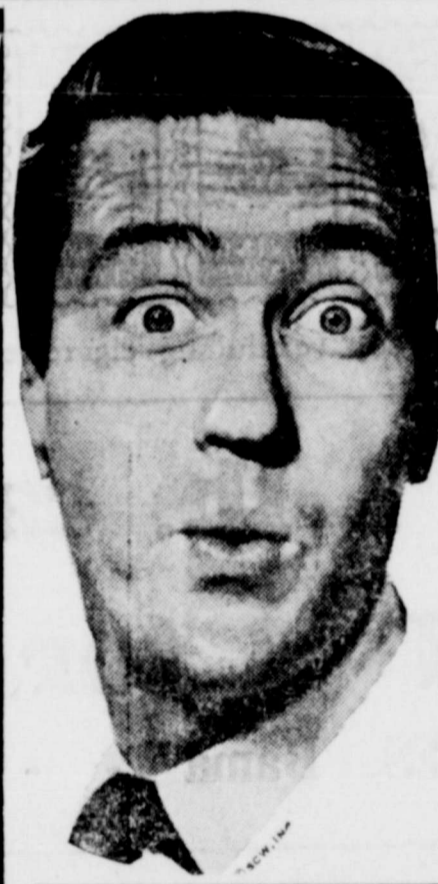
