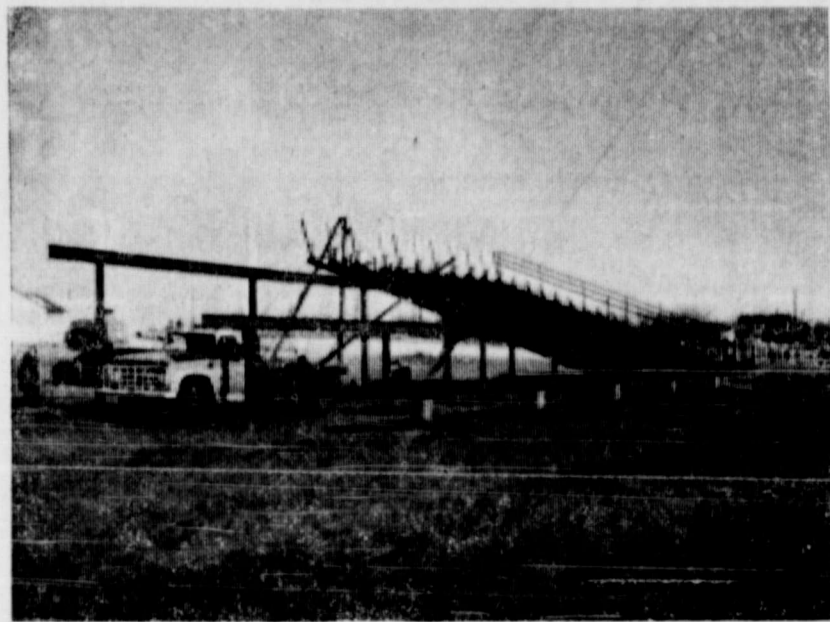

## Joe David Key Gets Eagle Scout Award

Joe David Key received the Eagle Scout award and numerous other scouting awards were made at the program last Saturday night in the Robert Lee school.

The annual blue and gold banquet was served at 6:30 p.m. with Jim Herford, cub leader, as master of ceremonies. He told the group that the boy scout movement was organized in 1910 with the cub scouts beginning in 1930 with 5,000 boys. In 1933, it had grown to 34,000 Cub Scouts; in 1940 there were 195,00 Cubs and in 1965 more than two millions boys were Cub Scouts.

Cubs receiving awards included silver arrows to David Beaty, Jimmy Martin, Terry Wojtek, Carl Bagwell, Jeff Eubanks, Douglas Herford, Jim Jacobs and Bill Rowldt. Eddie McDaniel received two silver arrows, while James Beaty, Jerry Sirus and Jim Craig received 3 silver arrows. Awarded 4 silver arrows were Harvey Wojtek and Mike Walker. Terry Sparks was awarded the Wolf badge, 1 gold and 1 silver arrow. Ronald Ross received 1 gold and 1 silver arrow award.

Several boys qualified for one gold and 4 silver arrows. They were Dennis Ross, Lynn Sockwell, Vincent Hanna, Mike Davis and Jesse Eads. Mike Sowders received a Bobcat award.

Joe David Key, Mike Mumford and James Fields were presented certificates for serving as den chiefs. Cub scout den mothers are Den 1, Mrs. Dale Wojtek; Den 2, Mrs. E. C. Davis; and Den 3, Mrs. Melba Heck and Mrs. Jerome Sirus.

Each of the three Dens presented a part on the program. Den 1, in a skit, spelled out "freedom" and gave "what freedom means to me." Den 2 put on a "Beatles" act, mimicing their dress, playing

and singing. Den 3 sponsored contest in which each boy and his father were given a sack of newspapers, pins and scissors. They had to create a dress and hit for the boys mother and fit it on her in ten minutes. David Beaty and his father, Bill Beaty, won the contest.

The group then moved to the auditorium for the scout program. Gene Hinnard, scoutmaster, gave a rundown on the meaning of scout work to a boy, and the requirements for each type scout advancement.

Star awards were presented to Lane Beaty, Melvin Allen, Pat Lewis, Kenneth Prine and Charles (Buzzy) Wojtek. It requires two to five merit badges to earn the Star award.

Highlight of the evening came when Joe David Key was presented the Eagle Scout Award, scouting's highest award, in a candle light ceremony. Melvin Allen, James Fields and Buzzy Wojtek lighted the candles. Key was escorted to the stage by Danny Smith, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. David Key, were escorted to the stage by Roy Ivey.

Vince Hobbs of San Angelo, Concho Valley Council executive, presented the award. His talk was built around scout work but emphasized honesty and ability.

## Sewer and Water Plant Bids Opened Tuesday

W. B. Abbott of Lubbock and San Antonio Construction Co. of San Antonio were the apparent low bidders Tuesday on sewer and water projects for the City of Robert Lee.

Bids were taken on three separate projects: the sewer gathering system, the sewage treatment plant and water system improvements. San Antonio Construction was apparent low bidder on the treatment plant, and Abbott was apparent low bidder on the latter two projects.

Mayor Robert Vaughan said Wednesday morning that contracts will not be awarded for several days as figures have to be tabulated by the engineer. Also final approval on the two sewer projects have to be obtained from the Farmers Home Administration, Texas State Department of Health and the Federal Pollution Control Department. Final approval on water system im-

provements has to come from FHA, the health department and the Upper Colorado River Authority. It is hoped, the mayor said, that the contracts can be awarded in 30 days.

A large crowd of city officials, UCRA directors, county officials, contractors and other interested persons gathered at the Rec Hall

Tuesday afternoon for the bid opening. Ty Collins, a representative of National Engineering Co., read the bids.

Seven bids were received on the water treatment plant improvements, with the low bid of \$92,081 coming from Abbott.

His bid of \$87,723 was low among the eight received on the sewage treatment plant.

W. J. Merck, of San Antonio Construction, submitted a bid of \$184,482.95 for the low figure among eight bids received on the sewer gathering system.

## No Candidates Out For Hospital Jobs

No candidates had filed Wednesday morning for director of West Coke County Hospital. J. E. Quisenberry, secretary of the hospital board, said that the ballot was still blank at that time.

Candidates have until Tuesday, March 7, to file for the two director jobs, which become vacant next month. Directors whose terms expire this year are Fagan Parker and T. A. Richardson.

Holdover directors who have another year to serve include Fred McCabe Sr., Quisenberry and James E. Hereford.

A candidate must have a petition signed by at least 25 qualified voters filed with the secretary at least 25 days before the April 1 election, Quisenberry said.

## Four Announced For School Trustee

Today (Thursday) is the last day to file for school trustee, according to information released this week by County Judge W. W. Theford. He also reported that four candidates have filed for the three vacancies which occur on the Robert Lee School board this year.

Candidates who have filed include Douglas Gartman, Billy J. Blair, Truman Hines and Bobby Baker. Gartman and Hines are presently serving on the board. Marvin Simpson, the other incumbent, had not filed for reelection Wednesday morning.

The election will be held Saturday, April 1, at the school.

D. K. Glenn has filed for reelection as county trustee at large. C. E. Arott of Precinct 4 and Noah Pruitt Sr. of Precinct 2 have both filed for reelection to the county board. Members of the county board from Precincts 1 and 3 do not come up for election this year.

## 3 Incumbents Seek City Council Jobs

The three incumbents, A. B. Sheppard, O. H. Campbell and Gene Hinnard, have filed for reelection as city aldermen. No other candidates had filed Wednesday morning.

Candidates have through Saturday to file with the secretary in order to get their names printed on the ballots.

Remaining on the city council with another year to serve are Mayor Robert Vaughan and Aldermen Freeman Clark and Vaughan Davis.

Balloting for the city jobs will be held April 4.

## Services Held Here For John Brown

Funeral services for John H. Brown, 64, were held Tuesday in the Southside Church of Christ. Bill Roach officiated. Burial was in Robert Lee cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were James Craig, Lawrence Higgins, Jim Barnhill, T. M. Wylie Jr., Delbert Vestal and Will Percifull.

Mr. Brown died at 9:45 p.m. Sunday at his home here of an apparent heart attack.

He was born March 28, 1902 in the Valley View community south of Robert Lee. He was married to Ruth Pritchard Dec. 2, 1923, at Robert Lee.

Mr. Brown was a member of the Church of Christ, the Masonic Lodge and was a naval veteran of World War I.

He had operated a blacksmith shop and done carpenter work before opening the Brown Lumber and Hardware business here. He retired from the firm four years ago, turning the management over to his son. He had been the Coke County Republican chairman since 1963.

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**H D Agent's News Dept.**

Some fabrics, because of a particular design or weave, require special thought and care when you select a pattern and place it on the fabric. Such fabrics as plaids, stripes, prints with an up and down, widely open spaced prints, diagonal weaves, twills, corduroy, and velveteen fall into this category.

You should select the pattern and fabric on the same shopping

tour. It is difficult to say that one should be selected before the other. Usually the pattern is selected first, however. Consult the pattern envelope for suggestions of kinds of fabric to use, or for those not recommended for the pattern.

Fabrics that require matching are usually more attractive and easier to cut and sew if you select a pattern with a few pieces. Remember that the design or weave of the fabric should be the main interest of the garment, rather than seams or decorative lines.

Designs of plaids, stripes, diagonal and geometric prints should be matched to give a professional look. Alter the pattern to fit before the garment is cut. Change in seam lines after cutting may make the design difficult.

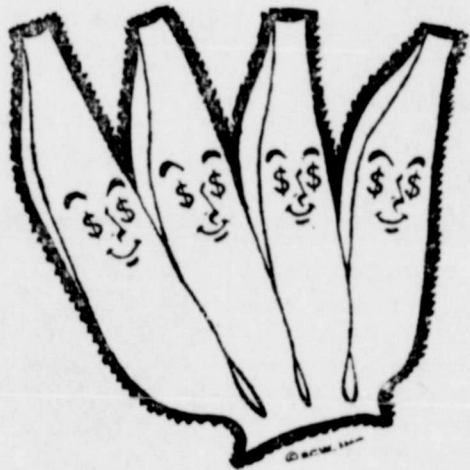
Be careful to cut on the correct grain of the fabrics that have a design which must be matched. Check the fabric before you buy it to see that it is not

woven or printed off grain. It is impossible to straighten some off-grain fabrics.

**Save and Use Bacon Drippings**

Don't throw away bacon drippings! Save those flavor drops for cooking and seasoning.

To keep drippings in the best condition, pour them into small jars so that the bottom layers won't become rancid. Date or number the jars and store them in the refrigerator. Use the oldest fat first.

One pound of bacon will yield anywhere from one to one and a half cups of drippings. There are any number of ways in which to use this excellent energy food. It's an ideal seasoning for vegetables. Use it as a basis for soups and white sauces. It adds meat flavor to scalloped dishes, soups and creamed mixtures.

Use bacon for frying eggs, French toast, potatoes, apple slices, and meats. Drippings are excellent for "buttering" crumbs for caseroles. Light muffins, coffee cakes, gingerbread, spice cakes,

and rich cookies can use bacon drippings to advantage.

In baking with drippings, use one fourth less than for other specified shortenings, because its shortening power is greater than other fats.

**Use Hard-Cooked Eggs**

Remember the days when eggs were hard-boiled?

Within the past decade there has been a change in egg recipes. For centuries, people have been eating hard-boiled eggs or using them in their favorite egg dishes. Now, hard-boiled eggs are out of style.

In their place, hard-cooked eggs are the thing. The reason is that boiling tends to make egg whites leathery and tough.

How do you keep eggs from being tough, hard-boiled characters? Put the eggs in a pan and cover them with lukewarm water. Heat rapidly on the stove until the water begins to boil. Remove from heat at once and put a tight cover on the pan. Let the eggs stay in the hot water about 15 minutes.

For easy peeling after cooking, pour off the hot water and run cold water over the eggs until they are cool enough to handle. Then crush the shells by running them back and forth over a smooth surface. The shells come off with no trouble.

Eggs are exceptionally plentiful now. Supplies are about 6 percent larger than at this time last year. Egg production is always high at this season.

Once you convert some of these plentiful fresh eggs into the hard-cooked variety, you have the beginnings of delicious stuffed eggs, using your favorite filling, or they might be served on top of cornbread, toast, broccoli or boiled ham or smothered under a cheese sauce, sour cream or creole sauce.

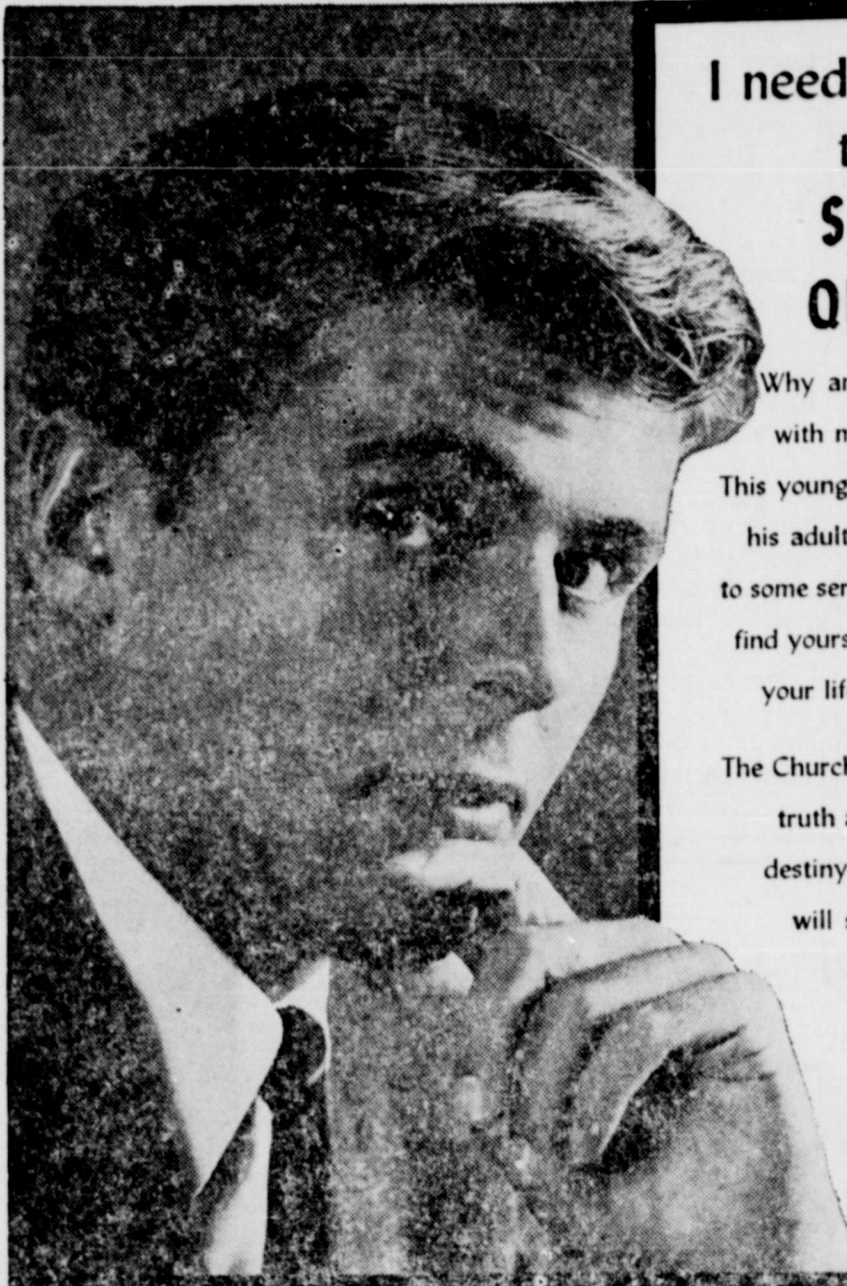
Assisting Mrs. Roe with the program will be Miss Joy Arrington Home Management Specialist of A&M University, and Robert
