Ozona Meet

The Robert Lee boys won sixth place at Ozona March 4, stacking up 63 points. Sixteen schools entered the meet.

The big point maker was a third place win by the 880 relay team, which came in with a time of 1:39.5. Members of the team are Ray Don Roe, Buddy Vosburg, Randy Hall and Roy Blair.

Other winners were Hall with second place in the 880 yard run.

Absentee Voting Now In Progress

Absentee voting is now in progress for three elections which will be held early in April. Persons who will not be able to get to the polls on the election days may cast their ballots now for directors of West Coke Hospital District, for trustees of Robert Lee Independent School District, and for alderman of the City of Robert Lee.

Absentee voters in the city election should go to the city hall, while those who wish to cast their ballots in the school and hospital elections should go to the county clerk's office in

the courthouse.

Only two candidates, Clifford Wilson and Curtis Walker, are candidates for the two hospital director positions. This election will be held Saturday, April 1.

In the school trustee election, which will also be held April 1, four candidates are seeking the three positions which become vacant this year. Running are Douglas Gartman and Truman Hines, who are presently serving on the board, and Billy J. Blair and Bobby Baker.

Voters of the school district will also ballot on a county trustee at large. D. K. Glenn of Bronte is the only candidate filed for this position.

The city election will be held Tuesday, April 4, with four candidates on the ballot. Three spots are to be filled. Running for city alderman are Gene Hinnard, O. H. Campbell and A. B. Sheppard, all incumbents, and M. L. (Pete) Smith.

Shelton Anderson Rites Held Here

Funeral services for Shelton Anderson, 65, of San Angelo and former longtime Robert Lee resident, were held Monday in Robert Lee Methodist Church. Officiating were Bill Roach, minister of South Side Church of Christ, and the Rev. Bill McKinley, Methodist pastor.

Mr. Anderson was killed as a result of a one car accident which occurred at 7:30 a.m. Sunday seven miles north of Sterling City. He was dead on arrival at a Big Spring hospital. A Department of Public Safety representative said Mr. Anderson was traveling north when his automobile went off the road and hit a culvert. He apparently died of a broken neck.

Mr. Anderson was born Dec. 17, 1901, in San Jacinto County and came to this area as a small boy with his parents, the late Wade and Jennie (Tubb) Anderson. He was a cook by profession. He was a veteran of both World Wars I and II.

Survivors include two brothers, Hal Anderson of Miami, N. M., and R. Sherman Anderson of Silver; several cousins, nieces and nephews.

Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Vaughan Davis, W. W. Thetford, O. H. Campbell, Turney Casey, Bob Fields and Perry Post.

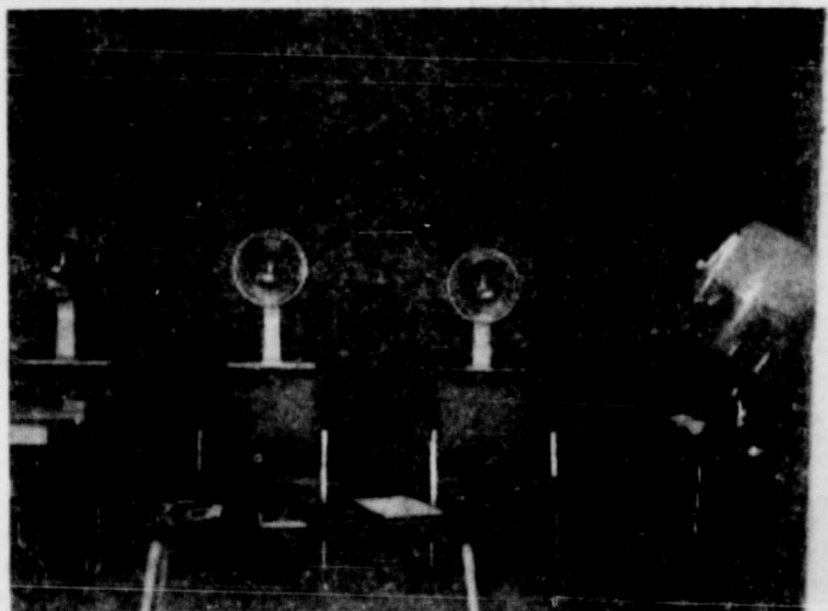
Hugh Lewis Jr. announced that Robert Lee Housing Authority is still waiting on approval of final plans before advertising for bids on building a low rent housing project here.

Sewing Machine Care

If you expect your sewing machine to give you the greatest service and satisfaction, you can't neglect proper care. To guarantee perfect operation, homemakers need to clean, oil and lubricate their machines periodically.

Refer to the instruction book for specific care information and always for motor care instruction.

After you have completed a garment, remove lint and fluff from the take-up lever, thread guides, tension discs, bobbin case and machine surface with a soft, clean cloth. If necessary, dampen the cloth to clean the machine surface, but don't use a detergent.

Then with a lint brush clean the feed dog and hook or thread-handling areas under the throat and slide plates. After each cleaning apply a drop of sewing machine oil to these areas. For specific oiling points, refer to the sewing machine instruction book. After oiling, always sew a few lines of stitching on a scrap of material to remove excess oil. Every few months, clean the area behind the face plate and oil the top and bottom of the machines in the oil holes.

If the machine is to be stored, clean all exposed parts and areas behind the face plate. Swab these parts with a lint brush saturated in sewing machine oil to protect the machine from rust. Rust damage is more likely to occur when the machine is stored in a small closet than when the machine is kept open to the air. Keep a small piece of fabric under the pressure foot with the needle down through it to protect the foot and feed from damage. When the pressure foot is down, the pressure spring is released and its life prolonged. Also excess oil will be carried into the fabric by the needle rather than accumulating on the needle.

Water Softeners Save Soap

Soft water or softened water can help homemakers save money because less soap is needed. It also helps prevent soap curd deposits on clothing.

Homemakers who want to know how much water softener to use may try this test. Put one gallon of hot water in a container with one-half teaspoon of softener. Stir until it is completely dissolved. Always put the softener into the water and agitate the chemicals before adding the soap.

Prepare three clean quart jars. Put two cups of the hot water solution in each. Then add one-eighth teaspoon of soap to the first jar, one-fourth teaspoon of soap to the second, and one-half teaspoon of soap to the third jar. Shake each jar vigorously for ten seconds to create a mass of suds. Let them stand for five minutes. If the suds stand up for five minutes, the water is softened. If the one-half teaspoon of softener does not soften the water, repeat the test using one teaspoon water softener per gallon.

Repeat this test for each specific brand of soap or detergent used. It's important to use accurate measurements of water softener to a given quantity of water.

Correct proportions of soap or detergent in soft or softened water, adequate water temperature, correct wash cycle, and thorough rinsing combine to clean clothes satisfactorily.

The little things add up. Careful measuring of all cleaning materials means better cleaning, better management. Look at instructions on cleansers and fi-

gure out how you might plan more wisely with each.

Home Economics Briefs

The latest wrinkle in washable window coverings is a flame resistant treatment which cuts down on kitchen fire hazards. This is being applied to curtains made of blended natural and synthetic fibers in an openwork weave.

An allowance loses its education value if a parent dictates exactly how a child is to spend his money.

Make a sour cream dessert by blending together one cup of cultured sour cream, two teaspoons grated orange peel, and two teaspoons sugar. Serve on squares of cake.

The key to keeping nuts fresh is to store them in a cool place. Nuts should be kept in tightly

covered containers or aluminum foil packages in the refrigerator or freezer.

3rd Program On Money Management Is Scheduled By Extension Service

There may be no statistics to prove it, but it's a safe bet that just about every family that succeeds in staying ahead of the bills uses some kind of money management plan.

Of course, there are plans and there are plans. In some families, sound money management is accomplished by talking over proposed expenditures and keeping a sensible balance between income and outgo. Most families use some form of financial records—ranging all the way from a simple account book to complex ledgers where the amount of money available for each type of expense is carefully spelled out.

Many still prefer some variation of the familiar envelope system. Dad brings his pay home in cash, which is then parceled out into as many envelopes as there are major items of family expenditure.

Simple as this system sounds, it has a number of drawbacks—apart from the obvious risk involved in keeping substantial amounts of cash around the house.

This system probably made better sense in the days when money generally was earned—and spent—on a week-to-week basis. But nowadays more and more people are paid about twice a month, and some—such as teachers and government workers—just once a month. A similar pattern can be seen on the spending side of the ledger as well.

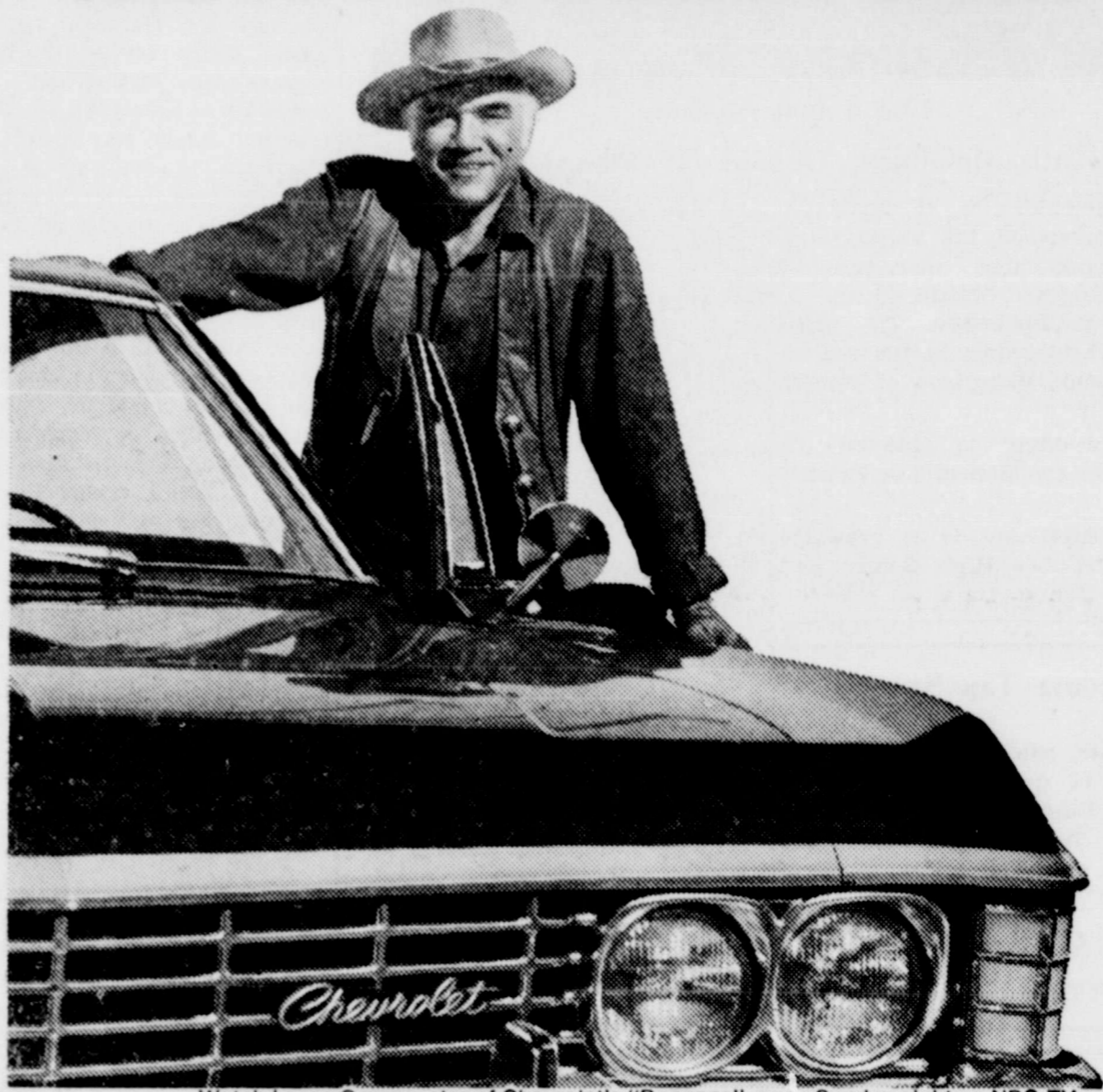

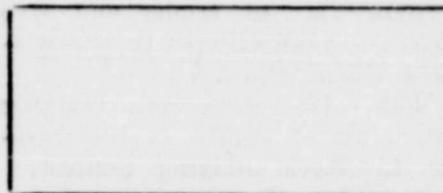
