### May 4, 1967 Test Runs Made LETTERS TO On IAB Flooding

Preliminary test runs of water into the injection wells have been made by the operating company, Standard of Texas, in the NE IAB Field around Sanco.

Clyde Construction Company of Odessa have completed the construction of secondary recovery facilities, including pipe line from Silver, pressure maintenance pump station a half mile west of Sanco, and water lines to the injection wells.

Final tidying up of the construction phase has been about completed and local information is that the water pressuring is ready to get fully under way.

Oil production on the Meneille, Dickey, Bird, Simpson, Hayes, Boswell, Bible, Adkins, and Wyatt leases from Highway 208 east is involved, at a level of just over 5,000 feet.

Three former producers have been reopened as injection wells for the entire unitized fields. These are in a line running from Meneille, through Dickey and Simpson, north and south.



Could you feed a family of 11 on \$20 a week? This small sum would have to provide a 90-cent meal for all eleven people. It can be done, but only with a struggle.

live on a farm, they would have to buy nearly all of their needs. To get the required foods our body needs, we should have milk, fruit and vegetables, eggs or fish, and cereal.

hardly afford while fluid milk, topped with cheese or a sauce, or but they could use powdered filled. milk and receive the greatest amount of food value - protein, calcium, and some of the vitamins. Sufficient Vitamin A and C would be missing.

Vitamin C would be supplied by potatoes if they were cooked the second bowl and then folded in their skins or baked. Potatoes into the egg whites. at least twice a day would fill up the "empty space."

Cereal and bread would probably be the third food stuff we would include, preferably whole grain for the greatest yield in food nutrients. Oatmeal could be the standard breakfast. Whole wheat or rye meal flour would be best for bread.

Protein would come mostly from eggs, which could be stretched in the form of pancakes or French toast to give everyone a share. Any meat would have to be ground beef, a stew meat, liver or sausage, where there is no waste. Dried beans and peas could supplement the protein supply of milk. Beans also provide iron.

If she swallowed her pride a bit, the homemaker could ask the grocer for vegetable trimmings usually thrown away - such as the nutritious outer leaves of lettuce. Any splurging on vegetables should go for carrots, rich in Vitamin A. Macaroni and rice could be served with tomatoes, possibly some cheese.

Hungers for sweets and fats can best be acquired with sugar and lard. "Wonders" can be performed with a bacon square, the least expensive form of bacon. It can give flavor to gravy, spaghetti sauce, and other dishes. When all the meat has been cut from the rind, use it to grease the griddle when making pancakes. Use the rind, after all the grease is gone, for flavoring in pea or bean soup. There's a lot of mileage from bacon.

The United States May Plentiful Foods Lists features eggs, orange juice, beef and potatoes. Remember to include these foods in the meals for your family often during the month - you can save money this way.

With a good supply of eggs on hand during May, lead the way to tempting eating with delicious omelets. For each serving, take one, two or three eggs, add a tablespoon of liquid for each egg, sale and pepper to taste, sugar if desired, and you're on the way to the creation of a tasty omelet.



To our knowledge no new screwworm cases have been found in Coke County. We have had a number of samples submitted, but only the one case found on the Spade Ranch was reported to be screwworms. For a dry year the number of fleece worms and other maggot types has been fairly high.

I saw some wet country last week - and more dry country. The area between Munday and Wichita Falls appears to have had some heavy rainfall week before last. The low places were full of water in most of that

Our purpose in passing through that area was to attend the National Soil Judging Contest. Our team failed to place among the leaders, but did have a good educational experience. They were competing against 35 other teams from 30 states. One little slip and you are out of the running.

The latest we have from down state in the way of an estimate on when to expect the pecan nut casebearer hatch in this area indicates the hatch will be five to ten days earlier than normal. This means, based on their findings, we can expect the casebearer between May 15 and 25.

We hasten to add that there is only one way to know when to spray to control the casebearer by making periodic inspections

In a year such as this one and based on present information, two sprayings look in order one to hit the early hatch, one to hit the middle and late emergers. We will give more information as the time approaches.

Regular additions of raw organic materials or residues to the soil mass are necessary for good soil structure and tilth.

Soil structure usually is defined by the arrangement of the soil particles. Organic matter and humus tend to cause soil particles to clump together in aggregates or small granules.

A granular or crum structure is a most desirable soil condition. Excessive tillage or cultivation destroy the aggregates, and poor soil condition results.

Allowing organic materials to decompose in the soil tends to stimulate the formation of aggregates and stable granules, thus making the granular or crumb structure conducive to good aeration and water infiltration.

A great deal of concern has developed over possible deficiency and the need for its addition to some Texas soils, reports Dr. C. D. Welch, Extension soil chemist at Texas A&M University.

In some instances, zinc has been included in fertilizers containing other plant nutrients and improved crop growth has been noted. But, unless a check plot is fertilized in a similar manner but without zinc, the improved growth cannot always be attributed to the addition of the zinc.

There are conditions under which zinc deficiency has been found and these may serve as a guide. Alkaline soils, those with a pH above 7.5, show a higher incidence of zinc deficiency due to the lower availability of zinc in alkaline soils. Most of Coke County's soils fit this pH cate-

If zinc deficiency is suspected it can be corrected on the present crop by a foliar spray.

Welch suggests the use of a one-fourth to one-half percent solutions of zinc sulfate or chelated zinc along with a detergent as a wetting agent. Dissolving from one to two pounds of either zinc sulfate or chelate in 50 gallons of water will give proper solution. Do not make the solution too concentrated, since the leaves can be more easily damaged with zinc compounds than with iron. The addition of onefourth pound hydrated lime to

> A standard practice in most regions in Texas is to add two pounds of zinc sulfate per 100 gallons of the regular pecan orchard spray, especially those on alkaline soils.

If a zinc deficiency is suspected on field crops, confirm it through the use of a folair spray this year and prevent it next year by including suitable zinc compounds in the regular fertilizer, advises Welch. Soil tests are being developed to assist in identifying those soils which should receive an application of zinc.
