

No damage was sustained at the site of the Robert Lee reservoir and dam when the rising Colorado River threatened the under construction of the morning glory spillway. Heavy rains on the watershed early last week caused concern for the spillway by project officials Wednesday of last week.

However, the river crested at the damsite about 10 a.m. Wednesday and the flood waters begin to recede, leaving no damage. Officials said every effort was being made to protect the concrete work in the spillway.
