

Egg Is "Instant" Nutrition The egg is one of nature's most nutritious ready-packaged foods. Egg suplies are plentiful

now, resulting in lower prices.

It's no trick to cook up a pan of hard-cooked eggs at the beginning of the week and have them ready to use at any time. When cooking eggs, be sure the water is kept below the boiling point. An easy method to hard-cook eggs is to cover them with cold water and bring the water to the simmering point. Turn off the heat and allow the eggs to remain in the covered pan of hot water for 15 to 20 minutes. Cool eggs at once in cold running wa-

Butter in which eggs are fried should be kept below the smoking point. The key to cooking eggs is low temperatures, so protein remains tender and tasty.

The hard cooked eggs can go into salad dressing, combined with canned kidney beans, pickles and celery for a salad. They are delicious in a cheese sauce over rice or toast; egg sandwich fillings are excellent, and deviled eggs are always a favorite.

For extended periods of a month or more, or if the refrigerator is to be moved or stored, it's important that specified care procedures be followed.

The refrigerator should be emptied of all food, defrosted completely, cleaned thoroughly, and disconnected. The door should be left open for 24 hours or longer because the hidden insulation holds moisture even afing is most important in prevent ing the development of odor, mil-

dew, or mold. It is also highly important that the refrigerator door be left ajar during storage. In fact, it's a smart idea to insert a wedge or prop to insure an opening. If the refrigerator insulation is damp and the door closed, the dewed, and odorous. Often this placing the insulation.


