Info Due On Coke Poverty Program

More information on the antipoverty program for Coke County is expected in the next few days, according to County Judge W. W. Thetford. He called the Tom Green County Community Action Council office Monday and was told by the director, J. O. Stinnet, that details of the program should be available soon.

The San Angelo office has been designated as district headquarters for a large area of West Texas, including Coke County. The Office of Economic Opportunity recently approved a grant of \$271,257 to set up the program in this area.

An appreciable amount of the grant will be used to make a study of the area to determine just what type programs are needed, and for setting up offices in each county which shows a need and requests the aid.

The money will be divided among all the counties involved on a bisis of the number of residents who qualify because of low





Getting Good Peachy Flavor

Fresh fruit pickings are real peachy this summer.

For fresh eating, sort and use the ripest peaches first. Ripen a substantial production increases Lee. those that are unripe at room temperature, away from direct heat or sunlight. Store ripe peaches in a single layer on the coldest shelf of the refrigerator It's best to prepare fresh peaches just before you are ready to use them. If they must be sliced a little ahead of time, sprinkle slices with lemon or lime juice to prevent darkening.

Here are a few ideas for adding variety to fresh sliced peaches. Try this ROMANOFF SAUCE. You'll need 1 egg yolk, rind of 1 lemon, juice of 1/2 lemon, 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, 1/2 cup light corn syrup, 1/4 cup sugar and 1 cup whipping cream, whipped. Blend egg yolk, sugar, lemon rind and juice. Stir into corn syrup. Put into heavy saucepan and bring to boil, stirring constantly. Boil 2 minutes. Stir in butter or margarine. Chill until thick (about 2 hours). Just before serving, fold into whipped cream and spoon over fresh sweetened sliced peaches.

Two favorite toppings for sliced peaches are ginger topping and peanut brittle topping. To make GINGER TOPPING, use 1 cup smooth cottage cheese, 2 teaspoons finely chopped candied orange peel and 1/2 teaspoon finely chopped candied ginger. Stir all ingredients together and spoon over fresh sliced, sweetened peaches which have been flavored with about 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

For PEANUT BRITTLE TOP-PING, use ¼ cup crushed peanut brittle, % teaspoon grated orange rind and 1/2 cup whipping cream, whipped. Fold all ingredients together. Spoon over sweetened fresh sliced peaches flavored with about 1/2 teaspoon almond extract.

If you plan to freeze some of your fresh peaches, select firm, fully ripe fruit. Pack in moisture - vapor proof freezer containers after sorting, washing, peeling, halving or slicing. Pour 1 cup sugar over 6 cups of prepared peaches or pour 40 percent sugar syrup over peaches in the container. Make 40 percent sugar syrup with 3 cups sugar and 4 cups water. Add 1/2 teaspoon ascorbic acid to each quart of sugar syrup to preserve color durin freezing. Cool syrup before pouring over fruit in freez-



> This amendment would raise the amount which could be borrowed under the program from \$7,500 to \$10,000. The program was initiated in 1949. Additional bonds were approved by voters in 1951 and 1956. Amendments to enlarge the bond authorization were rejected at elections in 1963 and 1965. Opposition came mainly from Dallas and Houston.

Proponents emphasize that, while thousands of veterans have benefitted from the program, it has cost the state no money and actually has turned a profit of \$2,500,000 a year while providing an expanded land market.

Opposition has adopted the argument that it is not the function of the state government to engage in the loan business and that veterans have had plently of time to participate. Some also contend that "cheap money" invites purchaes of land not needed and which will not be put to productive use.

Amendment No. 2 specifies that the legislature, in providing for creation of hospital districts, does not have to require that the districts assume full responsibility for community mental health and retardation centers and services. It would permit cities and counties to levy taxes and issue bonds for such services. Subdivisions within exisiting districts would be authorized to do so unless statues creating the districts expressly prohibit.
