## City Water Improvement Project Is On Schedule

Mayor Robert Vaughan gave a report on progress of the water plant improvements project now underway when Robert Lee BCD met Tuesday at noon.

The mayor said that the improvements are "coming along fine and on schedule." W. B. Abbott of Lubbock has the contract on the project, as well as on the sewer treatment plant, also under construction.

Vaughan told BCD members that the city's pumping facilities were doing a good job so far in staying up with the demand for water. He said on some days when usage is heavy the water tower gets low by night time, but the pumps have been able to recover the full capacity during night hours.

The city is selling water for use in mixing concrete being used

in construction of the dam. The city is receiving 40 cents per 1,000 gallons for this water.

Vaughan told the audience that he didn't feel there was any cause to worry about rationing water. He pointed out that some towns in this area are rationing water, but he didn't think it would be necessary in Robert Lee. The city lake has plenty of water in it, the mayor pointed out, and the only thing which could cause rationing would be the limited output of the pumps.

## Scout Hut Discussed

President Jim Bickley brought up the matter of repairs to the Boy Scout hut, which is located in Robert Lee County Park. The building is in need of a new roof and other repairs.

In a general discussion of the matter, BCD members talked about use of the Scout hut for fa-

mily reunions and other public functions when the recreation hall is in use. Some members were of the opinion that its use should be limited to the Boy Scouts, since they cannot leave projects in the building or have a library or displays because the building cannot be locked. It was pointed out that the building was financed by public donations for the Boy Scout program.

President Bickley told BCD members he would discuss the matter with Scoutmaster Gene Hinnard and see what can be worked out. He will report back at next week's meeting.

Rev. Bill Beaty introduced his guests, Rev. Ferris Akins of Ballinger and Jerry Pickett of Mason, who are conducting a revival meeting at Robert Lee Baptist Church. Thirteen members were present.

### Lemons and Limes

Summertime need not be the time for your appetite and spirits to droop.

Not when two of nature's best pick-me-ups, lemons and limes, are around.

The tart tingling taste of lemons and limes is just made for the hot summer days when something cool really hits the spot. You'll find the gang around your house will go for the snappy taste of drinks made from them.

And lemonade and limeade are so easy to prepare and serve attractively. No need to wait until the last minute either. Keep a jugful chilled for ready use in your refrigerator. Or perhaps in a more concentrated form, pour into an ice tray. Freeze. And presto, lemonade or limeade cubes. They will delight the children.

For the next party try something different. Combine  $\frac{3}{4}$  cup of sugar and 3 cups of water. Boil for 5 minutes and let cool. Add 1 cup of grapefruit juice,  $\frac{3}{4}$  cup lemon juice and 1 -  $\frac{1}{2}$  cups lime juice. Stir until well blended, chill thoroughly, and you have a tempting drink called an APPETIZER DELIGHT. You

will be known as the "hostess with the mostest."

Summer and parties go together and no party is complete without guest-pleasing punch. The next time you entertain try FRUIT PUNCH. For this you will need 2 small cans lemon juice, 1 No. 2 can grapefruit juice, 1 No. 2 can orange juice and 1 46 oz. can pineapple juice.

Also 2 -  $\frac{1}{2}$  lbs. sugar made into syrup (use 2 -  $\frac{1}{2}$  cups water), 1 small bottle almond extract, food coloring and 1 -  $\frac{1}{2}$  gallons of water.

Boil 2 -  $\frac{1}{2}$  cups water and 2 -  $\frac{1}{2}$  pounds sugar to make a syrup. Chill. Combine fruit juices, extract, syrup and iced water. Add coloring to give desired shade. What a hit it will make with your guests.

Here's an idea combining lime and a summer favorite, cantaloupe LIME DRESSING ON CANTALOUPE SALAD. Thaw concentrated lime juice. Whip  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup heavy cream and liquified nonfat dried milk or evaporated milk until fluffy and firm. Add  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup (4 tablespoons) limes juice to whipped topping, 1 tablespoon at a time, whipping after each addition. Yield:  $\frac{3}{4}$  cup.

Serve atop a combo of chilled cantaloupe balls and chunks of fresh pears. Makes a delicious duet.

For a different slant on an old American favorite, lemon pie, try CREAMY LEMON CHEESE

PIE. You will need  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup fresh lemon juice, three 3 - oz. pkgs. cream cheese, 2 beaten eggs and  $\frac{3}{4}$  cup sugar. For the topping you will need 1 tablespoon grated lemon peel, 1 tablespoon sugar, and 1 cup sour cream.

Mix lemon juice and cream cheese together. Add beaten eggs and sugar; beat until fluffy. Pour into vanilla wafer crust and bake at 350 degree F. for 15 to 20 minutes. Remove from oven and let cool for 5 minutes.

To prepare topping mix lemon peel, sugar, and sour cream. Spread over pie. Return to oven and bake 10 minutes longer. Chill in refrigerator at least 5 hours before serving. This lemon pie will be a big hit with your family.

Now is the time to enjoy tart lemons and limes. With their distinctive and refreshing flavors they lend themselves to many dishes and beverages says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Their bright colors make them true appetite stimulators, for they add an unusual note of gay eye - appeal to your fare. And what better way to get your supply of important vitamin C?

Both lemons and limes are in abundant supply at area markets, reports USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service. So put them on your August shopping lists.

### Wardrobe Planning Hints

Careful planning is the key to stretching your clothing dollar. Take a good look at your present wardrobe. Repair and clean all items that need it and discard garments that are never worn. Keeping them in the closet just wrinkles and crowds good garments.

Make a list of the activities you take part in. See if you have proper clothing to meet these needs, and, if not, make a list describing the necessary garments.

You will probably not be able to buy all of them at the same time but the list will help develop a clothing plan. Allow a certain amount for each purchase. Decide which garments you need immediately and which you can buy later. Divide your money so you have enough to meet your needs.

Take advantage of sales. If trying to match a purchase with a garment you already have, wear that garment or take it with you to the store. Don't allow yourself to get into the predicament where you will need to buy something else to go with the new article you just bought.

Other things to check in the store are quality, fit and care need. More money may be invested in such long-term items as shoes, handbags, basic dresses,

suits and coats while fad clothing and infrequently worn garments can be less expensive and of lower quality.

The ideas given here will be helpful in planning the fall wardrobes for all members of the family.

### Home Economics Briefs

What a child wants for breakfast and what mother wants him to eat often are nutritionally equal. A breakfast of hot dog, bun, milk shake and an orange is the same nutritionally as a breakfast of orange juice, egg, cereal, and milk.

Research has brought another convenience product to the homemaker - instant fruit. Peaches, strawberries, and blueberries are reduced to a puree to which sugar and chemicals are added. The puree is frozen into pellets which are dehydrated by a freeze-

drying process. This removes moisture without changing the fruit's physical characteristics. Fruits that are too mature for shipping may be successfully used in this process.

To remove a meat juice stain from a white or colorfast cotton table-cloth, first sponge the stain with cool water. Or soak the cloth in cool water for 30 minutes. Then rub detergent into the spot and launder the cloth in hot suds.

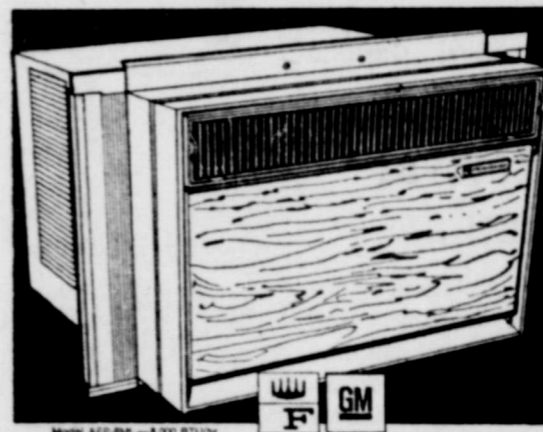

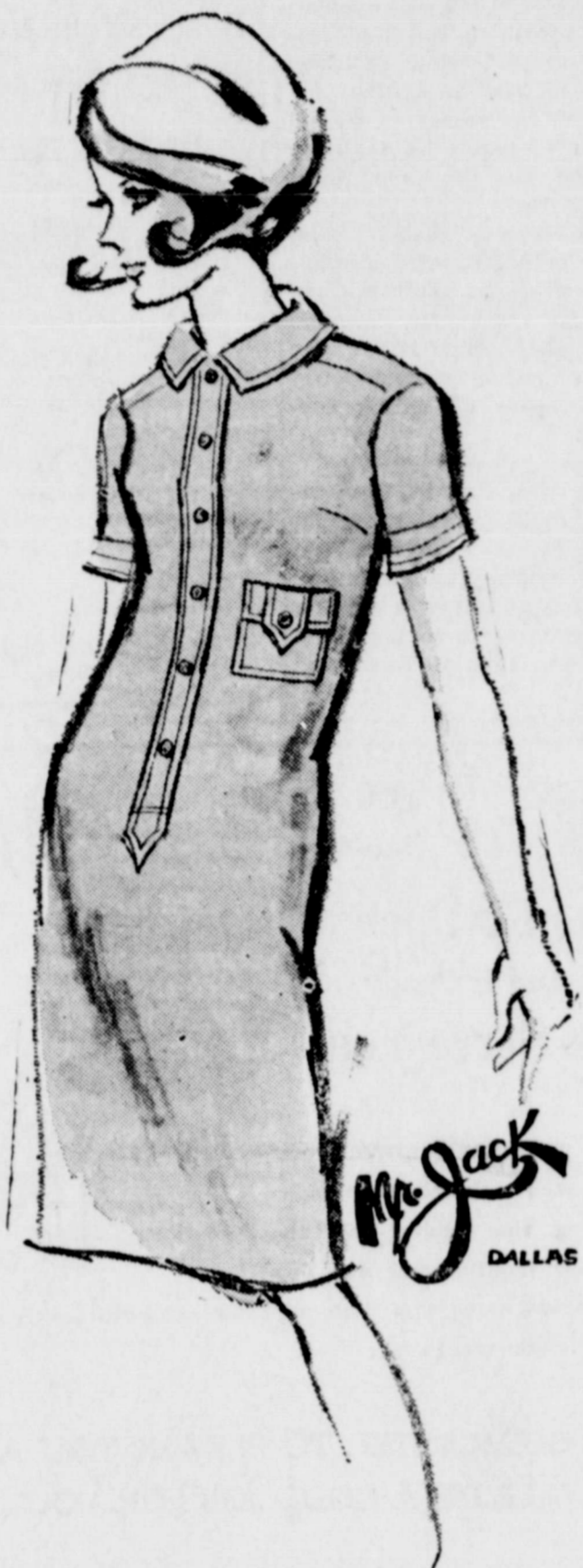

One day after receiving a 40-year service award from the Texas Highway Commission, State Highway Engineer Dewitt C. Greer announced his retirement. Greer reached the mandatory retirement age of 65 on July 27; but he agreed, at the behest of the Commission, to stay in the job until the end of the year.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, acting as governor while Connally hunts in Africa, called on Greer at his office to present him with a framed copy of proclamation making August 4 "Dewitt C. Greer Day" in Texas.

A celebration commemorating the Highway Department's 50 year is slated for September 2. A highlight of the celebration will be presentation to Greer of funds donated to endow in his honor a lectureship at the Texas A & M Civil Engineering Department.

Greer, a graduate of A & M went to work for the Highway Department in 1927 and became its top administrator in 1940. During his tenure as chief engineer, Greer has supervised the investment of more than \$4,000,000 in a highway system that's grown from 20359 miles to more than 68,000 during the past 27 years.

A former president of the American Association of State Highway Officials, Greer now serves on the organization's executive and legislative committees and has received its two highest honors for contributions to highway progress. In 1965, Texas Christian University made him an honorary Doctor of Laws. Texas A & M gave him its Distinguished Alumni Award in 1966.

**SUCCESSOR NAMED** — Succeeding Greer on January 1 will be Asst. State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall who has been with the Department since 1928 except for the World War II years when he served in the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers and four years he spent as Engineer - Manager of the Texas Turnpike Authority, supervising the financing, design and construction of the \$58,000,000 Dallas - Fort Worth Turnpike.

Dingwall served as the Department's supervising urban engineer in Houston, overseeing construction of the Gulf Freeway — the first major freeway built in Texas. He has been assistant state highway engineer since 1958.

In other Highway Department activity, Hal Woodard of Coleman was sworn in as chairman of the Highway Commission, and Herbert C. Petry Jr. of Carrizo Springs took the oath to begin an unprecedented third six-year term on the Commission.

Woodard, who succeeds Petry as chairman, was first named to

the Commission in 1955.

**AGENCIES** — A deed has been signed by the School Land Board giving the United States the minerals under 47,895 acres in Guadalupe Mountains National Park.

Two days of hearings, October 17 - 18, have been scheduled by the Texas Water Rights Commission on proposed cancellations of unused water rights for diversion of water from the Rio Grande, indicating that the Commission will apply the newly passed Water Rights Adjudication Act to Rio Grande rights first.

Water Rights Commission has found that directors of Brazoria County Water Control and Improvement District No. 8 have failed to comply with the law by appointing directors to fill vacancies for which there is no unexpired term of office; by not appointing a board of equalization; by collecting too much from the District for services and expenses; and by not calling a special election to fill vacancies.

Board of Insurance put the new driver penalty point system into effect on August 1. By levying \$6,439,362 in penalties on drivers who had wrecks or serious traffic offenses during the year just ended, the Board was able to cut average rates by one per cent.

Texas Employment Commission reports that a total of \$8,209,000 in unemployment insurance benefits was paid to eligible claimants in Texas during the April - June quarter.

**PRICE - FIXING SUIT** - State of Texas has filed a price - fixing suit against five big drug firms.

Suit entered in federal court at Dallas by Atty. Gen Crawford C. Martin, seeks triple damages totaling about \$12,000,000 from the producers of aureomycin, terramycin and tetracycline products. Drugs involved are used to treat both animal and human diseases and as animal feed supplements.

According to Martin, the federal government already has an anti-trust suit pending against the same firms: Charles Pfizer and Co., Inc.; American Cyanamid Co.; Bristol - Meyers Co.; Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp.; and the Upjohn Co.

Martin alleges that the drug manufacturers charged state and local governments "unreasonably high" prices for the antibiotics through a conspiracy to limit their manufacture and sale. Furthermore, the attorney general contends, the firms' actions inflated prices to retail druggists, wholesalers, private hospitals and the consumer.

Martin estimated more than \$3,000,000 has been spent by state and local governments alone be-

tween November, 1953, and November, 1966 to buy antibiotics for use in public - supported hospitals, schools and other institutions and health or welfare programs.

Other states are contemplating similar suits, Martin said, and state attorneys general will discuss the case at their conference in Portland, Ore. on August 29.

**HEALTH GRANTS SOUGHT** - Seventy eight health facilities have applied for federal Hill - Burton construction grants of more than \$34,500,000, about twice as much as is expected to be available for Texas.

New 1968 Texas State Plan for Construction and Modernization of Hospitals and Related Medical Facilities now is available for review at the State Department of Health.

Hill-Burton Act provides funds to help finance construction and modernization of general hospitals and long-term facilities, diagnostic or treatment centers, rehabilitation facilities, tuberculosis hospitals and public health

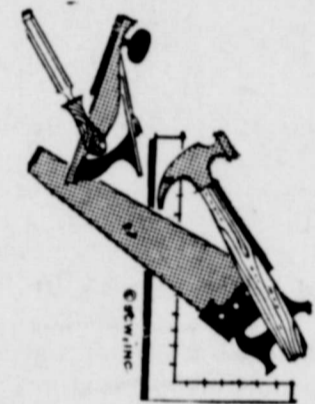

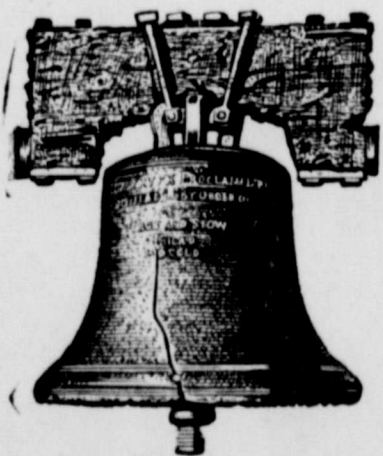

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or draft was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, may be used by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a 'series of bonds' being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
