| "The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed confer the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces abovenamed and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or draftof the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwith- standing, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. <br> "Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereBoard may be used by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the ex- penses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or re- sale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and dends; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the intercome due on any such additional bonds. <br> "All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a 'series of bonds' being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re- | tirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereretire all of the bonds here- after issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein. <br> "This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amend- ment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans Land <br> "Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature. <br> "This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption." <br> Sec. 2. Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional $\$ 200,000$,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law." <br> "AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940 , and the date of formal withdrawal of the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section $49-\mathrm{b}$, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional $\$ 200,000,-$ 000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law." <br> Sec. 3.
