PEACE CORPS TO TEST ON AUGUST 19

Coke County area residents interested in serving with the Peace Corps in developing nations are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement Test at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, August 19 in Room 2201, Post Office Building, in Abilene.

The test measures general aptitude and ability to learn a foreign language, not education or achievement. It is given to determine where and how an applicant will be happiest and best utilized overseas. The test requires no preparation and is noncompetitive; an applicant can neither pass nor fail. The test takes approximately one hour and a half.

Persons interested in serving with the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before the test. Application forms are available

from local post offices or from the Peace Corps in Washington, D. C. 20525.

15,000 Peace Corps Volunteers with widely varying backgrounds are currently serving in 56 developing nations in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Pacific. They are working with the people of these nations in self help projects ranging from food production and health to education and community action.




