Election Precincts Are Consolidated

The following information is made up of excerpts of minutes from a meeting Monday of the Commissioners Court. It explains the new setup in election precincts of the county. The consolidation, the commissioners pointed out, was not done because of the wishes of the court, but because a new state law provides that voting boxes with less than 50 registered voters must be consolidated with another box.

It was brought to the attention of the Court that three major election law bills were passed by the 60th Legislature of Texas at its Regular Session which ended on May 29, 1967.

Trimble Services Held Here Tuesday

Funeral services for Curtis Wayne Trimble, 69, were held at 3 p.m. Tuesday in Robert Lee Methodist Church. The Rev. Bobby Palmos, pastor, and the Rev. Jimmy Rogers of San Angelo officiated. Burial was in Robert Lee cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Ned Thomason, F. C. Clark, Bob Fields, O. B. Jacobs, J. B. Robertson, L. B. Menille, Fred McCabe Sr. and Fern Havins.

Mr. Trimble died at 1:30 a.m. Monday, Sept. 11, in West Coke County Hospital after being hospitalized Thursday of last week with a heart attack. He had been in ill health for several years.

He was born in Robert Lee, March 3, 1898, the son of the late Monty E. and Lura Vowell Trimble, county pioneers. He was married to Willie Hickman April 30, 1933, in New Mexico. They lived in Carlsbad, N. M., for a number of years and returned to Coke County in 1942. He was engaged in ranching until ill health forced his retirement.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Nancy Julia Trimble, of the home; two brothers, Jack and Edward Trimble, both of Robert Lee; and three sisters, Mrs. Ernest (Alma) Varnadore of Robert Lee; Mrs. Jessie Russell of Lovington, N. M. and Mrs. Verna Donaghue of San Angelo.

2.04, Texas Election Code fixes a minimum of 50 voters for each election precinct, ascertained by the number of voters in the last preceding presidential election year, and provides that if there exists any election precinct in the county which does not comply with the foregoing requirements, the commissioners court shall make the necessary changes before the first day of October, 1967.

In compliance with the foregoing requirements, IT IS ORDERED BY THE COURT that:

The Sanco Election Precinct No. 7 and Robert Lee Election Precinct No. 1 be consolidated and that all voters in these two Election Precincts will vote at the courthouse in Robert Lee beginning with the General Election on November 4, 1967. It shall be called Robert Lee Election Precinct No. 1 with Mrs. Patti Ivey the Presiding Judge and Mrs. Willie Clark the Assistant Judge.

The Olga Election Precinct No. 11 and the Bronte Election Precinct No. 2 be consolidated and that all voters in these two Election Precincts will vote at the City Hall in Bronte beginning with the General Election on November 4, 1967. It shall be called Bronte Election Precinct No. 2 with Matthew Caperton the Presiding Judge and Noah Pruitt the Assistant Judge.

The Juniper Election Precinct No. 15 and Tennyson Election Precinct No. 4 be consolidated and that all voters in these two Election Precincts will vote at the School House in Tennyson beginning with the General Election on November 4, 1967. It shall be called Tennyson Election Precinct No. 4 with Sam Gaston the Presiding Judge and James Arrott the Assistant Judge.

The Divide Election Precinct No. 5 and the Green Mountain Election Precinct No. 9 be consolidated and that all voters in these two Election Precincts will vote at the Community Center at Green Mountain beginning with the General Election on November 4, 1967. It shall be called Green Mountain Election Precinct No. 9 with Finnell Smith the Presiding Judge and D. O. King the Assistant Judge.

Rites Held For R. B. Allen, 84

Last rites for Robert B. Allen, 84, of San Angelo, former long-time Silver resident, were held at 2 p.m. Monday in the Colorado and Jackson Street Church of Christ in San Angelo. Officiating were Douglas Rohre of Longview and W. H. McClish. Burial was in McKenzie Cemetery near Silver. His grandsons served as pallbearers.

Mr. Allen died at 11:55 p.m. last Friday in Clinic Hospital in San Angelo.

Born in southern Missouri, he came to West Texas with his parents 80 years ago. Mrs. Allen came from Mississippi 75 years ago with her parents. They were married May 6, 1906 at Tennyson and celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary last year. They moved to San Angelo 7½ years ago, after living most of their married life at Silver.

While living at Silver, Allen was a school teacher and stock farmer and served as chairman of the Coke County Democratic Executive Committee for 29 years. Mr. and Mrs. Allen were lifelong members of the Church of Christ and he was an elder in the Silver church.

Survivors include his wife; six daughters, Mrs. Walter T. Jones and Mrs. William L. Archer, both of San Angelo, Mrs. Jerrell E. Sanders of Eldorado, Mrs. E. E. Allen of Vancouver; three sisters, Mrs. W. L. Carr of San Angelo, Mrs. Tom Parrish and Mrs. George Hancock of Austin; two brothers, Elmer Allen of Orient and Newell Allen of Midland; 23 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

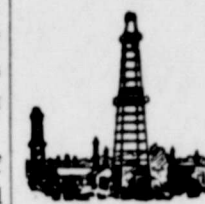

From The Oil Field



Humble Oil & Refining Co. has dually completed No. 2 George B. Arledge 16 miles northwest of Robert Lee. Location is 2,172 feet from the north and 467 feet from the west lines of Section 235, Block 1-A H&TC Survey.

Latest completion is in the Bloodworth, Northeast (5,800 Ft. Canyon) Field.

It had a calculated, daily potential of 175 barrels of 45.2 gravity oil, plus five barrels of water. This was based on a 20½ hour potential of 149 barrels.

Flow was through a 16-64-inch choke with packer set on the casing and 650 pounds tubing pressure. Production is from perforations at 5,913 - 23 feet.

Original completion was in the Panther Gap, North 5,660 - Foot Canyon Field for a 22 - hour potential of 198 barrels of 45.7 gravity oil. Flow was through a 20 - 64 - inch choke and perforations in the interval from 5,860 - 70 feet.

Steers Take Easy 36-0 Victory From Yellowjackets

ROBERT LEE 36, MENARD 0

The Steers took their first game with little difficulty, which showed very little competition from the opposition. Menard had boys that could hit and hit hard but their execution of play was something else.

The Steers had a few surprises for the fans such as the play of Tooter Fields at end after three years in the tackle position; the coming of sophomore Jackie Preslar at center and the fine blocking on pass plays of Mike Post, Lynn Beal, Lonnie Bloodworth, Danny Smith and Gary Parker. James Fields, a starter as a freshman is coming along real good.

Steer backs had trouble holding the slick ball at times but Donnie Devoll, Roy Blair and Rickie

Whitaker put 122 yards rushing on the books. Randy Hall was his usual self, running away from everybody, catching a pass and picking up vital yardage. Gary Williams passing and running were sharp as he completed 13 of 19 passes for 167 yards. That leaves only two, Ronnie Devoll and Darrell Pitcock, who played mainly on defense. Pitcock picked off two passes, stopped two others, and Devoll, playing linebacker, stopped every end run his way for losses, plugged the gaps on off tackle plays. The Steers get a real test this week, but with that old hustle, blocking and heads up ball it could be interesting.

First Quarter

Menard won the toss and elected to receive. Taking the kick on the 15 they returned to their 35 yard line. On the 2nd play they fumbled at the 40, and Randy Hall

came up with it. With 1st and 10, Williams dropped back and fired a perfect strike to Hall at the 15 and Hall trotted over for a quick 6-0 lead. Devoll hit off right tackle for the extras and it was 8-0.

The Steers kicked again and the Yellowjackets advanced to their 33. On a roll out the quarterback was met head on and lost back to the 26. He was stopped by Parker and Beal with the other linemen coming up fast. Then Menard took to the air and promptly Pitcock intercepted at the 44 and returned it to the 24 yard line. Three plays moved the Steers to the 10 where Williams circled left end for the score. The try for extras failed and the Steers led 14-0.

The Steers kicked off and with a return to the 33 yard line, Menard had a 1st and 10. But dis-

aster struck again for them and Whitaker recovered a fumble for the Steers on the 38 yard line. Then, in succession, Williams hit Fields for 14 yards, Hall for 17 and then a 7 yard TD to Fields. Try for extra points again failed and the Steers led 20-0.

Menard returned the kickoff to the 33, then moved to the 45 where the Steers held on downs. A quick pass and run play, Williams to Donnie Devoll netted 27 yards as the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

A running play and a 9 yard pass to Devoll put the ball on the 19 yard line. But the Steers fumbled on the next play and Menard recovered, only to fumble it back to the Steers, with Donnie Devoll recovering at the 19. From there Mike Post attempted a field goal, but it went wide and Menard returned it to the 16 yard line.

The Steers held and Menard punted to the Steer 48 yard line. In four plays the Steers moved it to the Menard 40 and with a quick snap Donnie Devoll crashed through right guard, cut to the right, and 40 yards later was in the end zone with another 6 points. The blocking was near perfect on this play with a good second effort by Devoll when he was hit at the 30. Try for extras was good on a kick by Post and the Steers led 27-0.

The Steers kicked off to the 10 where it was returned to the 18. Robert Lee held and Menard punted to the Robert Lee 45 and it was returned to the Menard 48. Another fumble and Menard had it on the Steer 45. Menard again returned the fumble and Tooter Fields recovered on the 47. The Steers couldn't move and punted

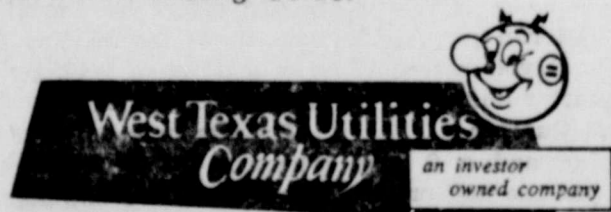

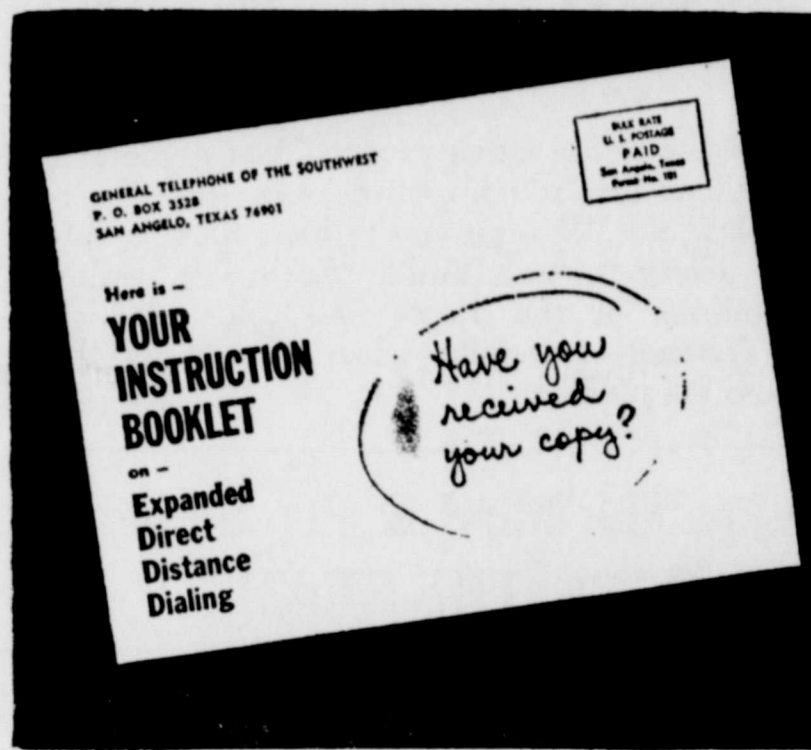
