Scholarship Tests to be Taken

Robert Lee High School students who expect to complete their secondary school requirements and to enter college in 1969 can register now to participate in the 1968-69 National Merit Scholarship Program, Principal Garland Davis announced last week. The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide competition is to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT). The test will be given in the school at 9 a.m., Tuesday, February 27.

Participating students pay a \$1 fee. When his NMSQT scores are reported, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him evaluate his scores, compare his performance with that of other high school students across the country, and give him information on choosing a college and financing his education. The handbook and other interpretive materials are furnished as a part of reporting the test results.

The highest-scoring students in each state will be named Semifinalists and will be eligible for Merit Scholarship consideration. In addition to the National Merit Scholarships financed by NMSC, more than 350 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional associations, unions, trusts, other organizations, and individuals offer scholarships through the Merit Program.

About 15,809 students have won Merit Scholarships in the 12 Merit programs to date. Some 2450 Merit Scholarships were awarded in 1967.


