## Amendment Election Set For Saturday

Coke County voters will join
those over the rest of the state
when they go to the polls Satur-
day to vote on six proposed a-
mendments to the Texas constitu-
tion.
Four ballot boxes will be set up
in Coke County, one in each com-
missioner precinct.
Voting places and election
judges have been announced as
follows:

Attention of voters is called to
the new style ballots which will
be used for the first time in Sat-
urday's voting. Instead of each
proposition being listed twice,
there is only one printing of each
proposed amendment. Beside each
proposition are two boxes, with
FOR printed by one and A-
GAINST by the other. Voters will
make an X in the box which in-
dicates the way they want to
vote. There will be no more
scratching out the proposition not
wanted.
Ballots which have an entry
scratched will be declared muti-
lated and will not be counted.
Texas voters will approve or dis-
approve the six constitutional
patches to the much amended
Texas constitution, listed below,
in the order they appear on the
ballot.

1. Authorize counties to put all $|$
