Here is a recipe that might be used as a means of using up leftover chicken or turkey from Thanksgiving dinner.

Try this:

Chicken or Turkey Taco Pie 3 to 4 cups diced chicken or

- turkey 1 can enchilada sauce
- 1 can mushroom soup
- 1 large onion, chopped ½ teaspoon garlic salt Dash pepper
- 11-ounce package corn chips
- 1 cup grated cheese 1 cup chicken broth

Combine chicken, enchilada sauce, mushroom soup, onion, garlic salt and pepper. Grease a

cover with corn chips. Pour 1 Angelo. cup chicken broth over mixture. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Serves 6. This dish freezes well. If frozen, bake at 350 degrees F. for 11/2 hours.






