Work Begun On New Highway To Sterling City

Preliminary work has begun on rebuilding Highway 158 west of Robert Lee. Contract for the job has been let to Strain Brothers, Inc., and Charles Hunter Strain of San Angelo to do the work on the 8.4 mile strip of road. Their bid was \$1,184,248.

The new road will take the place of the present Highway 158 which will be covered with water when Robert Lee reservoir starts retaining water, and the overall

project will include a small portion of Farm to Market Road 387 (to Water Valley) where the two roads coincide along the new route.

Notes From The Oil Field

Bloodworth, Northeast (5,750 Canyon) Field three miles east of Silver gained a new well last week.

It is Tucker Drilling Co. Inc. of San Angelo No. 1-C (formerly No. 1-B) E. W. Walker. Location is 467 feet from the north and 1,640 feet from the east lines of Section 305, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 62 barrels of 45 gravity oil. Flow was through a 24-64-inch choke with 200 pounds casing and 75 pounds tubing pressures.

It is producing from perforations in the interval from 5,682 to 5,705 feet. Pay was treated with 500 gallons of mud acid, 1,000 gallons of regular acid, and fractured with 10,000 gallons of fluid, 10,000 pounds of sand and 800 pounds of beads.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 5,775 feet, total depth.

Gas-oil ratio was 2,629-1.

E. B. Germany & Sons and Paul Page of Dallas No. 1 Salsich, in the Eliza Baker, North (Caddo) Field, 12 miles north of San Angelo, has been plugged and abandoned at 6,446 feet. A one hour and 15 minute drillstem test in the Caddo lime from 6,336-64 feet recovered 120 feet of slightly gas and salt water cut mud and 2,880 feet of salt water.

of Sterling City, will be in active charge of the construction job.

Bailey told The Observer that work will begin at the Y in Robert Lee, cross the river south of the lake basin and intersect the present Sterling City highway near Edith.

The construction will include a new bridge across the Colorado River and the rebuilding of the intersection in Robert Lee. The new road will be much wider than the present one. Pavement will be 26 feet wide, with nine foot paved shoulders on each side.

Included in the contract are grading, structures, flexible base and two course surface treatment, Bailey said. Contract calls for completion of the job in 240 working days.

Rebuilding of the highway from Robert Lee to Bronte is also in plans of the Highway Department. Bailey said that the department would call for bids on it some time in the late spring or early summer of 1968.

This section of road will also have 26 foot paving with nine foot shoulders. County commissioners already have secured the right of way and have been busy constructing new fences in places where the route will be changed. A large amount of straightening will be done, Bailey said.

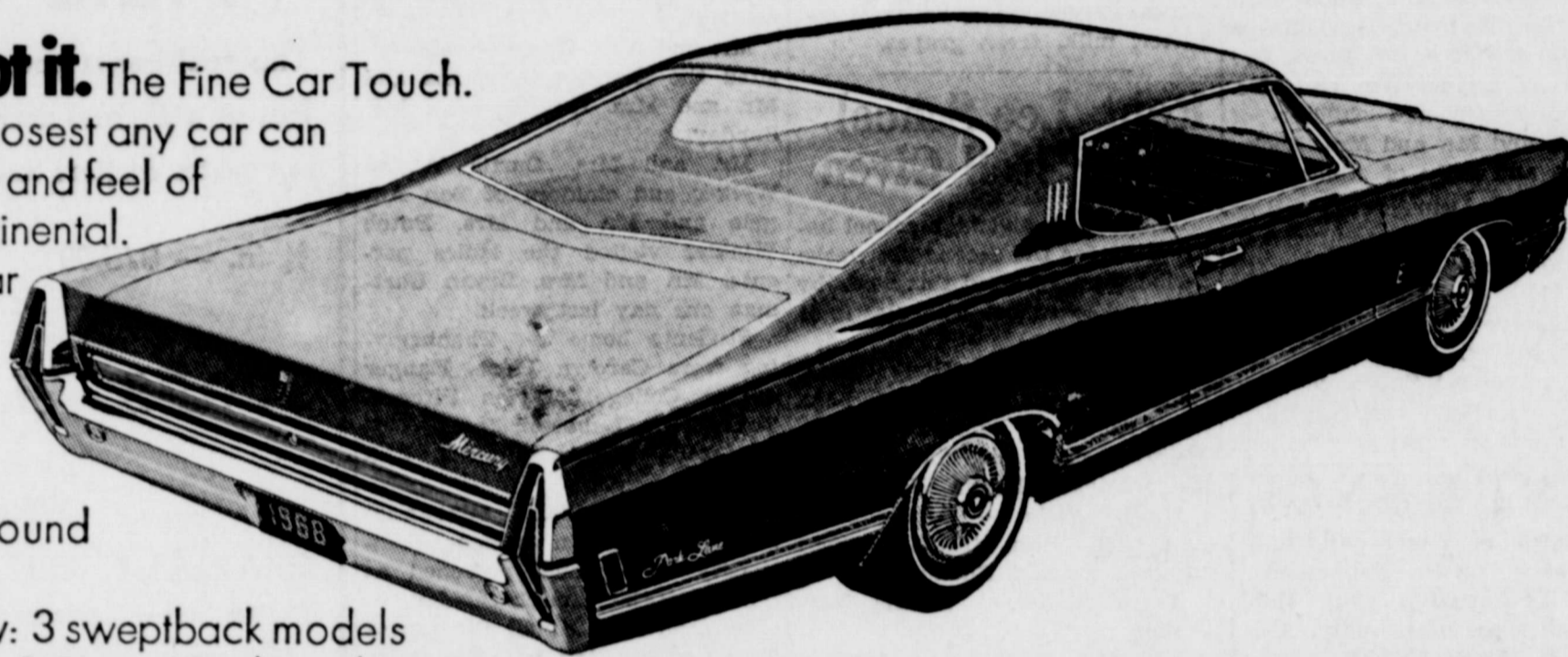

PUBLIC NOTICE OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

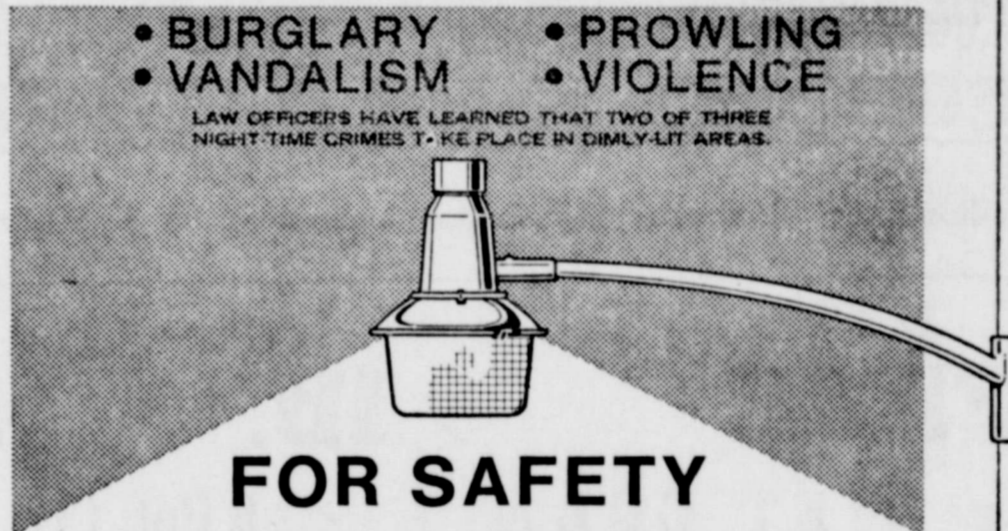
