The state supreme court said it found no reversible error in a ruling of the Third Coort of Civil Appeals which upheld a decision of Judge Joe L. Mayes in 51st District Court in Coke County.

Original count of votes in the Silver box was 76-74 for consolidation. After going through Judge Mays' district court, several irregular ballots were invalidated, and he ruled that the election carried by hte same small two-vote margin, but the count was 73-71.

The suit is styled J. B. Walker et al vs. W. W. Thetford, et al. The plaintiffs include several who live at Silver or formerly lived there. The defendants in the suit include Coke County's four commissioners and County Attorney Frank C. Dickey.

Walker told the Observer late Wednesday that no decision had been reached as to further pursuit of the appeal to have the election invalidated. He said he and other paintiffs had not decided what to do. Next step for further appeal would be the Supreme Court of the United States.





How about a year-around Christmas tree?

Your Christmas tree can serve a dual purpose: with lights, brightly colored balls and tinsel it adds holiday spirit to any room, planted in your yard it can bring additional years of enjoyment.

Buy an evergreen which is balled and burlapped or grown in a container. After Christmas plant it in the yard.

The tree should have a straight trunk, uniform shape and fairly dense foliage. The foliage should not feel dry.

Lack of good color and fragrance indicate excessive dryness.

Do not keep the live Christmas tree in the house more than seven days. Store it in an unheated place until decoration time. Then place the root ball in a container large enough to allow several inches of damp sawdust or peat moss around the ball.
