A \$700,000 school bond election was called Tuesday night when Robert Lee School's board of trustees met. The election will be held March 16.

Supt. Jimmy Bickley reported that the board has been having frequent meetings the post few weeks in an effort to work out details for calling the election. Included in plans for the new school facilities are the following new additions: 10 classrooms, homemaking department, voca-

tional agriculture classroom and shop building, cafeteria, gymnasium, library and multipurpose room.

In addition to the new buildings, plans call for complete reconditioning the old gym and band hall. New dressing rooms will be built to accomodate users of the old gym, also.

Bickley said construction of the new library facility will release the present library for use as a classroom. He said the multipurpose room adjacent to the library will be used for storage of newspapers and magazines, and for housing duplicating equipment used by teachers.

The plans call for a cafeteria. which will seat 254 persons, while seating capacity of the proposed gymnasium is 680.

EDITORIAL

We were highly impressed with the condition of Coke County finances as evidenced by an audit of county funds which was released recently by County Auditor Weldon Fikes, and which the county is having published in part, in this week's Observer.

The audit shows that operating funds weathered 1967 with a larger balance than was on hand at the end of 1966. Balance in the interest and sinking funds was slightly under the 1966 figure, but then not as much money was needed since three outstanding road bond issues which were included in the 1966 report were paid off and have no balance to show in the 1967 audit. lace.

Also, of interest was the fact that the interest and sinking funds of the four outstanding bond issues now contain more money than the outstanding balance of the principal of the four.

Three of the four outstanding issues will mature next year and the other one (Coke County Park Bonds) will mature in 1971. While we have not checked with county officials on their plans or the possibilities to retire the bonds early, it may be feasible to call in some of them this year and avoid payment of interest for the last year.

Now that we have congratulated ourselves on our good fortune in having our county business managed so efficiently, perhaps it is time to consider some additional needs of the county and its residents.




and committees have spent considerable time working up preliminary studies and plans of needs for a new jail and sheriff's home, a new livestock show barn and agriculture building, improvements and enlargement for the community center in Robert Lee, and a new community center in Bronte.

We feel that now is the time to do something about these needs, inasmuch as one would not be stretching the point at all to say that Coke County is now out of debt.

The county now levies 12 cents per \$100 valuation for permanent improvements. Present valuations at this rate will bring in a little more than \$27,500 each year which could be used to retire bonds to make these improvements.

What are we going to use this money for, now that it is no longer needed to retire bonds which were voted to build a new courthouse, parks and pools, and paved streets and roads?

We think it should be used to make permanent improvements which will benefit all citizens of this county.


