Omar Burleson Makes Announcement Regarding Candidacy For Congress

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress subject to the Democratic Pri. mary on May 4 and in the General Election in November.

"The people of Coke County responded most generously to my campaign two years ago when I had an opponent and when the area was new to the District," Burleson said in his opening statement. Coke County was placed in the 17th District by the State Legislature in 1966, and he began officially representing it at the beginning of 1967.

The 17th Congressional District is now composed of 31 Counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 440,000 people.

"With this tremendous area, and the fact that Congress is in session almost continuously, it is pretty difficult to see and know people as I think their Represen. tatives in the Congress should," Burleson said in his comments. "I believe it is incumbent upon a Congressman to know people and that they know him, to have the best representation. This is fundamental to our system," he said.

In his statement, Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding prin. ciples: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my action in the Halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he

"The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. He gave as examples the conser. vation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare.

"At the same time," he said the Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington, either foreign or domestic. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U.S. House of Representatives in point of service. His seniority has carried him to the Chairmanship of the potent House Administration Committee, and to the second position to the Chairman on the powerful Foreign Affairs Commit. tee. In addition, Burleson serves on two important Joint Commit. tees formed from senior members of the House and Senate, as Chairman of one and Vice Chair. man of the other.

Burleson is a former County At. torney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served ni a num. ber of assignments over the U. S. the Navy in World War II and David Beaty at 453.3901. saw duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal an. nouncement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the Primary Election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washing. ton. I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and to make new ones."






