state shipments by 25%. Not only are Texans concerned about the amount of gas shipped to the interstate market, but bargain basement prices for the gas is also a problem. Other states are not developing gas production because of the low price of interstate gas being shipped from Texas while Texas corporations are required to pay much higher prices for gas produced in the state. > HOW ABOUT bread made with okra-seed flour and okraseed oil? No, this is not a joke, it's a promise. A research chemist at the UT Health Science Center is experimenting to see what food products can be extracted from okra seeds.




