## Austin, Tex. - This is a cru cial week for the special session of

 the legislature which, as expect.ed, neared the half-way mark without coming to grips with any major assignments.
House members were due to
face up to Gov. John Connally's "small bottle" liquor by-the-drink closely by in the week, followed closely by a vote on a $\$ 2,500,900$, 000 budget for 1969 state govern mental operations.
The mini-bottle liquor-bill wa voted out of the House State Affairs Committee, but only after one of the most confusing bouts of legislative in-fighting history. Two "wets" held critical positions. They voted for the bill on the second day of the committee debate after opposing it through out the preceding day.
First, Rep. James Clark of Dal las captured the spotlight when he switched his vote from pro to con during the initial day's de bates. Clark had offered amend ments to the bill which were de feated by the committee.
Then, late in the afternoon "drys" started voting with the "drys" saying the legislation was an impossible gobledegook,"
gal gobbledegook."
But the next morning Clark "wet" opponent, Rep. Jake John wet" opponent, Rep. Jake John Both men indicate
Both men indicated they ha received assurances from the au
thors of the bill that their amend thors of the bill that their amend
ments would be given favorable consideration on the floor of the House if they would just help get the bill out of committee.
Clark and Johnson both wan liquor by-the-jigger legislatio instead of liquor in two-ounc mini-bottles as provided in the governor's bill. But they said they would go along with the little bottles if they could secure cer
tain other changes in the law. They want at least three pro visions added:

1. An amendment to outlaw the practice of legislators represent the clients before the Texas Li quor Control Board
2. A provision doubling the 11 ense fees for persons selling quor and beer.
3. A provision requiring com plete financial disclosure by hold ers of beer and liquor licenses. This is aimed at stopping the practice of juke box operators making loans to tavern operators with interest rates.
With these assurances from the bill's authors, Clark and Johnson would seem to be in a strong position to make their demands be met but margin on the House foor appears even closer. In case of failure of the gover nor's tax proposals, tied largely to three per cent with 75 per cent of the new income refunded cent of the new income refunded their populations - lawmakers may turn to a straight increase in the sales tax without refund provisions. Both the governor's bill ( $\$ 127,200,00$ a year total taxes) and the straight sales tax raise $(\$ 150,000,000$ annual yield) were reviewed by the House Revenue and Tax Committee and sent to sub-committee.

House Speaker Ben Barnes has indicated he would like to have major issues of the session - tax es, budget and liquor by-the-drink - by the end of the week. That would leave less than two weeks for Senate action and final reconciliation of differences in conference committees.

THEAT MARVEL of our ree enterprise sytem in Americ is that it virtually guarantees reasonable annual income about everyone, provided he she is willing to work. There are of course, exceptions. In the past we have not done all which should have been done to give pportunity for training more pople for better jobs. There are hose who, for some misfortune or other, are unable to obtain and hold a decent job but no country in history has been so successful in creating job opportunities as has this Country.
YET THERE ARE SOME peo ple who want to redesign our sys tem so that it gives the "drones" full equality with the "workers." In February of 1967, the Na tional Commission on Technolo gy, Automation and Economic Progress, produced a 210 -page report endorsing a guarantee minimum annual wage for every American. Should the Commis sion's report ever be enacted into law, the citizen who chose not to work would get a cash The advocates of the Government The advocates of the guaranteed annual income theory contend hat it is everyone's Constitution al right, re
