So far, no heavy concentrations of worm cases have been reported anywhere in the State. But, the daily and weekly counts are staying about the same, and too, the area in which cases are being re-

There are several reasons why this is happening and all of them point to a stress on the tree. The point to a stress on just like a cotton stalk, pecan, just like a cotton stalk,
will start shedding its produce
if if the growth factors get too far out of kilter. This is nature builtin protective device.
We had a wet spring and most trees put on a good to heavy load of nuts. Also, the trees made
heavy foliage that was "sappy" or high in fluid content.
Then about the first of July the temperature climbed and the rains stopped. The humidity went down also. The soil and air when the trees demand for water to fill the growing nuts increased sharply. All of these factors together put a pjhysiological stress on the trees, particularly the young trees with a medium to heavy crop of nuts and the trees that may have been needing some plant food. To lighten the load, the tree or trees shed its nuts or

Indoor.Outdoor Carpet door carpet already has a new twist-bulked yarn to give plush, more luxurious carpet. Indoor - outdoor carpeting, past, has been a little on the stiff side. The bulked yarn has softened the surface, yet it wears like stiffer finishes.
The carpeting is easy to care for, highly stain resistant and re good acoustical properties, low static build up and low moistur absorbency.
There are other new indoor outdoor developments underfoot. Patterned carpets are coming on the scene for more decorator
versatility. These carpets, with special barriers to keep mois ure such as spills from leaking urough, especially are good for
use over wood.
Two basic types of indoor-cut door carpeting are woven or
non-woven. The woven carpet is textured and in cut-pile, much like other carpeting. In the non woven or felted construction, the floor covering. Generally, the felted types are cheaper. Aside from the price, there is no gen eral advantage of one type over the other

Another version of the non-
wovens is carpet tile. The tiles are 12 -inch squares with soft
rubber backs for use indoors or out.
Sharp objects, such as cleats on shoes, can damage the nonwovens. If some repair work is a few tiles and not the entire carpet.

finger around both sides of the bone and remove it in either one pieces
Step 2: Working with one side of the breast, insert the tip of working the knife underneath the working the knife underneath the
bone, cutting it free from the the rib cage by cutting around the outer edge of the breast up joint, thus removing the entire ib cage. Turn the breast aroun and repeat

Step 3: Now, working from the ends of the wishbone, scrape
