We had a wet spring and most trees put on a good to heavy load of nuts. Also, the trees made heavy foliage that was "sappy" or high in fluid content.

Then about the first of July the temperature climbed and the rains stopped. The humidity went down also. The soil and air moisture content dropped right when the trees demand for water to fill the growing nuts increased sharply. All of these factors together put a pjhysiological stress on the trees, particularly the young trees with a medium to heavy crop of nuts and the trees that may have been needing some plant food. To lighten the load, the tree or trees shed its nuts or part of them. We see this happen on some trees every year. This year with the contrasting weather conditions we are seeing more shedding than usual.
