



Do you take for granted the plentiful supply and attractive prices of frying chicken available the year round? This development is one of the great success stories of American agriculture.

Thirty years ago the only broilers or fryers were marketed in the late summer and were a by-product of laying hen operation. Since World War II broiler production has increased from 310 million broilers in 1947 to 2.6 billion in 1967.

The attractive prices you now enjoy are results of efficiency in production and marketing. Fryers are a bargain nutritionally, too. The protein is top quality and the calorie count is not high, which is good news for weight watchers.

One three-ounce service of chicken meat, without the skin, has only about 120 calories.

Take a little care when storing fryers or other poultry in the home. Remove the store wrapping from the fresh bird as soon as you get home. Rewrap the chicken loosely in waxed paper and keep it in the coldest part of the refrigerator until you are ready to cook it.

Buying Towels

White sales this time of year can offer bargains in towels. But how can you decide what to buy to get a bargain?

Check the fiber count, the number or warp (lengthwise) threads plus the number of filling (crosswise) threads in one square inch. More threads per inch means better and faster drying.

The number and height of the loops makes the difference in quality. However, long loops which are far apart do not make
