Coke County reported two cases of screwworms last week. Both cases were found in the Silver area. One case was reported by M. C. Hendry, southwest of Sil. ver; the other case by Foster southwest of Silver, also.
During the weekend all of south and southwest Texas received some moisture. The rain wa wonderful, but it could add fue to the screwworm situation. Everyone is encouraged hrough the fall season. The fall months are normally the worst screwworm months anyway. With the situation as it is now, one case missed would magnify the danger of a larger buildup.
Spraying is a good practice to help control screwworms. A good spraying to control horn flies and ticks could give added protec. program.
Avoid causing open wounds du ring the fall if possible. Brand ing, docking, dehorning and cas trating need to be delayed if pos sible. Treat all wounds you make $r$ find
The two to three months ahead are critical ones in the screw wram authoities gram authoities are doing all they can do to guard the over at the same time spet trent th cases above the control zoat the hope this plan can be maintained until cold weather arrives shoul the situation get out of hand abovs the over wintering hone, we may have to rely on the weather to break the buildup. The authorities believe the over win tering zone must be guarded an held as free of worms as possible The sterile fly drops would have to be concentrated in that zone We hope that no cases are al lowed to get by, and that no further cases are found in this area.

The importance of the samples cannot be overemphasizod, Dr Henderson said, and it is urgent that stockmen throughout the tate cooperate.
Ticks should be placed in vial of commercial alcohol and mailed to the State-Federal Lab. oratory, Third Floor, Western Re public Life Building, Austin, Tex as 78701. A label or memoran dum should accompany the sam. ple, listing the name of the own $c$, the mailing address, location of the farm or ranch, and type or animal from which the tick ticks were removed.
As an aid, the vials used for Armitting screwworm samples ized. They are available at our office and from Key Feed Store and Supply in Bronte.
Because of the importance and urgency of this sampling pro gram, all cattle and horse owners Coke County are asked lick infestation and submit tor the Austin Laboratory speci mens if and when discovered.

Cotton root rot proved a major problem to Coke County produc ers this season. Although com plete eradication of the fungus is very difficult, cultural practices begun now can help lessen the damage to next year's crop. Root rot organisms are cap the soil and can be transmitted new areas on infected roots of another plant. The fungus is capable of affecting more than 2,000 wild and cultivated plants. Plants die suddenly after first ymptoms of wilting - roots de cay and when pulled from the soil root bark slips easily. Wooly strands of fungus will still be linging to the surface.
Basic control measures begin with early shredding of stalks and deep plowing to depths of 12.18 inches. This early plowing will allow fungus more exposure to warm sunshine and air.
In many cases a resistant crop grown in rotation has proved most valuable. Cotton should be grown every third year in rota tion with grain sorghum or small grains where possible. These re sistant crops can prevent additional buildups of the fungi and allow more time for producing and burying more organic matter. Cotton should be planted as early in the season as possible. Less hot, fungus-favorable wea early.
