#### **BCD Talks About Cemetery Care**

Action which could well be the beginning of better and regular care for the Robert Lee Cemetery was taken at Tuesday's meeting of the BCD. It was agreed to ask a member each from Hayrick Lodge, the BCD and the Lions Club to serve with Mayor Wilson Bryan and Commissioner Fern Havins to push the work needed at the cemetery.

The matter came up at BCD when two members of Hayrick Lodge, L. B. Menielle and Delbert Shoemaker, were guests and presented the lodge's position regarding the matter of cemetery care and maintenance.

They reported that Hayrick Lodge is custodian of the cemetery and many years ago the land was donated to the public as a free burial place and a charge of any kind cannot be made.

Free donations toward upkeep can be accepted, but not solicited. they said.

A cemetery association was formed four years ago with Earl H. Ivey as president and Bill Allen as secretary. The association is not very active now, the visitors said.

Menielle stated he felt the only answer to the maintenance problem must come through an active cemetery association and a hired caretaker.

Robert Vaughan, former mayor of the city, spoke on the matter and said he felt the first big thing facing interested citizens was a thorough cleaning, and removing of debris and excess gravel. Vaughan said he thought if this work could be accomplished, 80 per cent of the grounds could be maintained with the use of mowers.

It was brought out that the old association has \$200, and another \$150 has been paid into the association since then for highway right-of-way. This money can be used toward care and maintenance for the cemetery.



We hope this plan can be maintained until cold weather arrives. Should the situation get out of hand above the over wintering zone, we may have to rely on the cold weather to break the buildup. The authorities believe the over wintering zone must be guarded and of another plant. The fungus is held as free of worms as possible. 


